

As an elected member of the Diocesan Board for Mission I was invited recently to attend an evening celebration of Africa and the diocese's links with that country held at Bishop Perone School in Worcester. The school is twinned with Rondo Junior School in Tanzania as part of a government sponsored link through 'Global School Partnerships'. Funding is available to help teachers and pupils to be actively involved at secondary level in exchanges and at primary level there is financial encouragement too. The aim of this link and ones like it, be they school, church or other organisation; is to link people together, to offer a chance for first hand experiences and to enhance our understanding of each other's Partnerships particularly believes in trying to link "the majority world" with those in the "minority world" in the hope that both can learn a lot from each other. From a Christian perspective I hope and know these links lead to friendships, greater understanding and hopefully may also promote peace, encourage us to be more

willing to offer sympathetic help (better targeted aid, advice, education), or to campaign for justice and a more equal world through Fairtrade for example.

The joy of the people of Africa was felt by all who attended; as the teachers from the Tanzanian School danced and sang to African rhythms; music being provided by enthusiastic drummers from both Tanzania and Bishop Perone's own pupils. As a backdrop to the dancing, photos of the African School and the surrounding area were projected. The school pictured here is so much more basic than any in this county. The religious service was in English and Swahili. The Bishop of Worcester spoke of his experience of the joy of Africa and also of the pain of Africa. He gave thanks "for the fruit of these links" and explained "that we were all richer under God for them". He was accompanied by Bishop Jonathan from Malawi; who is visiting as part of a diocesan link.

Dear All,

I am sure that you are not the least bit interested in the leaves on my lawn that I mentioned last month in my letter - but for those who eagerly await the news - they are still on the lawn and now soaking wet

and I suspect that is where they will remain as my thoughts now start to head towards Christmas.

I am not sure how many people still make their own Christmas puddings and Christmas cake, but I am pleased to say that we still do and that they are both done and maturing nicely (only the mince meat to go !!). The recipe we use for the Christmas puddings is a bit of a combination from cook books and made up over the years, and the amount of ingredients used often changes a bit to what 'looks about right'. essentially suet, bread crumbs, nutmeg, mixed spice, cinnamon, brown sugar, sultanas, raisins, currents, mixed peel, apples, almonds, barley wine and stout, with flour and eggs to bind it all together (I think we missed the barley wine out this year and added extra stout instead - it is never good to get too set in your ways). By now perhaps you are wondering if the vicar has lost his marbles completely and what all this has got to do with a Christmas letter.

TOWER NEWS

Nearly Christmas, where has time gone This time last year I was in hospital just waiting for the days to go by, they were so slow!! At the beginning of November when I am writing this there is little to say other than we hope to repeat the usual round of Christmas ringing and wish everyone a lovely time. If there is any special ringing taking place, a notice will be pinned to the church door at the time.

Another question asked is, why does someone call - bob or single - this is to alert the ringers that a change in the order of the bells is about to take place, requiring them to act accordingly. Depending on what the Conductor calls and where the bells are within the method, this enables the method to be shortened or lengthened. With the aid of these calls, the required amount of changes for a Quarter peal and Full peal are made. When you hear, for instance 6 to 7, 2 to 3, 4 to 5 and so on and so forth, Bobs and singles are not used or required. The Conductor is calling the bells to change places. Known as Called Changes.

ARTHUR "BADSEY" DAVIES - CORN DOLLY MAKER

Does anyone remember someone called Arthur Davies, who was well-known for making corn dollies? This was the question posed to The Badsey Society by Mandy Davies (no relation), who you may know as the Lady Thatcher. She told us that in a WI Home Skills' Guide (published 1979), the following was written about him: "Arthur 'Badsey' Davies, so called because he came from Badsey in Worcestershire, was a great master of the group linked plait. He used to demonstrate this plait with 49 straws, which was no mean achievement. He copied his father making straw plaits and taught the skill to his son and grandchildren. An example of this design can be found in the Museum of Rural Life in Reading." But the question is, who was he? As far as we know, the only person to have lived in Badsev with the name of Arthur Davies was Arthur Edward Davies, who came to Badsey in 1955 with his wife, Jane, and daughter, Rosalind. Long-term residents of Badsey will have known Rosalind Davies as "Nurse Davies" who was district nurse, health visitor and midwife for many years; she died in February 2007, aged 93. Arthur Davies died in 1960. For those of you who knew Rosalind Davies, do you recall if she ever mentioned her father being a master corn dolly maker? Or was there another Arthur Davies who lived in Badsey?

Thanks to a new law that came into force in 2008 the requirements to get married in church have been relaxed.

If you live in parish you have always been entitled to be married in the Parish Church and this is still the case. However the new law allows you to be married in the Parish Church if can 'tick' any **one** of the following boxes.

One of the couple have

- been Baptised or prepared for confirmation in the parish concerned
- at any time lived in the parish for a period of at least 6 months
- at any time regularly gone to normal church services in the parish church for a period of at least 6 months

Or one of the couples parents have

- at any time lived in the parish for a period of at least 6 months
- at any time regularly gone to normal church services in the parish church for a period of at least 6 months

Or one of the couples parents or grandparents was

Married in the church

PEOPLE PROFILE - ELOISE HARRIS

Eloise Harris is three-years-old and in May she was diagnosed with a Wilms tumour.

Following discussions between oncologists, radiotherapists, radiologists, pathologists and the consultant paediatric surgeon, Mr. Suran Arul, at Birmingham Children's Hospital, a date was set for surgery in June.

Mention 'surgery' to people and it arouses all sorts of different thoughts and emotions, mention it to a family with a child suffering from cancer and it will often sum up all their hopes and fears for the future in a single word. Even though the parents know full well that it is only one of many hurdles in the complex journey necessary for the treatment of childhood cancer there is something very deeply emotive about surgery that almost sets it apart in people's minds.

Four weeks prior to the operation Eloise received chemotherapy in an attempt to shrink the tumour down. Cancer surgery can't be rushed. It is a slow meticulous process of separating the diseased kidney from the surrounding tissues.

After four hours the parents get the call they have waited for all day, and all of a sudden a sleepy but pain-free Eloise is having a cuddle with her Mummy in the anaesthetic room.

The night after surgery everything may seem very calm but there is a hive of activity in the background that



most people are unaware of, with nurses and doctors monitoring pulse, breathing, and blood pressure. They may be trying to keep everything nice and stable but Eloise is having none of this, she can't see what all the fuss is about and has already pulled out her nasogastric tube and is demanding a drink. The great thing about children is that they haven't yet learnt to feel sorry for themselves so they just see the various tubes and monitors as irritations that stop them from playing. Within a day Eloise was up and drawing pictures, and preparing to going home.
