#### Dear Friends,

How do you feel about change? Are you a big fan of new tech, ahead of the curve with wireless chargers and a phone with a folding screen – or do you find much-needed security in a world changing far more quickly than is comfortable, by doing things carefully in a time honoured way, with tried and trusted tools and methods?

My son is definitely Team Tech, but I am way behind, trailing reluctantly in his wake. I still listen to CDs sometimes, and I finally made it onto Twitter just in time to see everyone departing for other platforms (where IS everyone?). But I do try to recognise when change needs to happen, especially when I can see that new ways of doing things can help us do a job better, or will bring a fresh viewpoint. We stopped holding Evensong services here in the Vale quite a while before I arrived (in November last year), as very few people wanted to come to them anymore.

But we are holding our first 'Forest Church' in a couple of weeks, where we will gather in one of the churchyards, hoping - or rather, expecting - to find some much-needed peace among the trees, flowers and birdsong. We will take time to feel the grass beneath our feet, the sunshine on our faces, and allow the sights and sounds around us to help us breathe freely, or just to sit quietly and peacefully in God's presence and with each other. (If you would like to come to a session, please get in touch and I can send you details.)

I am also a fan of new (or new-ish) technology when it can solve a current problem that stops us doing the things that we want to continue doing. So, in our Sunday morning services (we still have these most weeks in at least two of our churches in the Vale) or any other services (weddings, funerals, baptisms) we often still want to sing - and while our hymns and songs are drawn from old and new material, we sometimes can't get an organist.

While we would love to be able to sing along to "live" music (and if you play a keyboard, or anything else we could sing with, we would love to hear from you!) – we are able to use Bluetooth speakers and playlists on phones to enable the music to shake the aisles.

I also really love seeing "old" ideas worked out in new ways, with people bringing their own creativity and ideas to church events and special services throughout the year. We have had some really beautiful poems or other texts read alongside the Bible readings in baptisms, weddings and memorial services. Last week I watched as a bride came walking down the aisle towards me, accompanied not only by her dad – but also her (beautifully-behaved) dog who sat carefully between bride and groom, avoiding the dress and flowers, all the way through to the end.

In our changing world, where so many people struggle to get through a day, what are the things (habits, technology, people) that help make your life just that bit easier, or enable you to rise to a particular challenge? And where are the places - or the people - that you can turn to when you need some peace, where you can feel welcomed, listened to, and where in turn your voice can be heard and your gifts can be recognised?

I hope that anyone could find a reassuring welcome at any of our services or our midweek events, regardless of whether we are using any technology or none, whether we are inside or outside, formal in the pews or relaxing with a coffee on a bench outside in the sunshine. All are welcome in this place.



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
# Sightings of the Swan

The constellation of Cygnus, also known as The Swan, is one of the most compelling and easily recognisable features of the summer night sky. It only takes a little imagination to see the constellation as a large swan, with its long neck and outspread wings flying each night across the summer's sky.

This constellation is rich in stellar diversity, containing some of the brightest and most intriguing stars observed from Earth. It lies on the plane of the Milky Way and contains a wealth of interesting astronomical objects.

Cygnus is steeped in various myths, most famously from Greek mythology. One story tells of Zeus transforming himself into a swan to seduce Leda, the Spartan queen. Another myth involves the musician Orpheus, who was turned into a swan after his death and placed among the stars.



Of the stars that make up the constellation, Deneb (Alpha Cygni), the tail of the swan, is the brightest star in Cygnus. It is a blue-white supergiant and one of the most distant stars visible to the naked eye, roughly 2,600 lightyears from Earth. Deneb, which means 'tail' in Arabic, is part of the Summer Triangle asterism, along with Vega in Lyra and Altair in Aquila.

Its immense luminosity and distance make it a vital standard candle for measuring astronomical distances. Deneb's future is just as spectacular; in only a few million years it is expected to end its life in a supernova explosion, enriching the interstellar medium with heavy elements.

Another significant star is Albireo, located at the beak of the swan. Albireo is a famous double star, visible through small telescopes, with a striking colour contrast between its components: one golden and one blue. This beautiful pairing is situated about 430 light-years from Earth. The physical separation of these stars and their distinct colours make Albireo a favourite target for stargazers exploring the wonders of binary systems.

61 Cygni is one of the nearest star systems to Earth, at just over 11 lightyears away. This binary system comprises two orange dwarf stars, both smaller and cooler than the Sun. It was the first star system to have its distance measured using parallax by Friedrich Bessel in 1838, making 61 Cygni historically significant in the field of astrometry. Additionally, its proximity and similarity to the Sun have made it a target in the search for exoplanets and potential habitable environments.

Located at the heart of Cygnus, Sadr marks the swan's chest. This yellow-white supergiant is about 1,800 lightyears away and is embedded within a rich field of stars and nebulae. Sadr, also known as Gamma Cygni, is surrounded by the Gamma Cygni Nebula (IC 1318), an emission nebula that adds to the visual splendour of this region. The star's association with active star-forming regions makes it a subject of interest in the study of stellar nurseries and the lifecycle of stars.

Perhaps the most intriguing system in Cygnus is Cygnus X-1, a strong X-ray source that harbours a stellar-mass black hole. Located approximately 6,000 lightyears away, this system consists of a supergiant star and a black hole in a tight orbit. Cygnus X-1 was one of the first sources to provide compelling evidence for the existence of black holes, significantly influencing the study of these enigmatic objects. The X-ray emissions result from the accretion of material from the supergiant onto the black hole, offering a dramatic view of stellar evolution and death.

The constellation of Cygnus is a fascinating subject of study, rich in mythological, historical, and scientific importance. Its unique combination of bright stars, deep-sky objects, and significant astronomical discoveries makes it a vital part of both the cultural heritage and scientific endeavours in understanding the universe. Whether seen with the naked eye, through binoculars, or with powerful telescopes, Cygnus continues to inspire and intrigue skywatchers and astronomers alike.

So, why not take a few moments on a clear warm evening over the next few months to look up at this wonder.

# Jane Neill's Nature Notes...



July is at the heart of our summer, though the days are heginning to shorten. Holidays are a time to explore the countryside and seaside with all that nature has to offer. Wild flowers abound, and woundwort was certainly known from Greek times onward for its healing properties. The crushed leaves were used on cuts and wounds and when made into an ointment, a cure for aching joints.

Irritating though we find flies, they are a vital insect species. There are up to 100,000 types of flies worldwide, with 5,200 in the British Isles. They include the largest, the cranefly, that hatch from the leather jackets nurtured in the ground whereas the blood-sucking mosquitoes emerge from water-borne larvae. Flies such as the beefly and hoverflies are seen feeding on flowers. Many prey on aphids, so are the gardeners' friends. There are flies that feed on

carrion such as the bluebottles, blowflies, house flies and horse flies. Swallows, house martins and swifts feed on flies on the wing. It is said that when swallows fly, low rain is on the way. It's a sight that always takes my breath away.
