Good Santa, Bad Santa, 'James Bond', Doug Deep (alias the Community News Editor) and a dog called Gilbert are but a few of the characters featured in the Dallimore films that have brought a smile to those that have come to see Elizabeth and Ralph Bollands outdoor model railway every Christmas since 2012.

Alas, this fund raise is one of the many village's fund raises to be cancelled this year due to the Pandemic. The rural part of the railway layout had been revamped (see photo below) to be unveiled this Christmas but will now have to wait for next year when we hope regular and new visitors will enjoy the scene and who knows what the film will be.

How did this railway start is often asked?

In 1998 Elizabeth suggested having a model railway in the garden to amuse the grandchildren, an idea quickly endorsed by Ralph who is a steam train enthusiast. Their previous garden was quite large allowing the track to be laid at ground level, weaving through bushes and flower beds, but 'downsizing' in 2007 to a much smaller home and



garden in Binyon Close, saw Ralph put the track on stilts at waist height for ease.

Mini fund raises started in the Summer of 2008 for the next four years to help girls and leaders of Badsey, and other local Guide Units, with International projects.

By 2012, Badsey Scout Hut was in need of an extension and as Ralph was the Group's Chairman, had the idea of a model Santa riding in a railway truck to raise funds.

With the help of many Volunteers to guard the Engines, make the hot drinks and produce the films, although this annual event is free, visitors are welcome to give a donation.

So far almost £7,000 has been donated with latterly, Badsey Church and Guide Dogs benefiting from the generosity of those who attend.

DELIVER US FROM ALL EVILS (AND DOGS)

Seasoned newspaper deliverer Brian Smith offers some light-hearted advice to new deliverers of the Community News

1. Letterboxes

Some have very strong springs. In the event of fingers being trapped swear if you must but avoid blasphemous phrases. Remember that you are representing the church. 'Hairy' boxes can be a problem. They are hard to penetrate and involve pushing fingers right through. This can cause further problems and expose you to danger 2 below, dogs. If you ruin more than one copy, give up, it's their own fault. Low boxes can be a hazard for older deliverers, as after bending down, they may be unable to straighten up again. Try rolling on the ground until the spasm goes away.

2. Dogs.

Should you be silly enough to push your hand right through and feel a dog's teeth attached to it, don't try to pull away quickly or you might lose your fingers. Let the dog play a bit until it loses interest. Try not to drip blood on the path, as the householder won't be pleased. Dogs running free are a slight problem. Be assertive, be brave, but be careful! Undertake a health and safety assessment before entering. Is the dog baring its teeth? Foaming at the mouth? Barking madly? If not, proceed with care, talking quietly to it as you proceed. It will be useful to know the biting habits of various breeds. The small terrier will nip you round the ankles and calves several times. Your German Shepherd will bite you once, somewhat higher up. In your welcome pack, you will find dog biscuits to distract the dog as you deliver. A pack of plasters and some iodine in case the dog fails to be distracted. Please don't be deterred. People who keep dangerous dogs are the very people we need to reach out to.

3. Falling Over.

Sooner or later you will slip,or trip and fall over whilst on your round. Please keep this to a minimum, as you are not insured. On your way down, try not to drop the Community News on the ground. If you do, why not keep any soiled copies for people that you don't like?

4. Wet Weather. Deliver in the rain if you are daft enough but DO NOT allow the magazines to get wet. A soggy magazine is no use to anybody and impossible to push through the letterbox.

5. People Of Other Faiths. Avoid getting into discussions about religion with people of other faiths. One deliverer lost all of his front teeth in such a debate.

6. 'NO JUNK MAIL' Notices.

What constitutes as junk is not clearly defined. If you consider the Community News to be junk, you just might be in the wrong job.

COUNCIL HOUSES CENTENARY

This year, 2020, marks the 100th anniversary of the first Council houses to be built in Badsey. Twenty-four homes (or cottages as they were often referred to) were built on the western side of the road extending from the Bretforton Road down to the old school (now The Pub in a Club). They were built under the provisions of the Housing and Town Planning Act of 1909, but plans were delayed because of the First World War.

It is thanks to Charles Arthur Binyon that the scheme in Badsey came to fruition soon after the war had ended. We know from a newspaper report in The Evesham Standard that the first eight houses were occupied by July. By mid August 1920, ten of the cottages were occupied. Most were finished by the end of 1920 and we know from Binyon's diary that all the Badsey homes were occupied by February 1921.

There had been 67 applications for 24 houses. Many of the new tenants were returning servicemen with young families and a majority were to remain in their new home for the rest of their lives. The new houses were known as Nos 1-24 Synehurst. Nos 11-24 were renumbered as 25-38 in 1949, when the 14 houses that had been built in 1927 on the east side of Synehurst became 11-24.

In 1931, plans were drawn up for further council housing and, by 1933, tenants were able to move into Synehurst Crescent and Synehurst Avenue, which had the effect of severely reducing the size of the Synehurst large back gardens.

In 1950, there were considerable discussions at Parish Council meetings about the site for a further development of council housing. One of the areas under consideration was at the end of Synehurst Avenue. In the event, an area to the east of Synehurst was developed and became known as Green Leys. It was not until another nearly 70 years had passed before houses were built on this land, adjacent to 38 Synehurst, in a development known as Sladden Close. The Housing Act of 1980 gave Council house tenants the "right to buy". As a result, many of the Synehurst homes are in private ownership.

BUTTONED-DOWN BRASS

Peter Stewart discovers

Amazingly of all the metal finds I have made with metal detectors over the years, buttons and badges stand out in my collection. But is it not a coincidence that most, if not all, came from fields bordering on Sands Lane and not far from Badsey's Recreation Ground.

Shirt and trouser buttons dominate this lot shown below, with remains of badges from the Army, Royal Air Force, the Civil Defence and Air Raid Wardens. Plus a lady's suspender belt clasp!



WHY IS THERE DECORATION ON ONE OF THE GATE PIERS OF THE GARDEN OF REMEMBRANCE, AND NOT ON THE OTHER?

Asked Valerie Magan in our last publication. Well Valerie, here is the answer to your question from our local history man, Terry Sparrow.

The decoration on the north gate pier at the entrance to the Garden of Remembrance was not carried out when the pier was built about 1950, but was already carved into a very old stone used as part of the new construction. The origin of this stone, the only one of its kind available at the time, is unclear.

Until 1949 the east boundary wall of the churchyard lay near the row of lime trees, but in that year the Parochial Church Council acquired land necessary to extend the churchyard to Chapel Street. The old wall was demolished and the present one constructed, using most of the old stones, among them perhaps the carved one.

Charles Binyon (1874-1963) who was well versed in architectural matters, thought it to be of Norman origin and probably once part of the old church, presumably meaning the church before its extensive restoration in 1885. Certainly the pattern of the carving is very similar to that on the arch above the blocked doorway in the north wall of the church which we are told is typical of the Norman period (11th and 12th centuries).

Next month our local history man has been posed this question from a reader. *Recently I overheard a conversation when 'Elsewhere Park', which I assume to be in Badsey, was mentioned. Please can you tell me where it is situated and how it got its name?*
