BADSEY W.I.

Our new year is well under way and we have been enjoying the delights of the ocal countryside on our weekly walks and had a superb time in London when we had a 'Theatre Week-end' visiting various top London shows and enjoying the delights of Covent Garden. Plans are under way for a long week-end in the Lake District, a visit to Birmingham back-toback houses and the Jewelry Quarter museum in September and a visits to various gardens and places of interest including a guided tour of Stratford-on-Avon and a Fish and Chip Supper aboard the steam locomotive from Toddington to Cheltenham. We also had the delights of a Floral Art demonstration at Evesham Arts Centre. Our speaker for the month in April was Bernard Mills on the history of Kays. This was a fascinating talk accompanied by slides showing various fashons and household items from yesteryear and various places in Worcester where Kays used to be. It was interesting to hear that Kays was started by a young man from a workhouse and mainly made and sold clocks and watches before ex-

tending its rage of fashions and goods. In fact the most famous clock is on Paddington Station in London and has been there for many years. When you see the old black and white movies where the Paddington station is used, the scenes of lovers, gangsters or other people meeting, is always "under the clock" (Kays clock). The month of May sees us discussing two resolutions which will be carried forward to Parliament for their action. Each year the W.I. movement is asked by government to put forward two or three issues which it is felt should be looked at and dealt with by the government. These resolutions take a very long time to research and investigate and are then put together, discussed by every W.I. member and voted on as to whether they should be put to Government or not. This year the two resolutions to be decided on are "Trawling the Ocean Beds" as this practice is resulting in desecration of marine life in our seas. The second resoluis about the "Inappropriate Imprisonment of Severely Mentally III people". Since the closure of nearly all our

mental hospitals many of the persons who would be cared for and treated in these hospitals are being kept in prisons which do not have the right and necessary facilities to care for them as they should be



cared for. If members from the country wide W.I. movement agree on these two resolutions or one of them they will be discussed at meetings with the prime Minister and the appropriate Government of ficials for discussion and action. The W.I is the biggest voluntary organization in Britain having over 205,000 members which means that as 'one voice' they car have quite an impact and effect on different national issues. The movement is non political so therefore can only have any effect on decisions which are nonpolitical. In many instances it is because of the W.I. that different issues concerning health and well-being, education, food marketing, baby welfare, farming and so many more have been addressed and acted upon by the government of the day



LETTER FOR THE MONTH

Dear All



As I sit in my study to write this letter. the evening sun has not yet set and through the window, there is the sound of birdsong, but uppermost in my mind is the plight of

the people of Burma. The headlines tell that aid has started to trickle through to survivors, but aid agencies warn of an "apocalyptic" disease epidemic if more aid is not urgently received. The first UN trucks have also arrived - with the organisation appealing for an extra £90m to help victims of the disaster. However, other news indicates that despite the devastation, the ruling Junta have refused to allow outside agencies visas to enter the country and has refused to accept some of the aid packages because of the contents. It has also continued with a referendum on a controversial proposed constitution despite the huge

loss of life and the countless thousands who have lost their homes. Heavy rain forecast in the next week is expected to exacerbate the misery of an estimated one million survivors awaiting food, clean water, shelter and medicine.

Meanwhile in the garden of the Vicarage, the birds continue to sing and squirrels play in the trees, how do you make sense of the two extremes? And where, I ask myself is God in all of this? As a religious leader in this place, I feel that I ought to have all the answers and be able to make sense of it all, but as I sit in my study and pray, there does not seem to be any sense in it. thoughts that come to mind are that the planet is a living creation and natural disasters happen; and that God has given us (as well as the ruling Junta in Burma) free will and does not directly control the actions we take; but these are just platitudes, well worn expressions that try to justify something beyond justificaHow then can we help, and what can we do? We can help with the humanitarian aid efforts as best we can but we can offer very little practical help, and that is what makes us feel so helpless.

My faith reminds me that God is there, alongside those in the midst of the devastation, and my prayers are that relief will be allowed into the country, and those left alive will be helped to rebuild something of their ruined lives. At times, all we can do is trust in a God who created us and loves us, and I realise that by the time you read this in the Parish Magazine, in all probability the people of Burma will no longer be making the headlines and the world will have moved on. As you read this, I ask you, if you pray, please pray for the people of Burma who are still suffering. If you do not pray, perhaps I could ask you just pause for a moment, think, and remember.

A steady flow of God's presence in everyday life, like breathing, so natural we can become unaware of it. It is only when we stop; gathering our thoughts and become quiet we know God's spirit is with us

We were given a verse from the book of Micah in The Old Testament:

This is what Yahweh (God) asks of you, only this: that you act justly.

that you love tenderly,

that you walk humbly with your God. Micah 6:8 I think these sum up all I have already written about Spirituality because we will then be joining in with God's plan for the world.

BADSEY AND ALDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

At its meeting on 16th April 2008 in the Remembrance H all, Badsey, the Council discussed a number of items. It was agreed to bring the following problems to the attention of the police:

- 1. The Rec. has been suffering from vandalism late at night. People have been smashing glass bottles all over the children's play surfaces.
- Parking is becoming an issue again at the Bank House with up to three cars being parked on the pavement / grass verges at a time. Police to be requested to ticket offences in future as verbal warnings do not appear to have worked.
- 3. The police to be notified that teenagers broke into the roof of the Remembrance Hall on Monday 14th April.

Planning

The Planning Committee was pleased to hear that following representations by Cllr Sparrow on behalf of the Parish Council at Wychavon District Council's Planning meeting, the application for amendments to the approved scheme on Badsey Fields Lane was rejected. The Parish Council also discussed three new planning applications in the village at its meeting on the 8th May. none of which were contentious. It noted that two previous applications one affecting Mesamere on Willersey Rd and another for a fishing lake on Bretforton Rd had been withdrawn by the applicants.

Other Matters

The Council also agreed to support Sanco and Badsey Butchers in their applications for rural rate relief from the District Council and agreed to donate £400 to the Remembrance Hall Committee as a contribution towards grass cutting around the Hall.

The Council voted unanimously to reject an approach from Wayleave Survey and Engineering Ltd to lay a high voltage underground cable beneath the Recreation Ground and footway to Badsey Fields Lane along with erecting a new terminal pole on the far north eastern corner of the Recreation Ground.

GARDENING TIPS

General

cloudless skies - just the right conditions to enjoy your Badsey Undergrounds to Wickhamford and back via garden to the full. But don't forget to give thirsty plants an extra drink of water. Danger of frost should have passed and gardening takes a new aspect.

For the plants

Your hanging baskets require regular and frequent watering - even in wet weather they are often sheltered by buildings to recieve enough moisture - so it makes sense to make the job as easy as possible without too much mess.

For the fruit

Do not worry if you find a scattering of tiny apples below your apple tree at this time of year. This process is called 'June drop' and is the perfectly natural way in which the tree sheds access fruit when too many have set. A tree that carries too many apples will at best bear an abundance of tasteless small fruit.

Visitors

Hoverflies are good mimics - they can easily be mistaken for bees and wasps. Unlike those insects, however, hoverflies can hover and dart backwards and forwards. The adult flies do not eat pests directly, but they lay their eggs among aphids and the larvae (grub) that hatch feed on them vorcaciously - it is thought one grub eats about 600 of them
