Sunday 19th March will be celebrated as Mothering Sunday, or Mother's Day, when we give thanks for our mothers.

In 1947, I was just five years old when my father sadly passed away, leaving my mother a widow with me to look after - it was very difficult in those early post-war years, with a very small widow's pension. I am so grateful that, along with some help from aunts and uncles, my mother cared for me and was always there for me when I came home from school.

She passed away a number of years ago, but I still have such fond memories of her and her sacrifices for me until I was 17, when she married again which allowed me the freedom to move out into the world and create a career for myself.

The Virgin Mary went through so many hard and difficult times, beginning with the birth of Jesus in that very unhygienic stable in Bethlehem and then as a refugee in Egypt, fleeing from the ruthless King Herod.

She realised from the beginning that Jesus was someone special, that He had a mission to accomplish here on Earth and would no doubt have had many 'run ins' with her other children born after Jesus in explaining who He was.

At the cross, when Jesus died all alone, Mary was there - feeling His pain and anguish along with the Apostle John. Jesus reached out to them both by committing each one to the other, and that special love which Jesus had for Mary and John is available for each of us today as we accept Him as our Lord and Saviour.

Residents get planting at Pear Tree!



Some 20+ volunteers came along for the first planting of trees session at Pear Tree Fields on Saturday 4th February 2023. Weather conditions were warm, although not sunny, and the ground had defrosted making planting a little easier.





Planting teams worked in pairs, with one slicing the ground and the other popping the whip in with a cane and securing the protector sleeve. As they got underway, the progress got quicker. A large section was initially marked indicating dying trees so that they could have a tree planted next to them, with a second smaller section if time allowed. But, the teams were so efficient that both got done in the two hour session - with time for a bacon sandwich and a coffee too!

If you would like to get involved, we will have more trees being delivered in March, slightly less than the initial delivery but still 800+. So, if you would like to take part, sessions will be advertised on the Parish Council Facebook page.

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When Spring arrives, so does Venus

While driving back from Leicester about two years ago, I spotted in the evening twilight what I assumed was a helicopter with a bright search light hovering over Coventry airport as I drove down the M69. As I approached the Tollbar Roundabout, it became clear that the helicopter was much further away and probably hovering above Warwick. Back on the A46 again, I could see the helicopter hovering even further ahead and it became clear to me I had mistaken the object, and what I was looking at was, in fact, the planet Venus.

The brightness of Venus in the early evening is probably the cause of most reports of unidentified flying objects, and reports of flying saucers. The reason is that an object that is far away can appear to follow you down the road - try watching the moon while on a car journey, for example.

Venus is an inner planet, orbiting between the earth and the sun. The result is that it is only seen in the early morning around sunrise, and in the early evening around sunset. You will never see it during the middle of the night, as it will always be on the sunward side of the earth.

With a telescope, if you can get the focus really sharp, you can see that the planet goes through phases just like the moon. At present, Venus is brilliantly bright in the sky during the early evening for about an hour or so after sunset. This bright appearance of Venus is due to the light from the sun reflecting off a very dense layer of clouds. Venus was often referred to as Earth's sister (because it is a similar sized planet with similar gravity), and it orbits the sun in the "Goldilocks Zone" where water could exist on a planet's surface. For a long time, people dreamed that there must be a water world beneath the clouds.

Many science fiction stories in the early twentieth century featured an ocean world filled with fantastic creatures, including the novel Perelandra or A Voyage to Venus by C. S. Lewis in 1943. The reality of the climate on Venus is very different; rather than being a lush vibrant world, the surface of the planet is the hottest in our solar system with temperatures of over 460 °C, which is hot enough to melt lead. The atmospheric pressure is also 92 times higher than that found here on Earth, equivalent to being about 1,000 metres underwater, and, what is worse, when it rains, it rains sulphuric acid. Altogether, it isn't a particularly pleasant place to be.

It takes 225 days for Venus to orbit the sun, a Venusian year. However, it takes 243 earth days to turn on its axis. Its day is longer than its year, and it is turning in the wrong direction on its axis. Astronomers have long wondered why Venus is spinning in the wrong direction, as everything else in the solar system spins in the same direction except for Venus.

One suggestion was that the planet must have been hit by a large asteroid in the distant past, and the result of that impact was that the planet flipped over. However, in recent years a different hypothesis has been put forward, in that the planet is closer to the sun than the earth, and that the tidal forces on the thick dense atmosphere have caused the rotation of the planet to slow down and eventually start to reverse.

There is little chance of life as we know it existing on the surface of Venus, with the excessive temperatures and the toxic and acidic atmosphere. It has been speculated that in the distant past Venus once had oceans, and may have had a richly diverse ecosystem that was destroyed as the planet gradually heated up. It has therefore been suggested that extremophiles may have survived.





While examining photos taken of the surface of Venus by the Russian landing craft Verera 13 from 1980, one scientist suggested that the photos show objects that move between successive photos, and that these could be small creatures. Others also claim that these objects could be nothing more than parts of the landing craft. However, in 2020, NASA scientists using a radio telescope discovered the signature of the chemical phosphine in the atmosphere. This chemical (as far as we know) is only produced by anaerobic bacteria, and should not exist for long in the Venusian atmosphere.

The discussion about life on Venus is continuing. Look towards the southwest just after sunset on a clear evening during March, and you will see a very bright Venus in our evening skies for about an hour or so. The best time to see Venus will be at the beginning of March, but it will be in our skies for some time. Take a few moments to marvel at the magnificent sight of what could have been Earth's twin.

There are so many competition categories to enter at the Badsey Flower Show, from flowers to vegetables to gardens in general.



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


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News from the pews

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Jane Neill's Nature Notes



"Mad as a March Hare" as the saying goes, refers to the mating behaviour of a female hare boxing with the male. I hadn't seen one for years, until I caught one in my car headlights driving along the Bredon Hill village lanes recently. Thankfully, it ran into the verge.

Lately, I encountered another of our native mammals: the red fox. I was walking through the meadow when I heard a pheasant; it flew to safety. I saw the red fox stride along, through the hedge and into the field above. I waited just in case it returned, and I was rewarded with a perfect view as it appeared in the open gateway.



The fox is carnivorous, eating rodents, earthworms and game birds, but it also eats fruit and nuts when they are plentiful in autumn. They hunt mostly at sunrise and at night, preferring woodlands where they dig 'earths' or take over existing holes. The male is called a dog, the female a vixen, and their young 'kits'.

Foxes live for one to five years, and known for being cunning. Traditionally, in the Cotswolds, witches were thought to take the shape of a fox to steal their neighbours' butter! But for me, it was a magical encounter.
