## 2 LETTER FOR THE MONTH



Dear all,  
I am sitting waiting for the end of the world, or at least I would be if I were to take notice of some observers commenting on the experiments taking

place 100 meters beneath the earth on the shores of Lake Geneva. I, along with many others I suspect, don't fully understand what is involved in sending sub-atomic particles in opposite directions around a seventeen mile long tunnel at the speed of light in the hope that they will collide with each other, but that does not stop me marvelling at the achievements of science. The scientists are trying to re-create the moment immediately after the

beginning of the universe, fractions of a millisecond after what is known as 'the big bang', the very beginning of time itself.

From a scientific point of view, this is immensely important. If the tests are successful, it will give the scientists a large amount of information about the creation of the world as we know it, and I am sure that in years to come there will be all sorts of spin-offs that will increase our knowledge about the world in which we live. Nevertheless, I suspect that whatever information is gathered and however useful it is to scientists, it will not yield the answer to the creation of the world. From a Christian perspective, the creation of the world is one of the great mysteries (although Christians hold many different views regarding the creation stories in the bible). From my point of view, the bible accounts of creation are

a myth – but let me quickly explain what I mean by 'a myth'. A myth in this context, is a story that tries to explain something beyond our understanding, it uses people, animals and objects we can understand to help us to think about the possibilities of creation; the bible creation stories were written by a people far removed from our current level understanding of science and technology.

I eagerly await to see the outcome of the current experiments, but I suspect that for the vast majority of us we will be no further forward regarding our understanding of creation. I remain convinced that a force, which I do not understand and cannot comprehend, created the world, it is this incomprehensible entity that I call God.

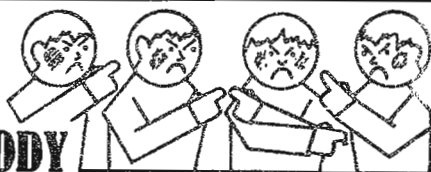

A serious incident occurred at St James on Friday 22 August during the early afternoon or early evening between 4.0 pm and 7.30 pm. Four teenagers, 2 boys and 2 girls were found in church misbehaving but it was only later we discovered that criminal damage had occurred along with some small acts of petty disrespect. One of a pair of churchwardens staves (wands) has been broken and the part of the staff with its brass top depicting a crown had gone missing, without which we shall be unable to get this repaired. Cream cheese was also smeared all over the Hoby Monument and more disrespectfully the wooden cross on the altar. A wooden gift from our German Partnership churches was also broken and some spectacles left as spares in the church were crushed. A few days previous to this a condom was found in the Transept and damage was done to one of our bell ropes in the Ringing Chamber. Graffiti suggests that a boy calling himself AZA has something to do with this. Please will all users of the church be extra vigilant. If anyone can shed light on these teenagers we would very much like to speak to them and their parents. If these are your children please get in touch. We especially would like to have returned or find the missing crown top. If you are the guilty party you can return this to the church any time anonymously. The police have been informed and have attended church to see the damage. Thankfully incidents like this are extremely rare in our village; this is the worst incident in many years. Most teenagers are good citizens and respectful of many people and their property. Our church is open to all people, every day for quiet reflection and prayer and will remain so.

## A TEENAGER'S STORY

I had a lot of anger as I was growing up. My parents had quite a violent relationship and split up when I was five. I couldn't get on with Mum's new partner and felt I wasn't getting enough love and attention.

The pain of not having Dad around grew and at age 11 I became very rebellious at school, once throwing a chair at a teacher. I hung around with troublemakers and became a hooligan on our estate. I even got arrested. People tried to help me by offering solutions such as mentoring, but none of these worked. I felt insecure and empty inside and didn't know what to do about it, so I easily took offence and lashed out at people. My school grades tumbled as my problems came to a head at age 14.

Then I started spending time with a Christian woman on my estate. My views of Christianity were negative, but I

was struck by the joy on her face as she spoke about Jesus and the realities of her faith.

She took me to church and I noticed the people there seemed to really believe in something. Soon I knew that this was what I wanted and I committed myself to following Christ.

I didn't understand what was happening to me, but I began to calm down. The anger and violence, which were so much a part of me, subsided. I studied more and my grades improved, as did my relationship with my family. I went to church regularly and had a real sense of belonging with people I saw as my brothers and sisters. Now I'm planning to go to university and feel called to become a missionary. I have a clear purpose and realise it could all have been thrown away if God hadn't stepped in and saved me from wasting my life.

## GARDENING TIPS

### General

Do not let the season's ever lengthening evenings and increasingly cold and dull days give you a negative attitude to gardening. Pick a few blooms from the garden to cheer up the home, and look on outdoor tasks like cleaning up the beds and raking up autumn leaves with a positive attitude. You can smarten your garden even if it lacks colour of previous months - and some useful recycling can be done.

### For the plants

Most gardeners plant their containers with bright summer flowers, but it is worth planting one or two with colourful evergreen shrubs that will have year-round appeal. Try growing a New Zealand flax (phormium), Hebe x franciscana 'Variegata' and the grey leaved curry plant (Helichrysum angustifolium).

### Clean glass

Plants in cold frames and greenhouses need all the light they can get from now on. Make sure any summer shading wash is cleaned off, and wash all glass thoroughly inside and outside.

### Visitors

Berries and birds are both attractive in the garden, and one will tend to attract the other. At this time of year both can be enjoyed as there is still plenty of alternative food around. Although birds will be attracted by the berries they should not be so hungry that they strip the bushes (in harsh winter weather a flock of birds like redwings can strip a whole tree in a couple of days).

## SKELETON STAFF THESE BONES

The membership of any organisation is made up of four sets of bones.

There are the **Wishbones**, who spend all their time wishing someone else would do the work; along with the **Jawbones**, who do all the talking but very little else.

Another group is the **Knucklebones** – they knock everything that anybody else tries to do. But most valuable are the **Backbones**, who get under the load and actually do the work.

To which set do you belong?
