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Thought For The Month From

Revd. Fr. Philip Morton

Dear friends

Last month I did something for the first time, that I have never done before: I wrote a letter to a newspaper. I'm not sure why I've never done this before, perhaps I've never encountered an appropriate occasion before, but this was different. I'm sure you've all heard now about the reports of the Blessing of the Asparagus at Worcester Cathedral, and the subsequent criticism that came from various Anglican on-line bloggers and commentators, and even vicars from other parishes around the country. Some of the comments were unnecessary, in my view, and failed to understand the context of the Asparagus Festival – just why it is so important to the people of this area. I didn't mean to the write to the papers – I actually just wrote to Canon Michael at the Cathedral because I thought he might like some support from the Vale as the reports came in. But things snowballed from there, as they often do, and my comments ended up in the Telegraph.

Since then I've thought quite a lot about how I think Christian ministry really finds its true meaning in local communities. There is a very good reason why the Church of England has decided to retain the parish model of ministry, rather than do what a lot of other churches have done and have large churches in population centres which people then travel to. The Church of England has decided to keep this ideal of having a presence in almost every community. There are problems with this model - we can sometimes find ourselves struggling to maintain all our buildings - but the fact that there is a church in nearly every community in this country means that the message of the Gospel really is here for everyone.

Another result of this local model is that the issues that matter to a particular community, the memories and customs, the traditions and values, are part of the church's life in that area too. The Asparagus Festival is one example among many within this benefice alone. The Church of England has decided to keep the parish model not just because of nostalgic or heritage reasons either – there are good theological reasons for doing this too.

During His earthly ministry Jesus did not spend much time with the academics and religious elite of His day. Yes, He taught in the Temple occasionally and there are a few stories of Him sharing a meal with Pharisees, but mostly He spent His time out on the country roads, or in the market places, or down by the lakes with the fishing boats. He taught among the people who spent their time growing crops and tending livestock, He told them stories of wheat and barns, seeds and trees, sheep and birds – the very stuff of life around them. As such, the majority of Jesus' ministry was with the people of the land - it was to them that the Good News of the Kingdom of God was originally entrusted. This is no romantic, chocolate-box image of rural life, but a clear indication that the message of the saving power of God was proclaimed among those with the callused hands and the sore backs of hard labour. Imagine Peter, a simple fisherman, standing up in the public forum of Jerusalem and proclaiming the saving power of the cross of Christ as we heard in our reading from the Book of Acts. Here is a man with limited education, presumably not schooled in the arts of rhetoric, and yet he delivers a speech which cuts to the hearts of those who were listening in the crowd. and we hear that about three thousand of them were baptised as a

result. That is the power of the Holy Spirit to transform a person into someone who can speak with authority, regardless of their background. Jesus called people to be His disciples because He knew they could speak to their communities in ways that the community could understand. That is how the Gospel originally spread.

When I preached this sermon in church I chose the hymn 'Now the Green Blade Riseth' because it contains another theological reason for local ministry: the hymn is about how Jesus is to be found in the world around us, even now. Think back to Easter when the angels spoke to Mary Magdelene at the entrance to the tomb, and they said "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here but has risen", because Jesus is alive at the right-hand of God, He is alive through the Holy Spirit in the hearts and minds of those who believe in His name, and He is alive in the world around us because He is the Word of God, that which spoke creation into being at the very beginning. The Christian story is not in the past tense - 'Jesus *was* alive two thousand years ago' – the Christian story is always in the present tense – Jesus is alive in the world *now*, present in the communities that meet in our churches and in the world just outside our doors.

When we look back through the stories of the Old Testament, the ones about the Promised Land and the Jewish people, there is a reason why there is such an intimate link between the Land and the People of God; and that is because it is the two things together that form what God created and intended for human flourishing. Christians perhaps have a different understanding of what the Promised Land means - we tend to think about it in terms of when Jesus shall return in glory and His kingdom shall be known in its fullness - but there is something about a Christian community being present in the world here and now, about being a blessing to the communities around us. There is Christian teaching that says we should flee from the world, because it is corrupting and sinful, and Christians should keep themselves apart and pure - a bit like the Pharisees did. I don't agree with this teaching. In his first letter, Peter talks about Christian purity, not by shutting ourselves off from the world, but by living in obedience to Christ's teachings. As Peter says, 'You have been born anew, not of perishable but of imperishable seed, through the living and enduring word of God'.

The Church is that imperishable seed bringing life wherever it lands on the ground. But to do that, we must be part of the communities around us – not separated from them, but part of them so that we might all be transformed by the Holy Spirit. Bishop Robert Patterson, in Deanery Chapter recently, described the rural church as 'salt and yeast'. I think he is entirely correct. That is what we are, salt and yeast, making Christ real to the people around us.

The events of last month have helped me to affirm in my own mind just how God is at work in the local places, not just big urban churches. God is here alongside us. So let's be sensitive to those moments when our hearts burn within us, listening to the teachings of Christ and meeting with Christ in the breaking of the bread, because that is God at work in our community, transforming us to bring the love of God to the world around us.

Preventing doorstep crime

Doorstep crime can include rogue traders offering home improvement or gardening services, or bogus callers who claim to be the council, police, health carers or energy companies.

What should I look out for?

Rogue traders

- May say they are in the area and have spotted a problem with your home or garden.
- May claim to have materials left over from another job, like paving or tarmac.
- May try to pressurise you to buy goods or sign up for services on the spot.
- May offer to carry out work cheaply, but charge an extortionate price after it has been completed.
- May offer to drive you to a bank so you can withdraw money to pay them.
- Provide false names, addresses or telephone numbers.

Pedlars

- A pediar is someone who calls at your door to sell items that they have on offer. This can often include cleaning or household goods.
- By law, they are required to carry a pediar's certificate, which are issued by the police force in the area where they live.

- May say they need to come into your home, or try to get you to go outside.
- May try to distract you so they can steal your money.
- Can be male, female or even children.

Tips to keep you safe

- If you are not sure who is at the door, don't open it.
- Check the identity of any caller. Confirm who they are by calling the company they work for using number from the telephone directory or a bill.
- Ask a neighbour to come around to check them before you open the door.
- Tell them to come back at a time when someone will be at home with you.
- Keep doors and windows locked and use the door chain every time you answer the door.
