In addition, the show will be officially opened at 2.00 pm by popular local entertainer The Rev. Elvis – Andy Kelso. Andy Kelso is Chaplain to Worcester Warriors Rugby Club and also performs an Elvis Presley tribute act complete with 1970s Las Vegas costumes.



ELVIS LIVES?

On May 7th it was a privilege to listen to Andy Kelso pay tribute to the music of Elvis Presley at Badsey Remembrance Hall. The hall was full as Andy sang a full selection of Elvis' hits and many of his gospel numbers.

Throughout Presley's life, gospel music was the constant element of solace to man who was burning the candle at both ends in the fast lane of international celebrity. The only Grammy Awards that Elvis earned were with his gospel records. To many fans, he is as well known for "How Great Thou Art" as he is for "Blue Suede Shoes."

Andy related that on the day before Presley died, Rick Stanley, Elvis' stepbrother, told Elvis that a friend of his was telling him about Jesus and how she was praying for him. "Elvis Presley, at 42 years old, looked at me and said, 'Ricky, she's telling you the truth.' Then he said, 'People who talk to you about Jesus really care.' I talked with Elvis for a while ... then left to run an errand." When Rick returned to Graceland, Elvis was dead.

On the night of his death, Elvis prayed, "Dear Lord, please show me a way. I'm tired and confused, and I need your help." A few minutes later, he looked at Stanley and said, "Rick, we should all begin to live for Christ." On the previous day, Stanley heard Elvis praying, "God, forgive me for my sins. Let., people... have compassion and understanding of the things I have done."

When he died, Elvis had 14 different drugs active in his system. Presley was tempted and was not able to resist the lures of the flesh. Throughout his career, Elvis did seek God, but sadly sometimes that journey led him into more confusion, but he hungered to know God and experience his love. He prayed with contrition.

There are plenty of lessons to be gleaned from Elvis's tragic life but they should be absorbed through the prism of sorrow and grace. God only knows whether Elvis truly repented and asked for God's mercy with his dying breath. If that is the case then we can truly say "Elvis Lives", for the promise of God is that if one should truly repents and ask for forgiveness we can live in "Grace Land".

Jesus says in John 14 vs 1 "In my Father's house are many mansions; if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you".

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

YOUR NEW COUNCIL TAKES OFFICE

All newly elected and co-opted Councillors have now signed their Declarations of Acceptance and taken office. At the Annual Parish Council meeting Mary Campbell was re-elected as Chairman with Ian Browning as Vice-Chairman and David Badham as Chairman of the Planning Committee. The full list of Parish Councillors is: David Pat McKevitt, Terri Penny, Daisy Richardson, Pete Smith and Margaret Tyszkow. By the time you read this contact details for all Councillors will be on the main noticeboard and the Blackminster and Aldington noticeboards as well as on the 'My Parish' website.

A FAREWELL

New councillors taking office inevitably means saying farewell to others who have voluntarily given of their time, local knowledge and professional expertise to help run the Parish for the benefit of its residents and businesses. The Parish owes a huge thank you therefore to Terry Sparrow, Bob James, Martin Bent, Sindie Sinclair and Kelvin Hughes, who have all been Councillors for many years, and to Emma Tennant and Arthur Southern. It is hoped that the Parish will continue to benefit from their wealth of experience and that they will all continue to play a part in Parish affairs in the years to come.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT TO ANNUAL MEETING

In her speech at the Annual Parish Meeting on 18th May 2011 the Chairman of the Council (Mary Campbell) referred to the Council's ordinary every day activities, such as street lighting, and its more unusual activities, such as dealing with the bus shelter being used as a toilet, as well as to the main project of the last 12 months: the refurbishment of the play area on the Recreation Ground at Sands Lane, which had been a great success. She recognised that some residents had thought the costs of this were high but stressed that the majority of the funds had come from the Badsey Fields Lane housing development and that these could only be accessed for specific types of project. She also mentioned that similar

funds may become available as a result of the proposed development off Brewers Lane and that the Council would be open to suggestions for how these might be used, although again under the present planning rules there are restrictions on the type of project.

The Chairman also referred to the importance of developing a Parish Plan so that a forward looking policy Badham, Ian Browning, Mary Campbell, Elizabeth Cudd, for Badsey, including housing, business and recreational Peter Grinnall, George Hillier, David Jack, Valerie Magan, development, roads and traffic issues and future projects as the replacement/improvement of Remembrance Hall (something on Remembrance Hall Committee is already at work) can be brought together in a coherent plan to which all residents and business owners within the Parish can contribute. The Chairman also took the opportunity to thank the Clerk, Alex Owen, for her work and to mention the 'My Parish' pages on the Worcestershire County Council website where all minutes and agendas are available for view.

PLANNING CHAIRMAN'S REPORT TO THE ANNUAL MEETING

The Chairman of the Planning Committee, David Badham, also addressed the meeting. The Chairman explained that the principle objectives of the Council having a formal Planning Committee were to ensure that there was an open and transparent process and a forum where the public could express their observations on and concerns about planning matters. Having dealt with the form of the Committee the Chairman went on to outline the types of applications which the Council had to consider and his responsibilities within the Committee. Councillor Badham expressed the view that 2011 will be a challenging year for the Parish Council Planning Committee because of proposed changes in Government planning rules and regulations but that he had confidence that the Council would be able to meet these challenges.



CARER TALKTIME

Volunteer from your home with Carer Talktime

If you like chatting to people on the phone and have spare time you could make a difference to a carer's life with just a friendly phone call once a month from the comfort of your own home.

Carers are people who provide unpaid support to relatives or friends who due to illness, disability, age or addiction could not manage on their own. Being a carer is often difficult, stressful and isolating.

Carer Talktime is our friendly, informal telephone support service for carers. All we ask our volunteers to do is talk with and listen to carers once a month at a time to suit them. Experience in caring themselves would be useful, but is not essential. Volunteers will receive training to learn about carers and their lives, as well as telephone skills. There will be regular meetings with other befrienders and support from the volunteer co-ordinator.

There is no cost to the volunteer for the calls other than their time.

THE THREE CHOIRS FESTIVAL

The Three Choirs Festival is the world's oldest classical choral festival, rotating annually between the cities of Hereford, Gloucester and Worcester.

It is the turn of Worcester to host the festival this year from 06 to 13. August. The Philharmonia Orchestra, based in London, will be the orchestra in residence for the festival week. 62 events will take place in 16 venues around the City and County supported by a further 40 or more free and ticketed events organized by the annual Worcester Festival who act as our fringe. The City of Worcester will be transformed for festival week into a musical and cultural meccal. The finale is a 'Night at the Opera', with Sir Thomas Allen, a rousing climax to the musical week.
