Around 80 people attended Badsey First School on Saturday 21 May for the launch of The Badsey Society's fourth publication, "Digging for a Living: Market Gardening in Badsey and Aldington" by Terry Sparrow. Mike Lovatt, Chairman of the Society, welcomed guests to the event and



commented that it seemed amazing that a village society such as ours should have achieved so much in nine years. He then handed over to Terry who gave a brief talk about the market gardening industry. The guest speaker for the evening was Professor Nick Evans, Professor of Rural Geography at The University of Worcester, who gave an illuminating talk entitled, 'Lessons for the Future Whilst Thinking About the Past". He invited us to consider whether

market gardening was sustainable and whether it was likely to make a comeback and made reference to specific chapters in Terry's book



which he felt provided some of the answers. The full text of both the speeches, together with a number of photos, are on Badsey website, the www.badsey.net. As I said these are some of the questions that are asked by each generation and more often than not asked several times by each generation. If you are now expecting to find an answer to these questions in the text of this letter I am afraid that you are going to be disappointed because there is no simple single answer to give — which is why the questions are continually asked!

Although I cannot give a definitive answer it is worth noting that the Church is still asking these questions and at times agonising over the answers – or lack of answers, that are forthcoming. It was only a couple of weeks ago

that these questions came up again in one of our Sunday It was a question raised by the Prophet Habakkuk, who (whether or not you are a regular member of the congregation) I am sure most people will not have heard of. Habakkuk was a Prophet around the year 600 BC and remonstrated with God that the ways of God seem to be unfathomable and even unjust. Habakkuk was puzzled and confused that wickedness and strife and oppression were rampant at the time; with God, seemingly doing nothing about it. I am sure that many people today would share that view of the modern world. Habakkuk's first complaint with God was why does evil go unpunished? God's reply left him feeling all the more upset because it appeared that one corrupt nation was to exact revenge on another seemingly less corrupt nation. To cut a long story short the answer is that the unjust will get what they deserve - but it will be in God's time and not ours. No matter how much we feel that the unjust are not being punished, it is not our job to hand out the punishment; that is God's business, not ours.

This was followed by a short but moving service in All Saints church led by Penny and Gudrun where a beautiful cross was displayed on the altar by a member of All Saints for the occasion. When the service ended we walked around the church looking for various roof bosses, including the green man, while Gudrun gave an impromptu medley of hymns on the church organ. As lunchtime approached we made our way to the Trumpet Inn for a traditional English meal. Afterwards, we visited the Almonry Museum and had a relaxing boat trip along the Avon. The day ended with a barbeque at the vicarage and the chance to look at photographs of past visits. Sunday started with a church service then guests set off to explore the area at their leisure with many going to the Cotswolds to see the 'geldt' stone. Others enjoyed a tour of Bill Bird's factory where they learned about the techniques which Bill used to make his wonderful shoes, and a short history of the site. Later that afternoon, hosts shared a meal with their guests before ending the evening at the Wheatsheaf. Monday arrived and hosts and guests made their way to the vicarage to say farewell. It had been a wonderful weekend where new friendships had been made and old ones consolidated. We look forward to the next time. Thank you to all who organised, hosted and generally helped. BISHOP JOHN'S LETTER

The fact that this year is the 400th anniversary of the publication of the 'Authorised' or 'King James Version' of the Bible has been well publicised. And rightly so. No book has had more effect on our culture. It changed the way we think and speak. The King James Bible is not just a literary masterpiece, though, it is the Word of God. For the Old Testament writers, the word of God is both a word and an action. God's words actually do something. The first mention of God speaking in the Bible comes right at the beginning of the Book of Genesis 'Then God said "Let there be light" and there was light. So God spoke and a universe came into being. As the psalmist put it 'By the word of the Lord were the heavens made; he spoke and it came to be.' The Word of the Lord still does remarkable things. Robert Hicks was born tongue-tied and dyslexic. He was abandoned by his mother, beaten by his father and spent his childhood in and out of children's homes. He left school illiterate and worked as an errand boy for a local grocery shop where one of the staff, an ex-nurse, realised that he was physically tongue-tied. He had an operation, after which the surgeon recommended that he should copy words out from a book and practise reading them as he did so. The only book he could find was a battered King James Bible so he used that. For two years he copied and read it, slowly and painfully, and it was an exercise that changed his life. He found faith and a new determination to succeed. He joined a rising new company called Tesco, then became marketing director for the Co-op and opened the first hypermarket. Later he took over Scripture Union and within a year turned it around. He is best known for founding Back to Church Sunday. He was once interviewed by Esther Rantzen who said afterwards: 'During all the years I've spent making programmes I've been particularly interested in the stories of people who've had very tough childhoods ..., of all these stories the most inspirational was the story of Robert Hicks.'

The Word of God changes lives. I pray that it will go on changing mine, and yours, and many, many others.



TOWER NEWS


If for any reason you do not hear the bells when expected, it usually means we do not have enough ringers. Holidays can play havoc with the best oiled machines. Looking at past August activities,

On Sunday 03 July I was privileged to be in the congregation at Worcester Cathedral watching Anne Potter and eight others from the diocese of Worcester being ordained. As you can see from the photographs taken after the service it was an extremely joyful occasion, the culmination of over 2 years of hard study.

The congregation of around 1000 people were made up of the family and friends and supporters from the parishes in which those being ordained will serve as Assistant Curates.

The clergy processed in their finest robes, the great organ resounded grandly and the Cathedral Choir sang beautiful motets in Latin.

The Bishop of Worcester presided and was assisted by the Bishop of Dudley, and the Revd Canon Alison White, Adviser for Spirituality and Spiritual Direction in the diocese of Newcastle, preached.

The candidates were each presented by their Archdeacons and had to swear an oath. They were blessed by the Bishops.

We all took Holy Communion, at the end of which each new Deacon received a New Testament from the Bishop of Dudley "as a sign of the authority given you this day". The Bishop of Worcester led the newly ordained in

procession out of the Cathedral's grand west door into the sunlight of the Cathedral gardens for formal and informal photographs.

As Anne's supporters we rushed to congratulate her and to see her for the first time with her new clerical (dog) collar on. We returned to Offenham Royal British Legion for a lunchtime buffet party to celebrate.

The Revd Richard Court gave a speech welcoming Revd Anne to the benefice of Offenham, Badsey and Bretforton as its Assistant Curate and Anne's husband spoke of how proud he and their family were and how he was itching to try out this phrase on his wife "More tea Vicar!"
