

Summer, Saints and Special Days

During the year there are special days announced in the media. Some are more serious than others, and the month of June is no exception. Special days in June include World Bicycle Day on the 3rd, D-Day on the 6th, World Juggling Day on the 15th, the Summer Solstice and Take Your Dog to Work Day on the 21st, Pineapple Day on the 27th and International Mud Day on the 29th!

I have no idea who dreams some of these special days up, but we take more notice of some dates than others, depending on our interests.

The church is no different to other organisations - we have many special days throughout the year. During June, our hangings in the church will be green as we are in the time period called 'Ordinary Time', but on any Saints' Day our altar frontal and other hangings are changed to red, to notify us that it is a special day.

We have a few Saints' Days in June: St Barnabas Day is the 11th, the birthday of John the Baptist is the 24th and the 29th is the Festival of both St Peter and St Paul. On that date in 67 AD, St Peter and St Paul were martyred in Rome during the persecutions ordered by the Emperor Nero against the Christians, and often these two stalwarts of our Christian faith are shown in church windows and statues. Peter can be seen holding the Keys of the Kingdom in his hands, while Paul brandishes the sword of martyrdom like a weapon for battle.

So, are our Saints' days as important to us as any other day? In our busy lives, have we time to stop and reflect on what day it is? I find it quite useful to be reminded of what day it is; there are days I must remember like wedding anniversaries and birthdays, so if I am reminded that there is a reason for me to stop and think about what day it is (or whose day it is), that can't be bad.

I'm not sure I would take a lot of time thinking about International Mud Day, but because of my faith I would take a lot of time thinking about St Peter and St Paul, and how their lives have impacted mine. I wonder, after you have read this piece, which day you would stop and think about? I do hope that whatever day it is, you pause long enough for it to have some meaning and maybe even change your outlook for that day. Here's to Happy Reflective Days in June!

Honouring the fallen: 80 years since D-Day

For Your Tomorrow: The People's Tribute

On Thursday 6th June 2024, the world will mark the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings that happened along the beaches of Normandy. It is important that we remember all who fought for the freedom we enjoy today, and 2024 is an opportunity to celebrate peace, liberty, and reconciliation.

For Your Tomorrow: The People's Tribute is an installation that will be erected close to the British Memorial Pavilion, and features 1475 handmade life-size soldier silhouettes, the number representing the number of British Troops that died from injuries on D-Day.

In March I was privileged, along with a group of my work colleagues, to be allowed time to get involved with painting and putting together some of these silhouettes. and to fix woollen poppies made by the Women's Institutes to panels that will also be displayed with these. Our group was one of 80 organisations to help in this project.

The Normandy 80 installation has been assembled and painted by teams and groups invited from all walks of life,

including military personnel, veterans, Harley Davidson Remembrance Riders, Women's Institute Members, NHS workers, school children, scouts, business supporters, choirs and music groups and many others. The materials used are taken from recycled road signs.

We also visited the headquarters of this operation in Stanton Harcourt, Oxfordshire and met the organisers Dan and Janette Barton, who explained the story behind this ambitious installation. The public will be able to see this in Ver sur Mer, Normandy close to "Gold Beach" as part of the D-Day 80 commemorations until 31st August 2024.

The story behind the mystery 'M' By Stargazer

Over the past few years that I have been writing these articles for the Community News, I have often referred to objects in the night sky by their catalogue name, such as M31 for the Andromeda Galaxy or Nebula. You may well ask why it has an 'M' number rather than 'G' for 'Galaxy'.

The reason reaches back to the 18th century, when one of the first catalogues of non-stellar objects was created. The catalogue of one hundred brighter night sky objects is named after a French astronomer called Charles Messier, who lived between 1730 and 1817. He was a greatly respected astronomer who was passionate about the strangely unpredictable objects called comets.



Messier used a four-inch (100mm) telescope, which is small by modern day amateur standards, and he spent much of his spare time just searching the night skies for these elusive objects. He was also observing using the human eye only, as this was long before photography which transformed astronomy in the early 20th century. His endeavours paid off, as he discovered 13 comets within his lifetime!

We now know that comets are irregular shaped conglomerates of ice, ammonia, rocks and dry ice that orbit the sun in highly elliptical orbits. They can spend hundreds or even thousands of years in the far reaches of the solar system where temperatures are extremely low. Then, for a few months, their orbit takes them close to the sun and they begin to heat up. As water and other volatile chemicals begin to vaporise, they develop a cloud around them before they grow their familiar tail as they get even closer to the sun.

It was this faint cloud around objects that moved slowly across the heavens that Messier was searching for. Unfortunately, Messier kept coming across fuzzy, diffused objects in the skies that were not stars, and as they didn't appear to move, they were not comets. He called these grey fuzzy objects nebulae (or clouds), and published a catalogue of these objects to aid other comet hunters so that they would not waste time looking at them. The original catalogue contained 45 objects, and over the years it has been expanded to 110 objects!

It was in the early years of the 20th century that telescopes and photographic techniques improved to the point that we were able to see what these nebulae really were. The first object in Messier's list, M1, is the remnant of a star that exploded as a super nova in 1054 and is also known as the Crab Nebula. The list also contains Star Clusters, Nebulae such as the Great Orion Nebula, M42, and galaxies such as the Andromeda Galaxy, M31. There is no structure to the list, as Messier didn't know what any of the objects were.

There are many other catalogues of stars and galaxies that are used by amateurs and professionals alike, but if an object has a Messier number, it is often used as a convenient shorthand that everyone seems to understand. The list is particularly popular today for astronomers living in northern latitudes, because Messier made most of his observations from France and all the objects in the catalogue can be seen from anywhere in Europe and the United States. There are no objects listed from the southern hemisphere.

As Messier was using such a small telescope, he was only observing the brightest objects in the sky. But with modern amateur telescopes and modern photographic techniques, these objects can be seen relatively easily in their full glory from your back garden. Some enthusiasts gather in the early spring when all the objects can be seen on a single night. So, with the weather improving why, not have your own Messier party?

June gives us the longest days of the year and the traditional month for haymaking, and the old rhyme tells us 'a swarm of bees in June is worth a silver spoon'.

In June, the little blue and ringlet join the butterflies already on the wing. The dragonflies and damselflies emerge along the brookside, and look out for the banded demoiselle with its brilliant blue body and distinct black banded wings.

Our fields and gardens host the fledglings of robin, blackbird and starlings, whose parents may still be rearing another brood. It may also give us a rare glimpse of the elusive sparrowhawk!

Fresh green leaves turn darker, and the tiny fruits and seeds start to swell on the trees. The countryside is bursting with wild flowers: herb robert, mallow, clover, bryony, cranesbill, St John's wort and tall foxglove to name a few. Meadowsweet also thrives in the damper ground. It was valued for its medicinal

properties; it was the first aspirin, relieving fevers and was added to mead as a sweetener. It was also strewn over floors as its long lasting fragrance perfumed homes. It was actually Queen Elizabeth I's favourite floor covering! Today, it is a wonderful food source for several species of moth larvae.
