WHAT TO BUY AN ASTRONOMER FOR CHRISTMAS

From Badsey's very own astronomer, Stargazer

A slightly different Stargazer for this month. With the festive season just around the corner, here are a few thoughts on what to buy a budding astronomer for Christmas.

1) A Planisphere

This simple device is completely invaluable to the budding and serious star gazer. The Planisphere consists of two thin plastic discs that rotate about a common axis. The rear disc has a map of the night sky printed on it with a calendar printed around the outer edge. The top disc has a clear section representing the visible night sky and the time printed around its rim. The action of aligning the date with the time will give you a map of that night's sky and you can see how the heavens will change hour by hour and night by night. This tool will not only help you plan your evening's viewing of the night sky but also help you identify the major stars and constellations.

2) Almanacs

Night Sky Almanacs are published by Collins and Philips in association with the Royal Observatory in Greenwich and these complement the function of the Planisphere. Not only do they describe the changing night sky month by month but they also point out objects of interest, the phases of the moon and the best times to see the planets. Almanacs can be purchased on line but also from discount High Street book shops.

3) Red Torch

It takes our eyes nearly twenty minutes to become fully accustomed to the darkness, and before we can fully appreciate the magnificence of the night sky. Switching on a white light even for only a few moments will be enough to destroy our night vision and we have to wait again to see properly. Fortunately our eyes do not react in the same way

to red light, and we can use this to help us consult Almanacs and Planispheres as well as find parts of our astronomical equipment. Red torches are an invaluable piece of equipment for any astronomer.

4) Hat, Socks and Gloves

It is cold at night at present and you can get very cold standing still for long period of time. Thermal hats, socks and gloves, although not always fashionable, make the long evenings tolerable. These are as essential as any other piece of astronomical equipment.

5) A Telescope

You can spend very large amounts of money on a telescope or even a good pair of binoculars. Different telescopes will have advantages and disadvantages depending on the area of astronomy that you may take an interest in. I recommend that you start with a relatively low cost telescope and build your interest and trade up to a better instrument as your expertise develops. Do not worry too much about the magnification of the telescope, as the magnification is often limited by the atmosphere. A magnification of only 20 or 50 will give a clearer and more pleasing image than a greater magnification of say 100 or 200.

Have a good Christmas and let us hope for clear crisp evenings during the festive season.

WHAT IS THE LARGE PICTURE THAT HANGS IN THE CHURCH AND DEPICTS A STORY FROM THE BIBLE?

This question was put to the History Man, here is his answer

The painting (see below) that hangs on the north wall of Badsey Church is entitled 'The Raising of the Widow's Son' and is the artist's interpretation of a scene depicted in St. Luke's Gospel chapter 7 verses 12 to 15.

The painting is the work of Otto Venius, also known as Otto Van Veen, a Dutchman who lived from 1556 to 1634. It has been in the church since 1885, the year of the restoration and enlargement of the building, and was the gift of a Mr. Bloxham, almost certainly a relative of the Reverend Charles Bloxham, who was assistant curate here from 1820 to 1839.

The register shows that Charles and his wife Mary had 5 sons and 3 daughters baptised at Badsey during the period from 1820 to 1833 and it is possible that one of these was the donor of the painting.

FAMILY HISTORY TIPS From the Badsey Society



This month we continue our series on how to trace your family history with the second of two articles from Shirley Tutton.

Lesson 11 - Old Photographs (Part 2)

The burning question with every photograph is do you have a name for anyone in it? If so, is it someone listed on the Badsey Society website? If not, search on Ancestry or Findmypast or another genealogy website to see if that returns any results. If not, Google them. You never know what you might find.

If you have one name for a wedding party, the layout can help you work out who's who, and help you draw a family tree if you don't have one already. The standard arrangements for wedding photos mean that the happy couple are usually in the centre of the picture surrounded by their bridesmaids and the best man, with the bride's family on the left and the groom's on the right.

This was the starting point for a photo (see below left) which came into the possession of the Badsey Society recently. We knew it was a member of the Bell family of Aldington, as it came from Peggy Wheatley (nee Bell). But who? The setting was identified as Aldington Manor, where Peggy's grandfather had been bailiff, and the ladies' outfits and hats placed the wedding in the 1920s. The sombre suits indicated that the family could be in mourning, as we have family photos from the same period with beautiful wedding dresses. I began to construct a family tree with the help of Ancestry and Maureen Spinks, and over a couple of days the mystery began to unravel.

We decided that this was the wedding of 23-year-old Eva May Bell (1899-1973) of Aldington and 31-year-old Frederick George Birch (1892-1973) of Hampton which took place on 29th September 1923 at St James' Church, Badsey. Eva was born at Aldington, the eldest of five children of Henry William Bell and his wife, Martha Irene (née Harris). Her father had died six months before the wedding. Frederick, the second of five surviving children of Henry and Louisa Birch, was born at Hampton. The happy couple are pictured centre. To the bride's left are

her brother, Ralph Bell, who gave her away, and seated are her surviving sister, Maud, and her widowed mother. To the groom's right, it is assumed that those pictured are his parents, his brother William, and one of his sisters, either Katherine or Nellie, as they were both unmarried at the time.

In conclusion then, as the dark days of winter approach, two things to keep you busy – Firstly, talk to your older relatives and get as much information as you can to write on the back of any photographs they might have. Secondly, start cataloguing those photos languishing under the spare bed. Your family history depends on it (and it's fun)!


The couple were married and enjoyed many happy years together. After his death neighbours were shocked to learn his savings amounted to eight thousand pounds, a sizeable sum for the 1950s.

Jane Neill's Countryside Calendar

December has the shortest days and casts the longest shadows. It is a month of contrasts from heavy rains to frost, ice and snow. Mild days or bitter cold days with clear blue skies. The Christmas season is a time to decorate our houses with holly. ivy and mistletoe; for wildlife the berries are essential for survival. The deciduous trees bare of their leaves allowing us to see squirrels and woodpeckers foraging in the woods, while in the hedgerows, clothed in bright red berries, many birds seek shelter. Birds such as starlings fly in fast moving flocks, blink and you miss them! There is safety in numbers as predators feel the pinch of winter too. In the harshest weather the birds come to the gardens to feed. The grey wagtail winters along the brook. Seabirds come far inland to shelter

on the rivers so it is not unusual to spot cormorants and black-headed gulls. Watch out for lapwings with their distinctive rounded wings passing by. Roe deer venture out into the fields on cold frosty mornings where crows, rooks and jackdaws gather in huge numbers too. Listening to the crows do they sound like Daleks to you too!


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CHRISTMAS CAROL COMPETITION
