Policy

Policy for Mothers' Union means creating positive change for families in society. It is not only about speaking for those who are not heard in society; it is about giving them a chance to speak for themselves.

MEMORIES-BADSEY

Did you know that a tall tree in Badsey was used as a navigational aid by aircraft crews? It was a Wellingtonia, which once grew in the grounds of Pool House (now the Dower House) in Badsey's High Street. Michael Barnard recalls the occasion in January 1944 when, as a member of the Air Training Corps he, together with another Badsey teenager, the late Ted Hemming, was taken on a training flight from R.A.F. Pershore (no.23 Operational Training Unit). The circular flight used the cathedral towers of Worcester, Hereford and Gloucester, plus Broadway Tower and the Badsey tree, as markers. The Wellingtonia, which stood well over 100 feet tall, thus dwarfing the nearby church tower, eventually became diseased and was felled in November 1980

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BREWER'S BAKERY

James Brewer's bakery was established in 1897 and was still operating in Badsey in the 1950s. Brewer's Lane is named after the man and the bakery. Here Don Barnard describes what it was like to work there in the mid-1950s.

This is a personal recollection of working in the summer for Brewer's Bakery, in Brewer's Lane. It must have been in 1955 or 1956, when I was 15 or 16, and I was hired on a cash-in-hand basis to help out with the baking.

Apart from two long wide tables for kneading and a couple of mechanical mixers, the bakery had a large oven about 15 feet long fed by a continually moving belt. Loaf tins with risen dough were loaded at one end, carried through as they cooked and taken off at the other. I recall the belt being about 10 tins wide, so unloading at the end was a tricky business. You handled the hot tins with sacking gloves, knocked out the loaves into a tray and stacked the tins, while the rest of the row got nearer and nearer to falling on the floor.

Another difficult task was adding jam to swiss rolls and doughnuts. The jam came in tins about a foot high and an experienced jammer could plunge a forearm into the tin and with one sweep spread most of a flat tray of cooked sponge, before finishing it off and rolling it up. Doughnuts were jammed (literally) onto a hollow spike, then a plunger was depressed, pumping in the jam. Both operations were made more hazardous by the wasps, which had to be picked out of the jam sometimes, before the Swiss rolls could be finished.

I must have been a poor hand at it, for I quickly found myself helping out on the van (an electric float) delivering bread (and I think milk) round the villages, certainly as far as Honeybourne.

GARDENING TIPS

General

The next few weeks are often particularly cold, and apart from routine maintenance jobs like checking tree ties and repairing and maintaining fences, most gardening activity is best confined to the armchair activities like planning your garden for the coming year and ordering seeds and plants. Do not be in too much of a hurry to sow summer bedding plants, even if you do have a greenhouse.

For the plants

Check shrubs and roses planted in the autumn and early winter to make sure that hard frosts have not loosened them in the ground. If necessary, refirm them by treading firmly around the base. If supports have also been loosened or blown over, refix them securely. New stakes in soft ground are particularly vulnerable in strong winds.

Greenhouse

If you have a greenhouse, even a small lean-to or a minigreenhouse put it to good use for seed raising this spring. You need not spend a lot of money on heating: start your seedlings off indoors where heat is available for no additional cost, then transfer them to the greenhouse which can be cooler, to grow on in the better light. It is too soon to sow the majority of seeds, but prepare the greenhouse now so that it is ready for when you need it.

Visitors

Redwings and fieldfares are two common winter visitors that sometimes descend on gardens in large numbers when the weather is severe. They are particularly attracted to berries whenever snow makes foraging for insects and grubs difficult, and a flock of them can strip a tree or bush within a couple of days.

'K' FITNESS

It's amazing how many excuses we can find for not making exercise a part of our lives and the most common one is "I don't have time to exercise". Well, the reality is that we don't have time NOT to exercise what with the increasing percentages of obesity, illnesses etc. Exercise helps us have the energy to accomplish everything we want to achieve as well as increasing our immune system and helping to maintain a healthy lifestyle as we move through the years. How much time do we spend watching TV or surfing the net or just wasting time? If our sedentary recreation time was reduced by 30 mins a day, that would give 30 mins in which to exercise. We all waste some time during the day so perhaps by a little re-arranging, we could find that time to do something positive to improve our wellbeing.

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PEOPLE PROFILE - GERARD POULTER

On November 11th 1918 my father's aeroplane had engine trouble, and came down in the North Sea, a sitting duck for German 'U' boats which he had just been bombing. His only communication with base were two pigeons to which he attached a note of his position. Fortunately one made it home and later that day he was rescued – when the war was over. How lucky was that? So, thanks to that bird I was born 19 years later in a lodge at Wood Norton, just outside Evesham. The BBC wanted a secret location for their broadcast operations during the Second World War, which is why we moved as a family to Murcot turn, Wickhamford. My formative years growing up during the war were truly memorable. We had a four acre fruit orchard, a lot of chickens, rabbits, two ponies, a donkey and two cows. Father milked the cows before going to work managing a company in Evesham and then milking any time up to midnight after his Dad's Army duties. I went three miles to school in Bengeworth on Trotts, a little black pony, that got me safely there and back. Sometimes we went by pony and trap three miles up the road to Broadway Church where father was a Church Warden. On one summer's evening the sound of horses' hooves going down the road while we were listening to the Vicar's sermon, meant our

transport was on the way home without us! Eight years at boarding school in Bristol made me very homesick for the outdoors life I loved, but prepared me for hard work and a determination to succeed as a farmer and cowman. During this period Wickham Farm was acquired and when I left Agricultural College in 1956 I started milking cows and have continued to do so practically every day, including Sundays, ever since. Thanks to my love of dancing, I met Anne, a Yorkshire lass, training to be a teacher, at a barn dance at Stanway. Two years later, in 1970, we were married and she joined me in the cowman's cottage on the farm. Her love of helping children has enriched our lives with many outside interests, as well as scouting, alongside bringing up our two children, Giles and Jessica. Throughout my adult life I have had the privilege of helping to care for St John the Baptist Church, Wickhamford, including 27 years as Church Warden under five different vicars. Badsey and Wickhamford were in plurality for 300 years sharing the same vicar until the present arrangement in 1997. *Cont'd page 8*
