May this year also sees the celebration of the Feast of the Ascension (21 May). The Ascension marks the culmination of Christ's ministry here on earth. There will be

Following ten years of conflict, malnourishment and preventable diseases still claim thousands of lives each week. I know that in the present economic climate a lot of people are finding it difficult to make ends meet, but when you see the Christian Aid envelops this year, do spare a thought for the thousands of people around the world who are less well off than we are.

K FITNESS POSTURE POINTERS

Good Posture can make you feel younger, stronger and more confident and can help improve your breathing. Stand in front of a mirror.....What do you see? Someone standing tall and confident or someone who looks much older than you had imagined? Look for any of the following; An elevated hip or shoulder, One side of the body rotating forward or backward, Pelvis and hips tilted, Rounded back, Drooping shoulders or Head jutting forward? Any of these can be indications that your body has poor movement patterns due to one of a number of reasons such as muscle imbalance or compensation for injuries.

It is easy to change poor postural habits and good or bad posture can change a persons looks in a flash so try this;

Stand with your feet slightly apart, feet pointing at 10 to 2 o'clock position... Draw the tummy in and breathe... Lift the lower ribs up from the hips without leaning back... Let the shoulders relax down and outwards... Lift chin to a level position and SMILE. See, you already look better.

NEW IMAGE OF W.I.

In the Daily Mail last Saturday there was a humorous small article near the back from a former Vicar who was working for some reason part time in a shop. This shop sold among a lot of other things, magazines, and wanted to sell 'men's magazines', Initially they were put on one of the lower shelves but, the Vicar's wife saw them and insisted they were put on a high shelf 'or she would have the local WI out with banners, protesting.' This was a light hearted piece, poking gentle fun at the traditional stereo-typed image of the WI. Even the WI meeting in 'Calendar Girls' with the speakers portrayed as not being on the most lively subjects, was another stereotypical image.

However, it may be of interest to non-WI members to know that over the years the WI has been responsible for some very innovative ideas. The 'Keep Britain Tidy campaign was started by the WI', what a pity it seems to have now fallen by the wayside as our streets and towns have never looked dirtier. Fortunately Bill Bryson has taken up this challenge to improve our litter-strewn country and the image we give to visitors.

Last week there was a Worcestershire WI County information day. The morning speaker was on the Resolution to be discussed at the National AGM in June. It was the worrying information that our bees are disappearing and urging the Government to put money into research to try and stop this. There was so much information about bees. Apparently bees not only produce honey, but they play a vital role in plants for food and other crops. pollinating Currently honey bees are coming under threat from pests and diseases for which treatments are not fully understood or effective and many bee keepers have experienced the complete destruction of their hives from such diseases.

The National Bee Unit currently gets £1.3 million a year for research which will be increased by an extra £2.3 million by 2010/11. However the British Bee Keeping Association believes this is not enough and it argues that approximately £165 million is the benefit we get from bees every year to the UK economy.

SISTERS OF BETHANY

When I became an associate member of the Sisters of Bethany, people would ask me what order they belonged to. Many of us have heard of the Benedict monks, who eat in silence whilst listening to a monk read from a book and have the rule of Benedict read daily. Then there are the Franciscans who wear sandals most of the year. Other Orders include the Ignatian, Celtic, Dominican and Carmelites. The Sisters of Bethany follow the Salesian Spirituality. Jesus means we are optimistic of the future On one of my bookmarks is a picture of Francis de Sales and a quotation saying "Do not think that God is further from you when you are in the midst of the busyness which your vocation entails than he would be if you were enjoying a tranquil life" The rules are simple this The Salesian way is a spirituality in working cloths.

PEOPLE PROFILE - JULIA ROUTLEDGE

I was born in Düsseldorf, West Germany, where I lived for 7 years, and "No!" – My parents weren't involved with the military. I then grew up in Sale, Cheshire before we moved again to Rochdale, Lancashire in my teenage years. This was when I first started to really encounter boys as I had previously gone to an All Girls Grammar School, and now was going to a mixed comprehensive. Here I started doing back stage work, painting scenery and making props for the school productions – I love anything to do with art and craft. If I have a spare minute, I enjoy cross-stitch and other forms of embroidery.

Having failed most of my A levels, I went to Merchant Navy College in Brooks Bar, Manchester, graduating as a Radio Officer and Radar Technician. Unfortunately, it was in the days when woman weren't allowed to go to sea, and the coast stations were starting to use remote equipment. Instead I ended up joining the Civil Service, and have been working for them for 29 years. I still travelled around, working in Milton Keynes, Scarborough, Hong Kong, Taunton, Loughborough, and Bedford. I married my husband, David, who is a dairy engineer in 1992 and we moved to Wiveliscombe, Somerset. It was my work that caused us to move to Badsey, just over a year ago – the village being in an ideal location where he could follow me but still keep his job as he is based out of Lutterworth, Leicestershire.

I have always been involved in Guiding, both as a girl and a leader. It has allowed me to settle down quickly where ever I move to, but it has also given me loads of opportunities to share my skills as well as providing me with lots of challenges. Some of the projects I have been involved in are: setting up a Brownie Unit in an SOS village in South Africa, working with Vietnamese boat children, building houses in Mexico, helping to resurrect the Guiding and Scouting movement in Czechoslovakia after the Velvet Revolution, working with families with leprosy or who had been in prison in India and working with the Suzanne Murbarak Peace Foundation in Egypt, plus the odd camp or pack holiday in the UK or overseas. Dave says that I can probably cook better on an open fire, than I can in a kitchen on gas or electric. I love camping, walking and anything to do with the out-of-doors. At the moment, I am getting to know the county by taking part in the Trefoil Guild centenary challenge to visit 100 places in Worcestershire. I am also Eagle Owl – one of the assistant Guiders with 1st Badsey Brownies, plus a member of Evesham Scout Fellowship. (See front page for photos of Julia)
