Charles Arthur Binyon 1874 - 1963

Have you ever wondered who "Binyon" of Binyon Close was? He was Charles Arthur Binyon born in Burton in Lonsdale, Yorkshire in 1874 to Rev. Frederick & Mary Binyon, one of four sons including Lawrence, the poet. Educated at St. Pauls, he was sickly so his doctor recommended an outdoor life. While his father was vicar of Winchcombe, he went to Cambridge Horticultural College before settling in Badsey where he became a Market Gardner, owning land off Bretforton Road. In 1904 he joined Evesham Rural District Council, being Chairman from 1922-49.



In 1908, he founded the first horticulture co-operative, the Littleton & Badsey Growers. He was Chairman from 1909-46. Also, he was a J.P. for over 30 years, President of the Evesham League of Nations & Chairman of the Evesham Guardians Committee for the poor before WWII.

He was an active member of St. James's Church, Badsey as sidesman, Sunday School teacher, bell ringer, clock winder and later treasurer of the Parochial Parish Council. He was an accomplished artist, astronomer and keen chess player. He never married but gave his life to the service of the rural communities. In 1950 he was awarded the O.B.E. His great legacy was overseeing, from 1911 onwards, the building of 1,000 council homes. Much loved and respected, he died in Evesham Hospital aged 88 years in 1963.

Freedom Charity helping young adults with learning disabilities, to help us in the Community.

On Wednesday mornings, young adults from Freedom Charity, visit our churchyard to do gardening. In July, Tracey Hemming of Freedom Charity contacted Anne McCombie, Badsey church's mission and outreach coordinator. Tracey was keen for the young adults to offer voluntary help within our community and wondered if there was anything they could do at church. Anne felt gardening in our churchyard might be a useful way for them to help both church and community. It has proven a wonderful adventure for everyone. Under supervision, and with guidance from Anne's husband,

Graham, they have already reclaimed the path, and tidied up both churchyard entrances. The Garden of

Remembrance was thoroughly weeded. Through the decades, many old resting places were left unattended, simply through family relatives or friends no longer living, or perhaps no longer able to visit. Weed growth year on year built up and became unsightly. Already, much ivy and



moss and general weed rubbish were removed by the young adults. Parishioners often stop to admire their work. One member of the group enjoys removing the moss from the Chapel Street boundary wall. They enjoy each other's company whilst gardening, are very visible in our community, and Anne says it's a pleasure to spend time with them. If you see them gathered for a cup of coffee or tea or squash at Reverend Hunt's Stone Memorial, it's because they've been working hard and are enjoying a little break and a bit of banter. Recently, these charming young adults planted a few spring bulbs near the porch entrance, for us all to admire next year on our way to church, or traversing through our churchyard. Hopefully, in the coming winter months they will be busy in church making bird/bat boxes, and bug houses.

Preventing doorstep crime – If you're not sure, don't open the door

Doorstep crime can include rogue traders offering home improvement or gardening services, pedlars selling items they have on offer, or bogus callers who claim to be the council, police, health carers or energy companies.

What should I look out for?

Rogue traders

- May say they are in the area and have spotted a problem with your home or garden
- May claim to have materials left over from another job, like paving or tarmac.
- May try to pressurise you to buy goods or sign up for services on the spot.
- May offer to carry out work cheaply, but charge an extortionate price after it has been completed
- May offer to drive you to a bank so you can withdraw money to pay them
- Provide false names, addresses or telephone numbers.

Pedlars

- A pedlar is someone who calls at your door to sell items that they have on offer. This can often include cleaning or household goods.
- By law, they are required to carry a pedlar's certificate, which is issued by the police force in the area where they live.

Bogus callers

- May claim to be working for the council, water, gas or electric company. They could also say they are a nurse, doctor or from the police.
- May say they need to come into your home, or try to get you to go outside.
- May try to distract you so they can steal your money.

Tips to keep you safe

- If you are not sure who is at the door, don't open it
- Check the identity of any caller. Confirm who they are by calling the company they work for using number from the telephone directory or a bill.
- Phone a neighbour to come round to check them before you open the door.
- Tell them to come back at a time when someone will be at home with you.
- Keep doors and windows locked and use the door chain every time you answer to door.

Lastly, Remember, a tip to keep your house safe from burglary before going out at night: Leave a light on in one of your rooms, and/or leave your radio on.

A Christmas Message to you all, in Badsey and Aldington, from



Archdeacon of Worcester, Robert Jones

It seems that Christmas has been coming for several months now. I saw a Christmas tree lurking in my local pub at the beginning of September – surely a record! And yet it doesn't feel very 'Christmassy' as we look at world affairs, politics and what goes on in the lives of so many people.

It doesn't feel very Christmassy, of course, because we've made Christmas in our own image, rather than in the image and likeness of the very first Christmas. The very first Christmas was a tale of a birth – always a joyful event – in the midst of considerable human turmoil. It was not at all different from what so many of us are experiencing today; a real life born in the real circumstances of the day. We tend to dress things up, and maybe there's no real harm in that. For example, Christmas trees came quite late to the party – introduced by Victorians. Many years later they appear in my local pub as the symbol of the season!

We do this in so many ways. Let's take Advent. No doubt inspired by those Blue Peter candle stands made out of metal coat-hangers (I'm showing my age, but do you remember them?), we tend to think of the wonderful season of Advent as a countdown to Christmas. But it has a far wider reach than that; it is a countdown to the time when God's will is done here on earth as it is in heaven.

We dress up holy seasons, and we dress up holy places. One of the great excitements of today's church is the way we are opening up the buildings to much more community activity. We have holy space and community space, and they rub along well together, which should not surprise us as Christmas people believing in the God who came to be among us.

Maybe we do it for ourselves too. I sometimes wonder whether we simply need to re-learn wonder and awe at God's beautiful creation and re-creation. At the feast of Epiphany the Magi come without commentary or explanation simply to worship and bring their gifts.

Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, these festivals give us a wonderful excuse to celebrate the God who shows us in Jesus just how much He loves us and reminds us just how valuable human beings really are. And if I was nudged to think about that a couple of months back in my local perhaps that was really no bad thing. Seasons' greetings!
