

I went to a Readers

subject was
Wholeness and
Healing. It was very
interesting and

answered some misconceptions. Wholeness and Healing is not a one off healing service held intermittently in church. It is an ongoing whole ministry led and shared by clergy and lay people alike after training on both sides. The parish of Inkberrow have an excellent Wholeness and Healing Ministry team and the following is from a leaflet produced by them.

## Firstly, it asks 'What do we believe about Healing and Wholeness?'

The Christian healing ministry is for everyone; we all need healing in some way. Through the healing ministry, Jesus Christ meets us at our point of need. We believe that God loves us and wills the very best for us. But we also know that suffering and even death itself are experiences

from which we cannot escape. God's desire and longing is to bring us and all creation to wholeness. Jesus Christ accepted the outcast, touched the untouchable, forgave sinners, healed the sick, and triumphed over death, even death on the cross, and he is especially close to us in times of need. The resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead is the sign of the power of God at work amongst us. Through the Church's ministry, we receive the love, strength and healing touch of Christ, and share a foretaste of his kingdom here. The Holy Spirit enables the people of God to be the Body of Christ. Jesus Christ commissions his Church to preach the gospel and to heal the sick. The Christian healing ministry embraces the healing of body, mind and spirit, and of our relationships with ourselves, with God, with one another and with our environment. The Church seeks to support and encourage those receiving medical care. We recognise and affirm the work of the medical professions and health services in enabling healing to take place.

The most common forms of healing ministry are public and private prayers of intercession; the laying on of hands;

anointing; reconciliation and absolution and the work of the whole Body of Christ. All of us are able to take part in the Church's healing ministry, through friendship, forgiveness, listening, acceptance, affirmation and prayer. In prayer, we bring people and their needs before Christ, looking forward in faith to the healing he wills for us all.

## What can we hope for through this ministry?

God's healing is experienced in many different ways. It may:

- help to carry us through a prolonged illness of disability;
- be a recovery more rapid than expected;
- be a healing which is so unexpected that we immediately want to thank God.
- take a form of inner peace, acceptance and trust.

There is a lot more to the leaflet but I haven't got the room to reproduce it all here Hopefully there will be more to report on this ministry in the future. Sheila Lancaster

On September 24th Badsey and Aldington's Annual Parish Meeting took place at the Remembrance Hall. There was an excellent turnout from many organisations within the Parish and representatives gave short reports on the activities that their groups had undertaken during the past year. Amongst the groups represented, Badsey Guides continue to thrive and the inspirational speech by Liz Bolland made us all want to join this wonderful organisation. Mick Loram for Badsey Rangers reported that although keeping an adult Saturday team operational was difficult due to members work commitments, the Junior section was doing exceptionally well with age ranges from 8 to 16 years represented. The Badsey Society has been another success story - although it was only formed in 2002 it has already been recognised as one of the top four archaeological groups in the county and has 600 members. As well as archaeology they study all aspects of Badsey life from its people, history and folklore to its flora and fauna. So far they have published two books and dyds with a third book under way and have just completed the photographic survey of the village started in 2004. Mrs Noyes, for Badsey Flower Show was pleased to report that this year's event had been a resounding success, following the cancellation of last year's event due to the floods. Pat Sparrow mentioned some of the more unusual items of entertainment that had taken place at the Show in the past, including pillow fights in 1930, and an event described as "guess the weight of Mr Carter - or a sizeable substitute!" in 1925.

Badsey WI has been in existence for 80 years without a break and currently has 50 active members who meet every month in the Remembrance Hall for fun, friendship and fellowship. Its members play an active role in the community helping Caring Hands in Evesham and the homeless and needy in the vale as well as supporting projects in developing countries abroad. Members have their own college in Oxford and can choose to study a variety of difference subjects including advanced driving and photography.

Aldington Resident's Association reported that they are as active as ever and as well as organising the annual litter pick and provision of a skip within the village, they have organised social events over the past few years including 2 fetes, a barn dance, car treasure hunt, skittles events and carol singing.

Other organisations to report on their activities at the meeting included St James Church, Badsey and Aldington Parish Council and County Councillor Tom Bean. The evening was very successful and gave an excellent insight into the activities of the many wonderful organisations which work to maintain the community in Badsey. Following the reports everyone stayed for a glass of wine and nibbles and it is hoped to repeat the meeting in May next year. Everyone in the Parish is invited to attend the Annual Parish Meeting and it is hoped even more groups will come forward to make this an even better social occasion.

### THE BEGINNING

I have enjoyed a week in Sheffield meeting many new people and finding out about the area. Unfortunately access to the internet has been limited; this email is coming with thanks to my housemate for allowing me access to the Uni account at Oxford Brookes. We 'first years' travelled down to Oxford on Sunday to join the Annual Community Week. This is a week where all the centres and all the 'years' get together to worship, learn, socialise and enjoy time together as a community. Community weeks consist of several elements for 'first years' and this is when enrolment takes place. For this we travelled by bus to the University of Gloucestershire, which is the new home for my course as it has outgrown Oxford Brookes. We were shown around the campus and informed of the procedures. We returned to Oxford for the rest of the week. On Tuesday the annual 'Boat Race' evening was held, this is a competition where all the centres compete against each other in various creative activities, and a quiz. Nottingham, by tradition, lost and was awarded the booby prize of The 'Pigs Ear'. We have had several lectures including, those on time management, school work and safeguards in youth work. This has been integrated with worship and an introduction to our 'year tutor' to put together a Professional Development Plan (PDP). When we return to Sheffield we will begin, journal writing, having meetings with line managers and field tutors, attending St John, Nottingham every two weeks for two sessions, over two days, and spend 14 hours a week in our church placements. We are also required to do an additional 90 hours placement during the year, find time to have theological reflection and write essays on what we are doing. I realise this email only outlines the basics of what has happened and what is expected of me over the next three years. But as time goes on I will try to explain more about the contents of the course in more depth

## **GARDENING TIPS**

### General

As gardening becomes increasingly difficult outdoors, make the most of those fine days that do occur to tidy beds and borders, and protect any vulnerable plants against the cold weather that will come. There are cheerful and promising signs of growth to offset the gloom of deteriorating weather. Bulbs that were planted in bowls to flower in early winter may be starting to shoot.

### For the plants

The majority of rock plants are very tough and hardy. They will succumb, though, to a covering of leaves that keeps out the light and creates conditions that encourage fungus diseases and pests. Slugs and snails, which love to hide beneath leaf litter and other debris, will soon munch their way through a small rock plant.

### Test your soil

There is only a limited amount that you can tell about a soil simply by looking at it. Its appearance may not tell you how acid or alkaline it is (important if want to grow acid-loving or chalk-loving plants), or wether it is deficient in major nutrients. To know how best to treat and manage your soil, you need to test for pH and nutrient levels... and it is very easy with a kit from your local DIY store or garden centre.

#### **Visitors**

Wood pigeons are regular winter visitors to the garden, and they can cause devastation among vegetables such as cabbage and Brussels sprouts once the weather becomes harsh. They will also damage many other garden plants if they become very hungry.

The youngest of four children, Elizabeth was born in Sileby, Leicestershire to parents who were Dairy Farmers. She wanted to be a PE teacher or something connected with the outdoor life, so the folks who know her will be surprised to read that because she had a flair for dressmaking, her parents decided that she was to be a dress designer and off she was sent to Art College. Elizabeth has been married to Ralph for over 43 years and they have two children and six grandchildren. The first seven years of married life was spent in Anglesey in North Wales where Ralph was stationed in the Royal Air Force. Moving to Badsey in 1973, where they still live, has now seen them move into their bungalow 'ready for their retirement', and although Elizabeth is passed retirement age, she says that she will carry on for a while longer in the job she loves as a Community Health Care Assistant with the District Nursing team, after deciding to go into nursing in 1978. Elizabeth has many and



varied interests and is a keen gardener and was delighted to win the 'Best Front Garden' at this year's Badsey Flower Show. She is a committed Christian and assists Ralph in his role as the Minister of the Elim Christian Centre in Evesham. The one area that most people reading this will know her is through Girlguiding here in Badsey. Having been in the Girlguiding movement since she was 7 years old, when she became a Brownie (no Rainbows in those days), then a Guide, she was the first Guide ever, in her local area, to gain the coveted 'Queen's Guide Badge'. Badsey Guides was formed in 1930 but was disbanded in 1950 until Elizabeth re-opened the Unit in 1976 and 32 years later she is still the Guide Leader today. Many local girls have been in Badsey Guides and the Unit continues to be as popular as ever, and she occasionally sees the children of previous Guides joining. She has held many extra roles/appointments in the Movement, currently being the Division Commissioner for Evesham and Pershore with the responsibility for many Units in a large area.
