GARDENING TIPS

Most of the jobs at this time of year are concerned with keeping plants growing and well for as long as possible - and that means watering, feeding, and dead-heading where appropriate. Do not forget to check those biennials and perennial seeds that you have sown during the last month, as they need attention at this stage too.

Sweet peas are one of those wonderful plants that actually respond better if you keep cutting the flowers. Pick plenty of bunches for the house or deadhead the plants regularly if you want them primarily for garden display. Once you start leaving the flowers to set seeds, the plant will quickly stop flowering.

Save your own seeds

It is generally not worth saving your own seeds of bedding and annuals as the plants they produce are inferior to the parents (though there are some exceptions, such as sweet peas). It is worth saving the seeds of many rock plants and some border plants, however, especially if they are species rather then highly bred hybrids.

If you grow roses, sawflies, or rather their larvae, may be unwelcome visitors. Many gardeners think the culprits are larvae of butterflies or moths (in other words catterpillars), but the mature sawflies actually look like flies. You are likely to see them at

SMART WATER IS COMING!!!

Occasionally we old cynics at Neighbourhood Watch find ourselves getting in a dither about some new development. And at the moment we are positively euphoric. West Mecia Constabulary are poised to introduce SmartWater.

"What is SmartWater?" I hear you cry!

It's a liquid, as the name suggests, and it's smart! A small amount is painted onto your valuables and, although invisible under normal circumstances, will show up under ultraviolet light. So if the property is stolen and subsequently recovered it will be immediately identified as belonging to you, as each batch has a unique 'DNA'. It will also indicate that the person in possession of the property has been behaving in a less that honest manner - what we in the trade call "bang to rights!"

Once it is applied to an article it remains viable for 115 years, so you could even get your stolen property returned in 2123. Businesses can set up a system which squirts SmartWater onto intruders, marking them for life, invisibly; but police stations are to be equipped with ultraviolet lamps giving suspects a great deal of explainingto do.

The plan is to sell SmartWater in areas covered by Neighbourhood Watch and, as a further plus, signs will be erected in any area involved warning Johnny Housebreaker that he is skating on thin ice if he plies his trade thereabouts.

In areas in other parts of the country where SmartWater has already been introduced the results have been extremely encouraging; as many as 90% fewer houses broken into. Soon leaflets will be distributed in your area telling you the cost (it's not free but is sold on a non-profit basis) and where to get it.

IN MEMORIAM

John Crisp of Badsey was bom in June 1927 to Arthur and Eva Crisp, and at the time of his death, was nearing his 81st birthday. John's descendants are described in the archives as coming from a long line of village stonemasons. His father, Arthur George Crisp won a Military Medal for bravery in the Boer War. His Grandfather, William Thomas Stanford was the founder member of the Badsey Rangers Football Club and also served as a special constable in Worcestershire. John is survived by his niece, Penny Bannister from Cheshire, and his cousin Pat Goldstraw, who lives in Badsey.

One could describe John as having led a very reclusive life and it would be fair to mention that sometimes his attitude during various stages of his life was questionable. He did though have a love for plants and over the years developed a wealth of knowledge on many species. He won many prizes at Badsey Flower Show for his exhibits. His plants were only referred to by their botanical names and John knew just how to care for them, so that they would flourish and flower into beautiful colours. John visited many public gardens in England, particularly those owned by the National Trust and during his life, developed friendships with fellow plant lovers as far away as Cornwall.

His Grandmother Crisp ran the Badsey Post Office during the war years, his Grandfather having died in 1939. One day whilst delivering a telegramme to Wickhamford Manor, John rescued some mauve gladioli from a rubbish heap. The flower beds there had been dug up to grow vegetables. The gladioli still grow every year in his back garden. In the late 60s, John went on a Banana boat to the Canary Islands with around 40 other passengers. He took the train to Paddington, then the underground to near the Wharf where he boarded the boat. It was a 4-week trip, and John enjoyed the experience.

John seemed happy living in a kind of time warp, unable to feel comfortable with the modern world. His life style was simple and undemanding in terms of extravagance. He was regularly seen cycling around the village, collecting wood for his fire.

Until recently, John always wore his best clothes on Sundays. His evenings were spent listening to classical music on the radio, he didn't possess a television, or a telephone. This year John's health gradually began to fail which caused him occasionally to feel somber. On 3rd June he was reported missing and his bike, coat, cap and scarf were found beside Badsey Brook. On 9th June John's body was recovered from the Brook. He has now been laid to rest in Badsey Churchyard. We will never know exactly what happened.

Apparently the rose tree had originally belonged to Lyn's mother, but Lyn and her husband had dug

it up and brought it with them to their new home in Badsey and it is obviously thriving here, so well done Lyn.

Apart from thanking all the people who opened their gardens and the people who visited them, I must thank especially the three couples who volunteered to serve teas. These were very well received and I think some people came both days, just to enjoy a cream tea.
