ONE HUNDRED POUNDS A DAY

To keep your church open and available for weddings, funerals and baptisms as well as the regular weekly services will cost £35,897 this year, which is almost £100 each and every day. This includes the cost of insurance, heating, lighting as well as other routine expenses such as mowing the churchyard grass (work in the churchyard alone cost us £4,720 last year). As a local church we have to raise these monies ourselves as there is no central funding to meet these bills. Last year we were £6,192 short of meeting our expenses (£17 a day), can you help? At St James' there is a long tradition of using weekly envelopes to give regularly to the church, while other people choose to pay by Standing Order and we are most grateful to those who give regularly by these methods. If you don't go to church regularly but feel that you would like to support its upkeep, if only for the historic or architectural heritage of the building, this is possible by either a one-off donation, or a regular standing order monthly or annually. If you pay Income tax there is a scheme that allows the church to claim back an extra 28p from 'the taxman' for every £1 you donate. If you want any more information about either making a regular donation or about claiming tax back please do talk to me. Richard Court

LETTER FOR THE MONTH

Sunday the first of March is St David's Day, the day the Welsh celebrate their patron saint; it is also, this year the first Sunday of Lent, a time when hopefully the daffodils will be starting to show their heads in the garden. All this is a far cry from the snow currently sitting on the vicarage lawn and reports of icy roads and yet more flooding. For those in Victoria, Australia the prob-

lems are at the other end of the extremes - fires are raging out of control and causing huge loss of life. One family interviewed when asked what they were to do having lost their home said, 'we will build it again'. There was in their tone, a certain inevitability about the situation

they were in. In different hemispheres of the world the opposite limits of what nature can do are being experienced at the same time – such is the nature of the world in which we live. Returning to the daffodils, it won't be long before either the winds we usually get in March will blow them across the garden, or the 'April

showers' will flatten them completely. All this may seem a bit vicious but it is all part of the annual cycle; the daffodils wither and die, and return to the earth ready to spring up again next year to face whatever weather 'mother nature' throws at them; we can learn a lot from nature if we try. There is a certain hope and anticipation in the natural cycle of things that we may be able to reflect on during the season of Lent (the five weeks leading up to Easter); we each have our problems as our journey through this life continues. We. like the daffodils, are battered at times by the trials that life throws at us; we are tossed about just as the wind blows the daffodils, and we often feel flattened and forlorn just as the rain beats the daffodils into submission. Christ was beaten, flogged and nailed to a cross. but rose again on that glorious Easter morning. The daffodil flowers will fade and die but they will return renewed and strengthened ready to burst into flower again. Let us, over the coming weeks of Lent encourage one another that we can overcome the trials set before us and we will return, renewed and invigorated.

He told the meeting that the overall council tax increase from the County will be approximately £30 on a band D property and is due to better than expected grants from the government it was able to peg its precept increase at 3.5%. K FITNESS ACHING JOINTS?

Pain in our joints is a very common complaint with rheumatoid arthritis, osteoarthritis, overuse of the joint, injury to the joint and bursitis being some of the causes. Because joint pain can make even everyday tasks painful, the very nature of the ailment can cause people to give up all forms of exercise and yet, exercise is one of the most beneficial things you can do for your overall health - and your joint health - and it's just as important as you get older as it is when you're young (if not more so). A lack of exercise, meanwhile, can cause your joints to become even more painful and stiff. Lower impact exercises are the best for people with achy joints and stretching is particularly effective because it's known to give your joints a better range of motion, may slow the degeneration of your joints, and it helps to relieve pain. Fortunately, there are a wide variety of options out there, so you'll be able to find several that appeal. Try to do some exercise every day, but listen to your body and if your joints feel tired or painful, give yourself an extra day off.

MORE HAPPY MEMORIES - LIZ CUDD

At the ripe old age of 93 my mother informed me that she would like to go on holiday to Jersey, and would I please take her. We flew from Southampton, only a short flight, we were no sooner airborne than we were down at St. Hellier. We had booked an hotel on the main bus route which was very fortuitous because the one place my mother really wanted to go and see was the Glass Church. She had read an article about this Church which was commissioned by Lady Boot, the widow of Sir Jesse Boot, the founder of Boots the Chemist. Lady Boot lived in the South of France and her next door neighbour was the famous glass maker Rene Lalique. An old tin hut, had been transformed into the most marvellous Church, St Matthews, where the altar, cross, screen, and even the panels in the doors, are all made of the thick glass moulded with Jersey lilies, all carefully backlit. A unique and absolutely beautiful place to worship. The rest of the church is very plain, white walls and obviously plain windows and pale wood pews. Such a peaceful place and what a wonderful memorial from a wife to her husband. We spent a happy time admiring the building and were then able to enjoy a cup of coffee before going outside, unfortunately into the rain to jump on the bus and do a little more sight-seeing. The next stop was the wonderful tapestry, well a collage and embroidery really, of the occupation of Jersey by the Germans during the Second World War. Each parish, and there are 7, had stitched a panel, it seemed a very well kept secret as I have not met anyone else who had heard of it, well worth a visit. Last years holiday was somewhat different. Graham and I went on a cruise visiting the countries of Central America, those countries we knew the names of but could not previously have marked them with any accuracy on a map. We stopped at Costa Rica and went for a wonderful walk in the tropical rain forest. At the top of a fair size hill, we were taken to a hotel for a welcome drink. In the grounds of the hotel were large wooden sheds which turned out to be shops set in a semi-circle, and half-way round the circle was the church. From the front it looked quite a traditional

shape, low, painted white, with a window either side of the entrance door. The windows, on inspection, were not stained glass, they were glass with a design painted on, to look like stained glass. Once inside, the pews, although not very regular in size and shape, were made of some polished hardwood, truly beautiful wood. What was amazing were the windows. There weren't any. There were shapes cut out of the wall, but no glass, and no shutters. It was so warm, who would want glass in the windows with the fantastic rain forest to look at. The altar was another surprise, just a plain polished wood table, from the same wood as the pews. In front of the altar was a small stream, flowing through the church from one side to the other, and behind the altar, the back wall of the church, was a very delicate waterfall, with another open space above it and a view of the exotic foliage, birds and butterflies. The guide told us to look for monkeys but we did not see any but we did see toucans. I am always fascinated by the great variety of design of churches and wherever we are we always visit the local church and sometimes manage to sit at the back during a service, we may not understand the language but the meaning is the same.
