

Badsey High Street was once a prominent watering hole!

A roadside pool (close to the house known as Pool House) provided a much-needed beverage for cattle and horses passing through the village in the 1870. It was erected after local farmer William Byrd was asked to tidy the area up and fit a pump and water trough at his own expense.

However, by 1897 the site was in need of repair. After an unsuccessful attempt to persuade Evesham Rural District Council to assume responsibility for the facility, the pump and trough were dismantled and a drinking fountain was built in its place.

The King George V Fountain has stood in the High Street since 1912 and is now obsolete, but provides a significant historical landmark for people to admire.




What Tree Wardens do?

Tree Wardens plant, protect and promote their local trees.

No training or experience in tree management is needed – just a love of trees and a few hours to spare. Some of the projects Tree Warden groups have done include:

- Arranging local tree planting days
- Pruning, watering caring for local trees
- Working with local authorities to plant & Damp; care for street trees
- Rejuvenating local woodlands
- Raising funds and finding land for tree planting projects
- Going into schools to talk about the value of trees.

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
The Hyades in Winter

The winter's night sky is quite wonderful, and the most magnificent jewel is probably Orion with its super giant stars and nebula. It also acts as a pointer to other equally wonderful stellar objects. If you follow the line of the three stars of Orion's belt up and to the right, you will find a grey sort of smudge surrounding a group of bright stars. This is the Pleiades or Seven Sisters, a star cluster of about 3,000 stars some 444 light years away.

Midway between Orion and the Pleaides you will find the head of the constellation of Taurus, the Bull, with the red/orange star of Aldebaran forming the eye of the Bull. The other four stars making the "V" in the head of Taurus are part of the star Cluster known as The Hyades. This is the closest star cluster to the earth. If you give your eyes a little time to adjust to the night sky, you can just make out this open cluster with the naked eye, and it is even better if you use a pair of binoculars.

The bright star of Aldebaran is not actually part of the cluster, it is just in the same line of view from the point of view of the earth. The Hyades are about 150 light years from the earth, while Aldebaran is only 65 light years away. The Hyades formed as a group of stars about 625 million years ago; the stars are mere youngsters in astronomical terms! This was during the Precambrian Period on earth, before life began on our planet. Since this time, the gravity acting between the stars in the Hyades has thrown the stars apart as they dance around each other.





Orion & Taurus

We are used to thinking of gravity as pulling objects together, but in space it can equally throw stars away from each other like sling shots. The result is that, given enough time, many clusters of stars will dissipate. The central core of the star cluster is ten light years across and contains around 500 stars.

The theory describing the formation and evolution of star clusters predicts that there should be an even distribution from small brown dwarfs up to blue super giants. However, the Hyades shows a deficit of both the smaller and larger stars. Analysis of the chemistry of the stars within the cluster shows a distinct commonality, so that it is possible to identify which stars were created as part of the group.

It has been known since 1869 that there are other stars that appear to be the same distance from the earth as the Hyades, and have a similar motion around the centre of the Milky Way. Recent studies have shown that in addition to the 501 stars within the Hyades itself, there are 292 stars up to 550 light years in front of the cluster, and another 237 stars trailing behind by up to 230 light years. The spread of stars from the original cluster have probably been spread out by the gravitational stirring from the barrel shaped centre of the Milky Way.

Recent analysis of the measurements taken from the Gaia Satellite suggests that there could be a at least one black hole within the Hyades, or at least very close to it. If there is a black hole, it would be the closest to the earth.

On a clear cold night, look out for the Hyades and wonder at the beauty of the closest star cluster to the earth, and the possibility of the overpowering nature of the closest black hole.






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Jane Neill's Nature Notes
