Rated as one of Wales finest, we have had the pleasure in hearing this fine choir in previous years and we are delighted to welcome them back. The choir is very much in demand both at small venues like our own, concerts abroad, recordings and singing at large venues. On 14th October 2013 they were invited to sing at the unveiling of the memorial site in Senghenydd. For days the ex-mining village had been the centre of the news, both locally and nationally. The television cameras, the news reporters were all there recording this most wonderful event, bringing Senghenydd to the world. The hills around the site were covered by up to two thousand people, paying their respects to those 439 men and boys killed in the explosion exactly 100 years ago to the day. It has exceeded 1100 performances since its formation, averaging over 25 per year during the last 15 years.

Already, with engagements filling the next twelve months, the 55-strong ensemble is looking forward with great anticipation to many more years of travelling, entertaining audiences, renewing and building friendships, both here and abroad, and continuing as true ambassadors for Wales and its strong tradition of

Welsh male voice singing.

2 Letter For The Month

from The Revd Richard Court



Dear All,

Anne wrote last month about our Lent course which raises questions such as does God exist; is there any evidence for a God who loves us; and is it normal for Christians

to have doubts? By the time you read this we will have discussed these issues (and probably others that arise from them), be most of the way through Lent and looking forward to celebrating Easter Day.

However, in the church's calendar we have to finish the austere period of Lent; celebrate Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday; then endure Holy Week (the week leading up to Easter) when we recall the agony of Christ's trial and finally his crucifixion on Good Friday before we can celebrate Easter Day. Details of our services for Holy Week can be found elsewhere in the magazine.

It is strange how fickle people are; just to remind you of the story of Palm Sunday, Jesus entered Jerusalem to crowds of people heralding his arrival with shouts of support and excitement, only days later the same people (egged on by one or two key people) were shouting to have him crucified as a common criminal; isn't it

strange how quickly people can change sides. The result was that Jesus was beaten, spat upon, whipped, mocked and then nailed to a cross and left to die one of the most barbaric forms of death imaginable. This may all sound a bit gruesome for the Parish Magazine, but it is the reality of the situation and something we cannot forget; without the suffering and death on the cross there can be no resurrection, you can't have Easter Day without first having Good Friday!

Without wishing to pre-empt the answers to the Lent Course questions – yes this does lead to questions about the existence of God and yes it is normal for Christians to have doubts, in fact it is healthy for Christians to admit to having doubts at times and to discuss them.

Having lived through the doubts and questions, once Easter arrives, the joy of Easter Day reflects the love that God has for us all, it affirms that love is the most powerful force in the world that outlasts and overcomes all evil, bitterness and hatred.

I wish you a happy Easter and may God's love be with vou all. Richard



What is so good about middle schools?

Before I moved into this area 17 years ago, I had never come across the three tier education system. As a child, I left my small primary school with 150 pupils on roll aged just 11 and was launched into a huge comprehensive school in Middlesbrough with over 1600 pupils. I didn't think about it much at the time because it was the 'norm' but I didn't cope well in school and was bullied unmercifully during the first two years by, as it was then, some unpleasant 5th formers (Y11 these days).

I only trained to be a teacher 12 years ago so I didn't know much about the 'Ed Biz' when my eldest daughter started at Blackminster Middle School at the age of 10 back in 1997 and I didn't know what to expect. Initially, perhaps after my own experience, I was concerned about how a Y6 pupil like my daughter would cope with a secondary set up where children move from teacher to teacher in different classrooms to be taught different subjects.

I needn't have worried: Blackminster was and still is a really nurturing environment for younger pupils while giving them a more 'grown up' experience of learning. With specialist facilities like the two fully equipped science laboratories, design technology and food technology areas, along with subject experts including maths and English specialists, pupils can have an enhanced secondary experience a whole year earlier than in the two tier system. The fact that we don't have to teach KS4 or 5 and deal with terminal examinations means our best teachers are not tied up with examination classes and teaching A level students. I know, as the former time-tabler at a secondary school that examination classes have to be staffed first and that can sometimes mean split classes in the lower school as you solve the staffing puzzle with the teachers you have left over.

The relative small size of the school means that the pastoral care can be highly personalised: we really do know our students, which helps them to feel safe and protected as they are go through adolescence. We are well placed to support them in making excellent progress as they move into those crucial years of key stage 3, providing a solid foundation for GCSEs.

I have been privileged to work in three local middle schools and know first-hand how well they serve their students. People worry that outcomes at the end of key stage 4 (GCSEs) are not as good in the three tier system but that isn't true. In Worcestershire, the percentage of GCSEs at grade C or above, including maths and English is above the National average anyway for the two and three tier systems. The three tier system schools actually performed slightly better than the two tier in terms of percentage GCSEs at grade C+ including English and Maths last year and this is a reflection of the hard work and commitment of all the teachers involved in the learning journey.

As Headteacher of a Middle School you might expect me to be biased, however, I have worked in conventional secondary schools also and recognise the strengths of both. I am not trying to promote one system over the other but I think we should cherish what we have in Evesham which is two pyramids consisting of good and outstanding schools. We are unique in Evesham in that our middle schools are the only schools in Worcestershire which have children from Y6 to Y8. The system works here and it works well. Please come and visit us here at Blackminster to see for yourself.

Tony Jerram Award

Despite the stormy weather, 50 members of The Badsey Society turned up for the 12th Annual General Meeting on Friday evening. Maureen Spinks was re-elected Chairman, Valerie Magan was re-elected Secretary and Tony Wood was re-elected Treasurer.

After the business part of the meeting, the annual Tony Jerram Award presentation was made. The award is given each year in memory of the late Tony Jerram (1937-2008), the first Chairman of The Badsey Society, and is awarded to somebody who the members feel has contributed to the good of the local community. This year's winner was Terry Sparrow whose contribution to village life has been enormous. Terry is a founder member of The Badsey Society, serving as Treasurer for ten years and Chairman for two years; for 52 years he was responsible for winding the church clock; he has written four books, including A Brief History of Badsey and Aldington and Digging for a Living; he continues to give talks on market gardening. He has also been on countless other committees too numerous to list and has been an active player in village activities. Mrs Barbara Jerram presented the trophy to Terry who responded by saying that he was extremely honoured to accept the award as Tony Jerram had been a personal friend for whom he had much respect.

Jane Neill, Archives Manager, then presented Barbara with an orchid as a thank you for allowing her attic to be a temporary home for The Badsey Society archive which will shortly be moving to the Remembrance Hall.

Following coffee and biscuits, four Committee members gave illustrated talks: Will Dallimore spoke about the history of the parish magazine, Gill Woods described what Badsev would have been like in 1914. Ian Gibson talked about the origins of asparagus and Valerie Magan reported on the coming of the wireless to Badsey.
