# CAN YOU HELP UNCOVER THE ARCHAEOLOGY OF BADSEY?

#### Postponed to a weekend later in the year

Evidence of Badsey's past lies just beneath your feet, waiting to be discovered. We need your help to dig 20 test pits (mini archaeological excavations) in gardens across Badsey to uncover centuries of history. There's nothing quite like being the first to hold an item last seen hundreds of years ago!

All ages are welcome and no experience or knowledge of archaeology is needed, as guidance and equipment will be provided. Each test pit needs a team of 3-4, as archaeology involves more than just digging: there will be finds to collect and clean and discoveries to record, so taking part won't mean digging all day!

Badsey will be one of six settlements excavated as part of this county wide project. Small Pits, Big Ideas is being run by Worcs. Archaeological Society, in partnership with Worcs. Archive & Archaeology Service and the Badsey Society, with support from the National Lottery Heritage Fund.

Thank you to those who have already come forward. We are still looking for more gardens and lots of volunteers to help.

Training will be provided shortly before the dig starts. If you're interested in taking part or hosting a test pit (they will be de-turfed and reinstated).

At this time of year, I would normally find myself writing about the approach of the Easter season, but this year is very different from anything else we have experienced.

Part of the problem is the uncertainty around what might happen in the near future. Now that we are no longer able to gather for worship in churches, I am reminded of the words Jesus said when He summarised the Law; " 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind'.

This is the greatest and first commandment. And the second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself'. On these two commandments hang all the law and prophets". (Matthew 22: 37-40)

Jesus was teaching that these two things - loving God first and foremost, and loving our neighbours as ourselves – underpin everything that makes for human flourishing.

In times when our community are shutting down in order to protect the most vulnerable, and people are self-isolating to protect themselves and their families, it is more important than ever to remember the commandment to love our neighbours.

Look out for those who might be alone and can't get to the shops. Stay in touch with people by phone or text, just to let them know that people are still out there thinking of them. And hold each other in prayer. If you have access to the internet, our new prayer booklet is available for free download from our church website eastvaleavon.com.

Other prayer resources and sermons can be found on the website, and we will be adding more material as we go along.

If you don't have internet access, call the Vicar on 01386 832 599 with your name and address and a copy of the booklet can be posted through your door.

And if you're feeling lonely and isolated, you are always free to call the Vicar anyway. The Church is still here, putting love of God and love of neighbour at the heart of our communities. I hope this prayer may of some comfort:

Lord Jesus Christ, you taught us to love our neighbour, and to care for those in need as if we were caring for you. In this time of anxiety, give us strength to comfort the fearful, to tend the sick, and to assure the isolated of our love, and your love, for your name's sake. Amen.

#### HOW DNA SOLVED A FAMILY MYSTERY

#### Badsey resident Tony Wood explains all

I have been researching my family history for over forty years. My paternal family all hailed from the South Hams area of Devon.

My great-grandmother, Sarah Wood was born in 1838. Unfortunately, at a young age she was admitted to the local workhouse along with her father due to her mother's ill health. Her stay lasted many years and whilst there she had three illegitimate children – one of whom was my grandfather, James Wood. All census returns and even his marriage certificate showed his name as plain James Wood and that is how it remained until his death. Imagine my surprise when in 1992 I obtained his birth certificate which showed his full name as James **Polyblank** Wood.

Polyblank? What was that all about? As he was illegitimate it was often the practice that the mother would use the middle and sometimes first name of the father in the hope of obtaining parish benefit.

I then pondered for many years as to which Mr. Polyblank was the 'culprit'. Polyblank and it's derivatives were fairly common surnames in the South Hams area and so this proved to be an impossible task by normal genealogical research.

Many years later I decided to take a DNA test. As a result, I found that I had an almost exact match with a man living in Canada called Gary Pullyblank. By sheer luck his sister runs a one-name study for the surname. We decided that both Gary and I would put our DNA results on the Devon DNA project which groups matches into haplogroups (a DNA term for ancient matching ancestry). The Devon project is run by Debbie Kennett, a well respected DNA expert. Debbie was very interested in our joint results – mainly because, to date, we are the only two individuals in the database with that extremely rare haplogroup.

With Debbie's help we were able to establish that my "Mr Polyblank" had to be in Gary's direct ancestral line. We arrived at the conclusion that my great-grandfather was one of four brothers all living in the area at the time. One of the brothers was called James Pulleyblank and was the right age and lived in the next parish to my grandmother.

I am 95% certain he is the correct brother because of his forename but to be 100% certain I need to trace a living male descendant and persuade them to take a DNA test. This is work in progress.

SHARP-SIGHTED

John Sharp delves into the local newspaper archives January 1957



During a football match between Pershore and Badsey Rangers, the Rangers goalkeeper, John Grindle, was asked by some children during the game to rescue their cat which was up a tree. He promised, half-meaning it, that he would do so after the match.

The children were waiting for him after he got changed, so obliged to climb the tree. It was about four inches away from a "live" wire carrying 11,000 volts. He grabbed the cat, which scratched his face (how ungrateful!), and he had to drop it. It landed on its feet and ran away unharmed.

A comment from an Electricty Board Official afterwards was, "We should certainly not have sent a man up the tree, even an experienced man, without putting the line out of service. Nobody, no matter if it's a human being who is trapped up the pole or tree, should anyone attempt to climb it."
