SPRING IS EVERYWHERE TO BE SEEN.....

Have the bulbs in your garden pots popped through in anticipation of bursting out into flower? The snowdrops have now gone over and the early crocuses are past their best. Hyacinths are threatening to steal the show in your garden with tulips close behind. There are so many mixtures of colours ready to please us as we hunt around for signs that winter has passed us by. It doesn't seem five minutes ago since we carefully planted the various bulbs, and now we're keeping an eye out to see if the plants are shooting through the soil.

The birds are checking out old nests in your sheds and hedge. Quite often they aren't fussy and love recycling. The size, shape and complexity of nests vary widely. Some are hardly nests at all, just hollows formed by the body of the bird, or cavities in trees or amongst rocks. Others are intricately complex, woven structures composed of a large amount of material. It is often the female who is the master builder but a well-known exception to this is the wren. The male wren works extremely hard building several nests throughout his territory then escorting his mate to view his handiwork and allowing her to choose where she will lay her eggs. Look out for wrens flying around in your garden.

Bluetits love to use the same nest, year after year. Already they're making themselves comfortable where they nested last year.

Already we have some spring lambs in Badsey. The ones on this page were photographed in January. They are a lot bigger now. Although the weather hadn't been too cold then, the lambs were photographed inside the shed, enjoying jumping around in the hay, with their mother.

A Message to you all from Reverend Philip Morton

March 2019

This month the Church moves into the season of Lent, which is traditionally a time of reflection and study of our Christian faith before we celebrate Easter.

Many people choose to give something up in Lent, like a favourite food or even chocolate (if you're feeling very brave). Of course, this used to be the time when people gave up eating eggs, having used all the last of the eggs in the household to make pancakes on Shrove Tuesday. But Lent is not just about giving things up; it can also be about starting something new.

One thing that many people do is to undertake some form of volunteering or learning. This year we are going to be starting three house groups that will run for the five weeks of Lent, allowing people to do some informal study of the Christian faith and think about how it impacts on our lives.

Two of the groups will be run during the daytime, and one in the evening. One of the daytime groups, will be in Bretforton on Tuesday afternoons from 3pm to 4 pm starting on 12th March. The other daytime group will be in Middle Littleton on Wednesday mornings from 10:15am to 12noon starting on 13th March. The evening group will be on Wednesday evenings in Offenham, also starting on 13th March.

There will be some sign-up sheets in the churches if you want to join one of these groups, but if you would like some further information please do get in touch.

Mothering Sunday

Mothering Sunday falls on the fourth Sunday of Lent (Sunday $31^{\rm st}$ March) and is a day on which we recognise the importance of those who have cared for and mothered us throughout our lives. On this day in the past children would pick wild flowers, like violets, either to take to church, or to give to their mother as a gift.

Shrove Tuesday

Shrove Tuesday will be celebrated on 5 March, in advance of Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent. It is a day of penitence, to clean the soul and a last chance to celebrate and feast before the start of Lent.

Historically, Christians would undergo the ritual of shriving, where they confessed their sins and would receive forgiveness for them. Through receiving forgiveness for sins, people are released from the guilt of having caused them. It is believed that traditionally a 'shriving bell' was rung to call people to confession; today, in some places, it is still rung, but it is called the 'pancake bell'. This name arose from the story of a woman of Olney, Buckinghamshire, who in 1445 heard the shriving bell whilst making pancakes and ran to the church, still in her apron and clutching her frying pan.

Pancakes became widely associated with Shrove Tuesday because they were a dish that could use up perishable items like eggs, milk and fat.

THE ALDINGTON BEAKER

An amazing archaeological discovery was made in 2016 when a survey was taken prior to a major housing development being built off the Offenham Road in Aldington. Badsey Society Committee member, Ian Gibson, attended a one-day



archaeological conference in Worcester in November, at which Derek Hurst of Worcester Archive and Archaeology Service gave a talk about the discovery.

A burial site was located in gravel near a possible crossing point of ancient trackways, one of which went north to what is now Badsey. The site contained a complete bell shaped pottery jar of the type known as a

beaker. The style is of the "Low Carinated" type from 2500-2100 BCE. The shape and decoration of the jar is very similar to jars found to the East across the channel. The area of the burial contained looser gravel than the surroundings and this is what drew the archaeologists' attention.

A grave in chalk at Amesbury near Stonehenge from the same period contained the well-preserved skeleton of an archer with a beaker pot close by. This has been subject to isotope research and the surprise finding was that the archer came from the Alps region. The skeleton and teeth in the Aldington burial had dissolved away completely in the acidic gravel soil, leaving only a stone wrist guard or brace parallel with the position of the forearm. This in itself is evidence that the body was of an archer as at Amesbury. Two flint arrowheads were also found, one of which had a broken tip. At Amesbury a broken arrowhead was also found and the tip was found in the body of the archer so there is a suggestion that something similar happened at Aldington but the tip was not found here.

About 300 similar sites have been analysed in England, Wales and Scotland. The main finding is that these people were not local. They had origins in the Steppes, a huge area of Eurasia stretching from Hungary and Romania to China.

EASY MINESTRONE SOUP

Cooking time: 20 minutes

Ingredients:

50g small pasta pieces such as fusilli or penne 1 large can (400g) of chopped tomatoes 350g of frozen mixed vegetables 1/2 a vegetable stock cube or 1tsp bouillon powder 1tspn dried mixed herbs or 1 tblsp fresh parsley, finely chopped 800ml (1½ pints) water

Equipment:

chopping board and knife
weighing scales to weigh the pasta pieces
saucepan and wooden spoon
tin opener to open the can of chopped tomatoes
tablespoon and teaspoon
measuring jug to measure the water

- 1. Add all the ingredients to a large pan.
- 2. Bring to the boil stirring occasionally so the pasta does not stick to the bottom.
- 3. Turn the heat down and simmer until the pasta is cooked.

Serving suggestions

- Allow the soup to cool before serving
- Keep cooled leftover soup in the fridge for up to 2 days

Top Tips:

Add different vegetables or some cooked chicken or sausages
