May 1969...what appeared to be an ordinary car with a special crest on the top, drove slowly through the streets of Holyhead in Anglesey with Prince Charles and his sister Anne as passengers.

Earlier in the day, at Caernarvon Castle, was the Investiture when Charles officially became the Prince of Wales. I doubt if he noticed me (nor later that day when I saw them both get into a tiny boat at the small pier head), until one day in 2012, when I was standing before the now-serious, mature man he had become, concerned for others - especially young people.

How do I know this fact? He asked me why there was a long waiting list (at that time) for girls wanting to join Girlguiding, and what could I do about it!

At the heart of the Coronation Service is a ritual in which the Archbishop of Canterbury anoints The King with oil. This custom, with roots in the Old Testament, can be traced back to the Coronation of King Edgar in 973. The visible act of anointing signifies a 'setting apart' for King Charles to serve the people of our nation and the Commonwealth. Following in his mother's footsteps, his leadership is rooted in a desire and a commitment to serve, following the ways of Jesus Christ in joy-filled servant humility.

May we seek the teachings of Jesus to enable us to know his will for our lives, and to serve in our local community and maybe beyond.

Results are in for the Big Badsey Dig!

The results are in!

The Big Badsey Dig took place last May, funded by the Lottery Heritage Fund and organised by Nina O'Hare from the Worcester Archive and Archaeology Service. Badsey and five other Worcestershire villages took part in the archaeological project, and illustrated videos of talks explaining the dig results are being put onto the Archive website.



A good spread of 19 Test Pits were dug around the village, mainly from domestic gardens ranging from Black Banks in the north to land south of Badsey Fields Lane. 86 volunteers shifted approximately 15 tonnes of soil to create the 1 metre square Test Pits.

The nearly 3000 artefacts from 19 Test Pits reveal that from the mid Iron Age to the end of the Roman period people were living to the north and south of the village centre of today, and activity there seemed to stop after the Romans left. The southern end of what is now Badsey village is likely to be the oldest part, with finds going back to the 12th century. There was no Saxon evidence found, but Saxon pottery is very fragile and rare, although coins have been found previously.

Some find examples are: a Roman hobnail from a sandal or shoe, a very rare piece of Newbury B ware from Wiltshire, a piece of medieval cooking pot, a couple of bases of "tygs" (17th century multi handled drinking cups), a 1919 Girl Guide badge and one prehistoric flint which, as it came from close to the church, suggests this site has seen human activity for a very long time.



Heart of the Lion... Regulus Stargazer



With the month of May we have much lighter evenings, and we must wait much later to see a night sky. By the end of the month there will be a glow from the sun to the north, throughout the night to the north. However, the warming evenings make it much more pleasant to sit outside and watch the stars begin to appear.

The brightest stars are relatively easy to identify, as they appear first in the sky on a summer's evening. One of the first to appear at this time of year is Regulus, in the constellation of Leo. It is also the brightest star in this constellation, and is also known as Alpha Leonis. Regulus is the Latin for 'prince' or 'little king', and has similar-meaning names in several languages and is known as 'Lion's Heart' in Arabic.

The constellation of Leo is not one of the most obvious constellations in the night sky, because many of its stars are quite faint and are easily lost if there is too much sky glow from streetlights or moonlight. Leo is one of the Zodiac constellations that sits close to the ecliptic. This is the line in the sky that the sun appears to pass through as Earth travels around its annual orbit. Regulus, in fact, sits on the ecliptic line, and is eclipsed by the moon and planets from time to time.

To find Regulus, look for the Plough (which is nearly overhead at present) and follow the pointer stars backwards towards the southwest. Regulus is not too far from the very bright Venus during May.

Regulus is 77 light years away and is therefore one of our more distant neighbours, and most books describe it as a double star. You should be able to see this with a pair of binoculars, and it is in fact a group of four stars. The main star is a large blue-white star with a small white dwarf star orbiting very closely every 40 days. This smaller star has not been directly observed, as it is so close to the bright main star. Its existence has been assumed by spectroscopy seeing its light change due to the Doppler shift as it moves about its orbit.

The question that arises from this arrangement is: how did it form? The main star, being so large and bright, must be relatively young - only a few million years old. However, a white dwarf is an old remnant of a dead star and must be very old. With the high gravitational field close to this remnant, how did a separate large body manage to form without being drawn into the white dwarf, which would have finally reached a size where it would have collapsed and formed a Type 1a supernova?


The other binary pair of stars is formed by an orange dwarf star orbiting with a red dwarf star. These are probably both quite old stars; they both orbit the main Regulus star about every thousand years. It is not known at present if there are any planets orbiting within this complex stellar system, but their orbits could be very strange indeed and unlikely to be stable enough for life to form.

The main Regulus star is also very unusual because it is spinning very fast indeed. This massive star completes a rotation every 16 hours, and this causes it to flatten out at the poles into what is called an oblate sphere. It has been calculated that if the rate of spin was only ten percent greater, the star would tear itself apart, as gravity would not be able to hold it together.

During a warm evening in May, why not try to spot Regulus once the early stars to appear after sunset - and wonder at the complex orbit that these stars must have around each other.



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


Benefice German Partnership Visit

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Jane Neill's Nature Notes

The merry month of May is when we finally shed the shackles of winter. It is the month associated through the ages with fertility; it brings much needed warmth and sunshine though we should heed the old proverb "ne'er cast a clout til May be out".



Fruit growers fear late frosts spoiling their budding orchards, and hailstones can knock off the young fruits. The hedgerows, gardens and woods burst into life. Cowparsley lines the lanes and woodland paths, may flowers bloom on the hawthorn hedges. The insects abound feasting on the abundant nectar.

As children, we loved to make daisy chains, to blow out the dandelion clocks to tell the time and place buttercup flowers under the chin to see if we loved butter!



It's also an anxious time, watching the skies for the return of the swifts arriving after their long journeys from Africa to breed. They are almost entirely aerial living birds - eating, sleeping and drinking on the wing and only rest to rear a brood. They can fly at 69mph - the fastest bird in level flight.



When the adults spend long times away foraging the nestlings go into a torpor to survive, their loud, screeching scream is a welcome addition to the crescendo of bird songs.



The talk on "Bespoke Shoes" was as much surprising as it was informative and interesting. Bill Byrd started his life with a foot deformity and suffered ill-fitting shoes.

He moved from his architectural career to be apprenticed to a shoe-maker and ended up making shoes for Royalty, celebrities and leaders from around the world. He showed us a replica, that he had made, of the earliest shoe ever found - dating to about 3,800 years ago.

He told us about the history of the manufacture of the 'lasts' that are made to enable the leather to be formed into shoes and, through these wooden and iron models of footwear, how modern shoes gained their shape. He ended by showing us a beautiful lady's shoe that he had finished making recently. As usual, the meeting ended with tea/coffee and cake.

Our May meeting is on the 10th at Badsey Remembrance Hall starting at 7.15 pm. This time, we leave beauty behind and delve into the darker subject of "From Pillory to Prison Cell" by Ginny Davies, a history of crime and punishment.
