The "good news" is that every single person in our community is valuable, that we do belong, and that we are connected to each other in some way because we are all loved by God. So, I invite you to explore that sense of connection further if you would like to. There are lots of things going on in our villages where people come together to make some brilliant events happen within the community, and we also have quite a bit going on and events being planned within our church congregations over the next few weeks and months, too – watch this space!

But whatever you do, I hope that you feel known, valued and cared for, whether you have lived here all your life, or if you just moved in last week.

### When Evesham Rocked London - A Talk by Garry Smout

In 1980 an Evesham band, The Photos, had a Top 5 album in the charts. In the early 80s, a reader begged a London-based music publication, Zig Zag, to stop doing so many articles on bands from Evesham. In 1982, The Daily Mirror published the magazine 'Women in Rock' which featured two Evesham based singers.

What was going on in Evesham?

This talk will cover the origins of how this unprecedented phenomenon came about, a path that goes back to the 70s, and, of the three bands of the period in question, the early 80s will focus on one particular band, The Dancing Did, as they used Evesham and the surrounding area as their muse. One of the songs even has the town's name in the subtitle: A Fruit Picking Fantasy (The Time Bo Diddley Nearly Came to Evesham)!

- A hand-tied posy of flowers (no more than 20cm wide)

### Puzzler: Did you know edition

The organ in St James Church was installed in the early 1960's. It was built by the organ builders James Walker, who hold a Royal Warrant. It replaced an organ built by Nicholsons of Malvern that came out of St Helen's Church Worcester – reputedly the oldest church in Worcester – in 1947.

It was not a great success, as it was very dirty due to cooking fumes as the church had been used as a YMCA canteen during and after the Second World War!

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




### The Final Sightings of the Winter Triangle By Stargazer

Passing the 1st of March always brings the hope of warmer weather and the springtime that lies ahead. March generally brings warmer evenings, and offers a last chance to get out to see the winter constellations before they disappear from the evening sky until next autumn.

There is so much to see in the winter sky, with the magnificent constellation of Orion acting as a guide to the many wonders of star clusters, and nebulae. Orion, Taurus and The Pleiades lay in a line and are wonders to behold in their own rights. During March, they



all set below the western horizon at around midnight; when the clocks change at the end of the month and we get into April, they will set just after sunset before disappearing completely. So, this month is your last chance for six to eight months to observe these wonderful objects!

Also setting at about the same time is a group of bright stars or asterism known as the Winter Triangle. This is made up of Betelgeuse (the red giant on the left-hand shoulder of Orion), Sirius (the bright star also known as the dog star) and Procyon. I have featured Betelgeuse and Sirius in several articles over the past few years, but I have made little mention of Procyon. Together, they form a noticeably almost-perfect equilateral triangle in the night sky.

Betelgeuse is a large red giant of a star that is reaching the end of its life having expanded and cooled. Its distance from Earth is quite difficult to measure, and it is thought to be between 400 and 600 light years away. If our eyes could see into the near infra-red, Betelgeuse would be the brightest star in the night sky by a long way! It is expected that it will reach the end of its life as a star in the next 100,000 years when it will explode as a supernova, and it will be seen as bright as the moon for about three months or so.

Sirius is the brightest star in our night sky because it is one of our closest neighbours, being only eight and a half light years away. It is about twice the size of our sun (and about twenty-five times the brightness!) and can be seen as a blue-white star. Sirius is a double star and has a smaller white dwarf partner, and they orbit each other every fifty years.

Procyon, the third member of this triangle, is about one and a half times as massive as our sun and also has a much smaller white dwarf star partner. It is about eleven and a half light years away, making it also a close neighbour to our own sun. The two components of Procyon orbit each other every 41 years at a distance of 15 astronomical units - that is about as far as Uranus is from our sun!

The smaller Procyon B star is a white dwarf star that has reached the end of its life, and is now cooling down incredibly slowly. About a billion years ago, this star expanded into a red giant and finally blew off its outer layers, leaving only its dense core of carbon. Gravity is pulling this core together, but there isn't enough mass to produce any further nuclear reactions. The collapsed core, with its dense gravity, is in a state known as electron-degenerated matter where the electrons around the core of the atoms in the star are squeezed as close as possible.

In the vacuum of space, this small stellar remnant with its small surface area has nowhere to lose its heat, and it is not known how many billions of years it will take for it to cool further. So, it remains in space faintly glowing as an Earth-sized speck adjacent to its younger, brighter and larger neighbour.

If it is not too cold over the next month, why not step out into the garden and look out for the winter triangle in the southwestern skies in the early evening? It is very easy to spot as a large equilateral triangle, and you will be able to marvel at three stars that are quite different to our own sun.



Waxwings (Bombycilla garrulus) only visit the UK in the winter, the numbers that reach us depend on the availability of berries on the Continent. The UK can receive anything from a few dozen individuals to as many as 12,000 each year. Most years we attract at least a few birds and they usually arrive from October and can be seen up until April.

### Jane Neill's Nature Notes...

"If March comes in like a lion it will go out like a lamb. If it comes in like a lamb it will go out like a lion", as the saying goes.

I was envious to hear that waxwings have been seen in Badsey - a bird I have never spotted! They are heading back to Scandinavia to breed while the chiffchaff is returning. The melodious sound of the skylark fills the air, the white blackthorn flowers are sweetly scented and ground ivy and daisies spring into life.

Spot the deer browsing in our fields and woodlands; ruminants and herbivores, like cows and sheep, they feed mainly at dawn and dusk. We have seven species in Britain, with the red and roe being our native deer. Fallow deer were introduced by the Romans; William the Conqueror, a great hunter himself, protected the deer from being over hunted by imposing harsh laws on his subjects.



Sita deer came from Japan in the 17th century, and Chinese muntjacs escaped from 'Stately Home' parks in more recent times.

Reindeer, a Scottish native until the 12th century, were hunted to extinction until a Lapland farmer reintroduced them. A Christmas treat in Badsey!
