2 LETTER FOR THE MONTH



Dear All,

I was reading an article the other day about the decline in the British butterfly population. There are 71 species that have bee regarded as British butterflies since 1634; of these eight are rare very rare and five have over recent years

become extinct. One success is the re-introduction of the Adonis Blue, which is now growing in numbers; the other species unfortunately are all declining. The reason for this decline appears to be man-made. At one time there were many forests and woodlands which on the whole managed themselves; trees would die and fall down creating a clearing which would encourage butterflies and other insects to thrive. With so many of these habitats disappearing, those that remain need careful management; if places are left to become overgrown it creates too much shade for insects and the like to flourish. With careful management the Adonis Blue in one area has grown in number by some 60% while the White Admiral is in decline by 62%. Many people think that conservation is all about planting trees, and there has been, rightly, an upsurge in the planting of trees to replace those lost and also to off-set the amount of carbon we burn. The devastation caused in the Gulf

of Mexico by the oil leak is another example of what can go wrong if we do not carefully manage our use of the earth's resources. Conservation however is more than just planting, at times trees need to be cut down, and woodlands need to be coppiced to allow light in and the number of butterflies and insects are often pointers to the ecological balance of that place. We inhabit the earth, often without a second thought for the creatures we share it with; we use the earth's resources as though they were inexhaustible. It can be the same in our own lives, if we continually try to do more and more and expect more and more from other people we will only exhaust ourselves and loose the goodwill of those who support us. At times we need to do some drastic pruning in our own lives. We need to look at what is really essential - there is a great difference between what we want and what we need. Just as the butterflies can be a pointer to the well being of a woodland, we need to look for the pointers that tell us about the sustainability of our own life styles. In the gospel of Luke Jesus talks about being the vine and God being the gardener, the good fruit is a symbol of a godly life and at times there needs to be a good punning so that the good fruit will grow. Perhaps we all need to look at what needs a good hard punning in our own lives. Kichard



Christian Aid Week is a very important time in our year. But we want support all year round and here are some very summery ways to support us this year!

- Its summer, so organise a barbeque! Ask each person you invite to contribute towards the cause. Pay all running costs of the event yourself, so people know their money is going straight to the cause itself.
- We might be out of the world cup, but don't give up on football yet. See if you can organise a small tournament of 5-a-side football. Charge a small amount to take part and to watch. To make extra money, sell homemade or bought refreshments to the crowd.
- The fallback of any fundraiser is the coffee morning, but there is no reason why it cannot be fun. Have a decorate your own cake stall, and maybe some games for kids, along with some more sophisticated drinks and cakes for the adults. Make the cakes yourself for extra fun.
- This one is slightly different, but it is still very good fun. Give a few people a smarties tube and ask them to fill it with spare change by the end of the week. That way they get chocolate and you get money! Everyone's happy.
- Be creative. Make accessories, toys, cards or even clothes out of waste material like bin bags, or scrap material, and sell them to people as novelty items. If you are making clothes, you could hold a catwalk.

The money you raise will go to help people who really need it. One of our main partners in Brazil, Koinonia is working to help train people in HIV awareness so that they can reach others with the message. They mainly work with religious leaders because the community respects them. So far, 200 leaders have been trained and they are reaching out to 20,000 followers about the need for tolerance and safety. However, they are not just preaching. Pai Alessandro keeps a store cupboard full of condoms, to give to those who need them. This and other practical tasks are important in helping those in most danger.


