A visit to the **Evesham Car Boot** last month was indeed a most pleasant one! There is a food van there, as well as good access to parking including disabled parking facilities. For those wishing to have a summer clear out, selling prices are also very reasonable - cars £7, vans £10 and gates do open at 5:30am but there is more of a relaxed vibe about the place as opposed to the hectic crowds of Southam for example. There is also no need to book a pitch, just turn up!

National Peace Day

Did you know that National Peace Day following World War I was almost held in August?

Although the guns fell silent on 11th November 1918, peace wasn't officially declared until 28th June 1919. The British War Cabinet initially wanted to wait until August for celebrations to be held; however, King George V was adamant about the date being 6th July.

But how did Badsey celebrate the end of the war?

Villagers of Badsey came together for a variety of activities to celebrate Peace Day. There were children's sports, church bell-ringing, a special service at St James Church (for which the Vicar at the time, Rev. Allsebrook, played the organ in the absence of an organist), a competition for the best decorated bicycle and perambulator, and tea was had by both children and those over the age of 70. A procession through the village was planned, but quickly aborted due to relentless rainfall, and the sports events that were also postponed due to the rain were resumed two days later in front of a large crowd. Former resident Charles Binyon's diary accounts for this day, and reads:

"After tea we finished the children's sports in the Stockey. There were a great many people there. The other sports were held at the same time. We had some excellent tussles. It is interesting to see how certain families shine on these occasions. The potato race was very popular, this was open to boys and girls, but although some of the girls got into the final, in the end the prize winners were all boys. The obstacle race was won by some quite small boys. In the high jump, the winner, Clarence Willis jumped 3' 8". We finished about 8.30. The slow bicycle race was then on. Philip Crisp won this well. Other races went on until nearly 10. Then I came home to illuminate this house, which I did with candles stuck in flowerpots behind coloured glasses. I had just time to join the torchlight procession which looked very pretty. We went all round the village. We got home about 10.30. After there were some most brilliant lights on Broadway Hill. I could see to read by it here."



August & The Little Bear

As the year moves on into August the light evenings are beginning to draw in. The astronomical twilight that lasts all night in May, June and July has passed, and we now get true black dark skies again.

This month's stargazing object is visible throughout the year, but has been obscured by the lighter northern evenings. Almost everyone would recognise the constellation of The Plough, also known as Ursa Major, or the Great Bear. It is also widely known that the end two stars point towards the Pole Star, that is also known as Polaris. However, what is less known is that Polaris is part of its own constellation that appears to be a mini version of the Plough - known as Ursa Minor, or the Little Bear.



At present, the Plough is low down in the northwestern sky in the early evening. Ursa Minor is on the opposite side of the Pole Star, and is therefore higher in the northeastern sky and in a good position to be seen. The stars forming Ursa Minor, apart from Polaris, are quite faint and can only be seen when the sky is very dark. These stars are easily obscured by twilight or the glow from streetlights; we are quite lucky here in our village that the skies are just dark enough to see this wonder of the night sky.

Polaris lies at the heart of Ursa Minor. It is a triple-star system consisting of a yellow super giant and two smaller stars that are just a little larger than our Sun. This system is 340 light years away. Polaris acts as a reliable reference point for navigation since it appears nearly stationary, while the other stars in the sky rotate around it. This is why astronomers in the northern hemisphere use Polaris to quickly align their telescopes.

The second brightest star in Ursa Minor is Kochab, which is a red giant and appears to have a yellow-orange hue. A red giant is a star at the end of its life, and Kochab has expanded to the extent that its radius is now 44 times the size of the Sun. It is 130 light years away, and it has a large planetary companion that is about six times the mass of Jupiter and orbits the star every 522 days. The other stars in Ursa Minor, in order of brightness are:

Pherkad

A large supergiant star that has a white hue and is 490 light years away. It is incredibly hot with an outer temperature of 8280K, compared with the Sun's outer temperature of only 5700K. It is 1100 times more luminous that the Sun and has a radius of 15 times that of the Sun.

<u>Yildun</u>

Another supergiant star that is similar to Pherkad and is 172 light years away.

Epsilon Ursae Minoris

A binary star that does not have a traditional name and is only known by its catalogue name. The two stars orbit each other every forty days and are 300 light years away.

Zeta Ursae Minoris

A white star that is six times larger than the Sun and is therefore a great deal hotter. It is 370 light years away and spins so fast that there is a bulge at its equator.

Eta Ursae Minoris

A yellow-white star that is a little larger than the Sun. It is 98 light years away and may have an orbiting companion star.

Strangely, despite being at different distances from our solar system, all these stars appear to be drifting towards the Sun at varying velocities of between three and ten kilometres per second. As the stars in Ursa Minor are relatively dim compared to other constellations, it is a little challenging to observe them under heavy light pollution. However, by finding a dark location and allowing one's eyes to adjust, Ursa Minor's characteristic shape becomes easier to discern. If you get the chance to sit outside on a warm evening in August, why not take a little time to identify the intriguing constellation of Ursa Minor?

Jane Neill's Nature Notes...









August marks the end of summer with cooler nights, though the days are warm. The meadows, woods and hedgerows are abundant with insects large and small, and our footpaths are full of surprising plants.

Good King Henry is a green plant easily unnoticed. It's a member of the goosefoot family, introduced by the Romans as a vegetable, and the leaves were used as spinach is today. It also likes well manured ground.

August is the month our gardens fall silent, as the birds take advantage of the natural larder at a time they moult their feathers ready for the winter. Moulting can make flying difficult; geese and ducks are completely grounded while they moult. It can take up to six weeks so it is a stressful time for the birds.

Young birds, such as goldfinches and robins, have dull plummage to protect them from territorial males at this time. We had a fine example of how territorial birds are when we recently had a rotten chestnut tree cut down in the village.

The jackdaws displayed real dismay at the loss of their roost by wheeling round and round en masse vocalising their anguish for some days. Happily, they've moved to the healthier chestnut tree next door!


