Today, there are very few threshing contractors because the majority of farmers have their own combine harvester, which with only a one-man operation can carry out a complete harvest in a fraction of the time. What a difference 70 years can make!

In the first book of the Bible, Genesis, we read, "For as long as Earth lasts, planting and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night, will never stop." We plant the seed, then by faith we wait, and then finally we harvest and enjoy the fruit.

During the next few weeks there will be much harvesting taking place on our village farms, which should bring a time of rejoicing and thanks that, once again, God has helped us to accomplish that which He has always promised: a harvest to feed us, even if the weather has not been the best.

Watch out for the Harvest Festival celebration in your local church and go along to join in giving thanks that once again, "The harvest has been safely gathered in".

There will also be guided walks to visit these locations at 11am and 2pm on both days.


Refreshments will also be available at the church.

Take a trip to Berkeley Castle and Dr Jenner's House on

Tuesday 10th September 2024!

This promises to be an interesting and informative day out. The coach will leave from The Wheatsheaf, Badsey at 9:30am, returning to Badsey for 5:30pm. The cost will be £35, and will include:

- Coach travel
- A guided tour of Berkeley Castle
- Entrance to Dr Jenner's House

Lunch can be purchased from the Kitchen Garden Café, or you can take a picnic.

Berkeley Castle has been the home of the Berkeley family for 850 years and is one of the March castles built to keep out the Welsh. It is the oldest building in the country to be inhabited by the same family who built it. Its archives date from 1154 and contain around 25,000 documents relating to the estate.

We will begin our visit with a guided tour of the castle, followed by lunch. Then we will visit Dr Jenner's house, where Edward Jenner developed the idea of smallpox vaccination, and see the Temple of Vaccinia where he established a free vaccination clinic in his garden. There will then be free time to follow the Jenner Trail (details available from Dr Jenner's House), or to visit St Mary's Church before returning to the coach to leave at 4:30pm.

Hot on the heels of a friendly match with Redhill Archery Club on Saturday 3rd August, Evesham Archery Club played host to ArcheryGB's 50+ Championships! Archers from all over the country descended on the field of Badsey Community & Sports Club to shoot at 50 and 60 metres, with competitions for medals in the men's and women's recurve, compound, barebow, and longbow categories.

After a quick morning qualification round, Stuart Wood-Evans led the men's recurve with 629/720, complemented in the women's recurve by Alison Page with 582. In the compound, Stephen Edward (678) and Pauline Burfitt (660) led the way, with Mike Barnett (604) and Patricia Hotchkiss (587) leading the barebow division. Finally, in the longbow division, Kevin Macey led the men with 410 and Rachil Cecil led the women with 280.

The event broke for lunch before the all-important head to heads! These would decide the final medal positions, with a top-plays-bottom-seed format, eventually whittling down to the final winners.

Now that we are into September, we have darker evenings and (hopefully) good enough weather to bring warm clear nights for observing. This time of year is often perfect for star gazing, and at present we have an ideal object to look out for in the evening sky.

The planet Saturn is in opposition on Sunday 8th September - that means that it is in a perfect position for early evening viewing, being on the opposite side of the Sun to Earth. The word 'planet' means 'wanderer', and they are given this name because the planets wander through the constellations forming the zodiac, and while in opposition, Saturn, like any other planet, undergoes periods known as 'retrograde motion'.

Although Saturn primarily moves eastward, it occasionally appears to appear to move westward against the background stars. This occurs when Earth, in its faster orbit, overtakes

and passes the slower-moving Saturn. Saturn goes into retrograde motion approximately once every year for around four and a half months. The exact duration and frequency of retrograde motion can vary slightly, depending on the relative positions of Earth, Saturn, and the Sun.

Astrologers appear to place great importance on the annual motion of the planets, but looking at many websites, their advice is quite vague, and I am afraid completely contradictory. The apparent motion of a planet which is some ten times further from the Sun than Earth has no influence on our lives, and most people living in cities have never seen Saturn in our skies.

In our village we are lucky enough to be able to see Saturn quite easily with the naked eye. At present, Saturn appears in our southern skies as a bright, star-like object. A good set of binoculars or a small telescope will normally show the famous rings of the planet, but unfortunately at present they are nearly edge on to us and may be difficult to see. However, you may be able to see the brightest moon of Saturn, Titan, that appears as a small bright dot alongside the planet.

Titan is the second largest moon in the solar system and has a dense, opaque atmosphere. It is also the only moon of another planet that we have so far visited with a lander and received back images of the surface! Titan's surface has lakes and rivers, but these are lakes and rivers of methane, not water. At roughly ten times further from the Sun than we are, very little of the Sun's heat arrives at Saturn and the surface temperature of Titan is about 180 degrees below 0 Centigrade.

The Huygens probe landed on Titan in January 2005 and took some wonderful photos of the surface, showing a riverbed with pebbles that were probably formed from solid water, ice, and methane. There are plans at present to send another probe to Titan, only this time it will take the form of a helicopter with the hope of gaining even more exciting images of this strange alien land-scape. The Dragon Fly mission is due to take off in July 2028, and arrive at Titan during the mid-2030s.

There has been a small helicopter on the surface of Mars, known as Ingenuity, but Dragon Fly will be much larger. The lower gravity on Titan and thick atmosphere means that it can be much larger and carry a heavier payload. Dragon Fly will weigh about three quarters of a ton. Apart from cameras, it will carry a seismometer, instruments to measure atmospheric pressure and wind speed, as well being able to sample soil. This will be a very exciting project!

So, on a clear evening in September, why not take a few moments to look for a bright dot in the southeast that is the planet Saturn. If you have a small telescope, you will not be at all disappointed by the sight that awaits you.



Jane Neill's Nature Notes...

Autumn starts in September, bringing misty mornings and dewy evenings. Red admiral butterflies feed on the fallen plums and apples found in the orchards and hedgerows, and peacock, tortoiseshell, speckled wood, and comma butterflies are still on the wing. Plants disperse their seeds in a variety of ways: by wind, birds feeding, explosive pods, and seeds sticking onto passing animal fur and clothes.



Ants are still active; they are social insects related to bees and wasps. Ants live in nests containing hundreds and sometimes thousands of infertile female workers, males, and queens, which produce the tiny white eggs I've seen when disturbing a nest. There are more than 30 species in Britain, but the black garden and red ants live most closely with us in our gardens.



Ants are one of the most numerous and important animals on Earth; they control greenfly and aphids by extracting their honeydew. They also feed on invertebrates and other ants. However, in the garden and in pots, they can cause irreparable damage to the roots of plants and raise unwelcome humps on our lawns. The red ant can sting, but no more than an irritation. The green woodpecker is a welcome visitor, because it loves eating ants!

Help! Did the clock Dong instead of Ding?

Those of you who listen closely to the church clock striking may have noticed some irregularities in the chimes over the past couple of months. The clock had its annual service a couple of weeks ago by Time Assured. The clock's time keeping mechanism has no problems and is running to time, as this was fully overhauled when the clock face was restored in 2021.

Time Assured, one of the best specialists in church clocks in the country, are the Heineken of Clock specialists in that "they reach the parts that other specialists don't!" They have found that the very convoluted mechanism that activates the hammers to strike the bells is in a parlous state. We have been unable to establish when this was last refurbished but it is certainly not within living memory. The clock was installed in the church Tower in 1903, over 120 years ago, so it is to be expected that wear and tear will have taken place. We humans often find that we suffer wear and tear to our joints long before that!

Time Assured have quoted for a repair to the system which, as you can imagine, is not an easy job. The whole of the train of wires and some of the levers will have to be replaced, these of course are not off the shelf items and will need to be manufactured using the old ones as templates. Anyone who restores classic cars will know the expensive feeling when spare parts are no longer available and new ones have to be made from scratch.

This, as you can imagine, is a time-consuming project and is reflected in the quoted total price of £3120. Our forebears left an amount of money to the church in their wills for clock repairs, but this will only cover about 10% of the cost.

We need to raise the sum of £2,800 to complete the repairs and thus preserve a part of the village heritage. If you can help by donating towards the repairs the whole village community will be grateful. You can do this in various ways: -

If you are able to GIFT AID your donation, please include a statement to that effect with your donation giving your name and address as that will enable us to claim an extra 25% from HMRC. The Appeal will run to the end of October 2024 unless the sum is reached earlier. In the event of any surplus funds, these will be held in the reserves designated for any future Church Clock maintenance.
