#### BADSEY HISTORICAL SOCIETY

An important survey of Badsey and Aldington took place over the weekend of 17th/18th May when a team of 24 photographers from The Badsey Society took photos of almost every building in the parish. They were repeating an exercise undertaken 40 years ago when, on 26th May 1968, a team of 19 photographers from Worcestershire Record Office and Birmingham Photographic Society visited Badsey on "The Badsey Expedition". The Archives Manager of the time realised that many areas of the county were going through a period of great development and was keen to capture images of villages as they were then. These photos now form part of a unique collection held at the Record Office at County Hall.

There were around 600 houses in Badsey in 1968. Since the photos were taken 40 years ago, some of the houses no longer exist and many more have been built since that date. For example, the old vicarage was demolished in 1971 and Allsebrook Gardens with ten houses was built on the site. Aldington did not form part of the 1968 survey, but it has been included for 2008. Both the 1968 and 2008 photos will form part of an important historic photographic archive showing how Badsey and Aldington have changed over a period of time and should be of great interest to historians of the future.

Come and see us at The Badsey Society stand at Badsey Flower Show on Saturday 26th July where the photos will be on view. There will also be the opportunity to see some of the photos at a Slide Show later in the year.

# BADSEY AND ALDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

#### Public Forum

At every meeting of the Parish Council, the Council sets aside time at the beginning for the public to address the Council. At its meeting on 21st May the Parish Council received a presentation from BARD, the protest group campaigning against the proposed Eco town at Long Marston. Clive Moyes, BARD's spokesman explained that there was nothing "Eco" about the proposed town and described it as "vandalism in a green cloak". He stressed that the Town would have a devastating effect on Badsey due to the increase in traffic – the new town would be two thirds the size of Stratford, in an area with inadequate infrastructure and he advised people to protest against the plans. Following the presentation, the Parish Council decided to appoint Councillor Martin Bent as the Council's representative to BARD.

At its forthcoming meeting on June 18th, Nigel Potter, who spearheaded the "Housing Needs Survey" which

households participated in last November, will present the findings of the survey to the Council. All interested members of the public are invited to attend.

#### **Planning**

At its Planning Meeting on 4th June, the Committee considered four new planning applications — 2 for conservatories, one for a safe and secure building to accommodate implements at Bowers Hill and a two-storey extension to 81 Bretforton Rd. It was decided to make no objections to any of the planning applications.

#### Dog Fouling

The Clerk has received a number of reports of two unsupervised terriers fouling the pavements and residents' lawns in Manor Close. Wychavon District Council's dog warden has been informed and will be making spot checks.

#### **GARDENING TIPS**

#### General

Most of the jobs at this time of year are concerned with keeping plants gorwing and well for as long as possible - and that means watering, feeding, and dead-heading where appropriate. Do not forget to check those biennals and perennial seeds that you have sown during the last month, as they need attention at this stage too.

#### For the plants

Sweet peas are one of those wonderful plants that actually respond better if you keep cutting the flowers. Pick plenty of bunches for the house or deadhead the plants regularly if you want them primarily for garden display. Once you start leaving the flowers to set seeds, the plant will quickly stop flowering.

Save your own seeds

It is generally not worth saving your own seeds of bedding and annuals as the plants they produce are inferior to the parents (though there are some exceptions, such as sweet peas). It is worth saving the seeds of many rock plants and some border plants, however, especially if they are species rather then highly bred hybrids.

#### **Visitors**

If you grow roses, sawflies, or rather their larvae, may be unwelcome visitors. Many gardeners think the culprits are larvae of butterflies or moths (in other words catterpillars), but the mature sawflies actually look like flies. You are likely to see them on wing at this time.

It was washing day and she would be going to Salter's shop to buy her tablet of green soap and a packet of soda, then back home to the dolly tub and mangle. Having seen gran, I was satisfied, preparing to go into school to get down to the serious business of learning. Next playtime about mid morning, where we would rush to the railings to see the arrival of the Sentinal steam wagon from Flowers brewery at Stratford unloading the beer at the Bell, hissing away as if eager to get away to the next drop. Then for some rough and tumble, with such games at Bedlam, Leap Frog, and Jack and the Mop Stick often ending with the loss of one or two jacket buttons, or two bloody knees. A long! trudge for young short legs. They made it. Good for them!
