- they appeared to prefer the 'sanitised' version of Easter with daffodils, cute bunny rabbits and Easter Eggs. In one way I can understand that, but until we accept the fact that Christ was brutally beaten and flogged before being crucified by being nailed to a cross (a common form of execution at the time for criminals) we cannot hope to understand the pain and suffering which Christ endured on our behalf. We all have 'Good Friday experiences' in our own lives, times of darkness, sadness and sometimes depression more often than not it can be connected with the breakdown of a relationship. loss of home or employment, or the death of a loved one. It can be as a result of such experiences and in the pain and anguish of the moment that we sometimes glimpse something of the love that God has for us; it is that love which we celebrate on Easter Day. It is only after we have gone through the pain of Good Friday that we can really celebrate Easter and enjoy the chocolate Easter

May I wish you all a Happy and Blessed Easter.

CHERNOBYL PROJECT

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

As many of you will remember, in 1986 a nuclear reactor at Chernobyl melted down, releasing radiation for hundreds of miles around. In some places radiation levels are still 100 times above normal contaminating the air and everything that grows. Imagine living in an area such as Minsk where everything you eat is likely to be contaminated and every child born is at high risk of various radiation cancers, or illnesses which are life threatening because those born have very low immunity. Every year the Chernobyl project brings mothers and children from affected areas in Belarus to the U K for two to three weeks holiday away from the contamination .All the children have cancer or are in remission from it; the time spent in an uncontaminated environment is believed to boost their immune systems considerably.

The Evesham Group brings over 5 mothers and their children between 4 and 8 years old to stay with local families or individuals in surrounding villages.

For the last 2 years some of the group have each hosted a mother and her child, this being a very rewarding experience. We organize a daily programme of activities. which includes West Midland Safari Park, Hatton Country Park and Evesham Park.

Hosts commit themselves to providing accommodation. breakfast, packed lunches and evening meals.

People willing to give hosts a hand may invite the guests to an evening meal or occasionally provide help with transport.

Hosts and helpers are urgently needed between the dates of 11th July and 1st of August for from 7 to 10 days; exact dates are not yet known. If anyone is interested in hosting or helping, even if only for one or two days, I would be delighted to hear from them and provide more detailed information





BADSEY SOCIETY CENSUS WALKS

As our thoughts turn to completing the 2011 census, information about who lived in our village in 1911 has now been made available on the Badsey website (www.badsey.net) – and, for the first time, we are also including records from Wickhamford. The official "golive" date is Friday 25th March. Huge thanks to the 24 people who took part in the transcription project. To complement the census launch, an exhibition is being held in the churchyard on Saturday 26th March and short census walks will take place (26/3/11 - 11 am and 2.30, meet at Badsey Church door; 27/3/11 – 10.30, Aldington, meet Main Street by Lokos sign; 2.30, Wickhamford, meet by church).

In addition, we are providing a transcription of the 1910 Valuation Survey. Between the years 1910 and 1915, a comprehensive survey of land ownership in England and Wales was undertaken, the like of which had not been seen since the Domesday Book of 1086. The reason for this comprehensive mapping and valuation exercise was because of concerns about unequal ownership of land. Thanks to a team of willing local volunteers we are able to provide you with information about every piece of land and every building in Badsey, Aldington and Wickhamford 100 years ago.

BISHOP'S DAVID LETTER FOR EASTER

In my days as a young vicar, a senior colleague asked me a direct and tricky question. "Suppose", he said, "that the pub on the High Street were to be turned into a lap-dancing establishment, would you want to protest outside with a placard, or go in and offer yourself as Chaplain?" Fortunately it was a purely hypothetical question, but it came back to me recently as I listened to a presentation on ethical investment.

The Church of England, through the Church Commissioners and the Pensions Board, invests money in a range of shares and assets. Like any other shareholder both bodies want the best return for their investment. But they do want that investment to aid and support the mission of the Church, not to undermine it. The church institutions have long refused to invest in companies producing certain types of armaments, and in those that derive significant incomes from tobacco, alcohol, doorstep lending, or "adult" entertainment.

Refusing to hold stocks in certain parts of the market is a vital part of being an ethical investor. But on its own it's a pretty blunt weapon. It can feel a bit like Pontius Pilate - washing our hands of the evil going on, but doing nothing to stop it.

So alongside disinvestment an even more important aspect of how the church institutions use their capital wisely is the practice of constructive and active engagement with companies. A big shareholder can ask awkward questions, and can challenge directors over their policies and practices. Does this company take its

environmental responsibilities seriously? Does that one treat its workforce with dignity? Whilst disinvestment allows us to feel morally superior, constructive engagement gives us a chance of actually making a difference or persuading someone to change.

And that takes us back to the heart of what living a Christian life is all about. All too often we set ourselves up as people who don't do certain things - usually things that wider society considers not to be a problem. All too rarely are we seen as people constructively engaged in making the world around us a better place. The irony is that we claim to follow a man who was never criticised for staying aloof and apart but was regularly challenged for spending time with disreputable company, challenging them through his constructive engagement to become what God had created them to be.

Twenty five years ago I ducked the question my colleague asked me, but maybe a better response, then and now, would be to say "I'd be with Jesus".

Saturday morning for breakfast we had German food to eat. 9-30 Saturday morning we all went home we also had juice and water to drink we all slept in our own sleeping bag.


The sleep over was in Norton Village Hall. We slept in the hall.

Affordable Housing Update:

Banks Road - Rooftop is still pursuing this site and continuing negotiations with the vendor's agent. Manor Close - Planning permission secured. Homes and Communities Agency capital grant funding has been approved. Rooftop has possession of site and will handover site to the Contractor at the end of January 2011. Rooftop will be contacting the neighbouring residents of the site to inform them of the impending works which will be taking place shortly.

Doctors' Surgery:

District Councillor Reg Jakeman indicated that he was exploring the possibility of a Doctors' surgery in Badsey. The Parish Council will be discussing this on 16th March.

Road Surfacing Update

Resurfacing of the B4035 Bretforton Road is one of the items on the Worcestershire County Council Highway's maintenance budget for 2011-12 and resurfacing/patching works are also scheduled for Village Street, Aldington and the Willersey Road under the Rural Roads initiative. An update will be provided as and when further information becomes available.
