

Hi everyone,

I'm writing this mid-November, but it must be time to start getting things ready for

Christmas! While out walking with the dog earlier today I saw the first Christmas tree on display in a nearby garden, the lights shining so brightly in the gathering dusk - it looked really lovely and very cheering to anyone walking past.

Christmas "to do" lists! Do you have one? When I was a child, "getting ready for Christmas" was all about opening the numbered door on our Advent calendar (which I often had to share with my little sister), and looking forward to the Christmas party on the last day of term after the carol service and Nativity the day before. Years ago, Advent calendars were all

pretty similar, with little variation between them. Glitter or not, chocolates behind the doors or not, and some fairly trad pictures of a suspiciously clean stable with Mary, Joseph, baby Jesus, and a couple of animals looking on, plus a few blue-eyed and fair-haired angels up on the stable roof.

But these days there is so much more variety! Pop-up or slot-together calendars, calendars with anything from varieties of gin or make-up to Lego and coffee pods. There are calendars covered in snowmen, or dogs wearing tartan scarves, calendars with Christmas gonks or trains, or calendars decorated with superheroes or snowflakes. You can go full Mary-and-Joseph-and-thewee-donkey or avoid absolutely any mention of "the reason for the season", if that's the way you want to do things. I think it's great that there is so much more choice, allowing everyone who wants to to find some way of counting down the days in a style that puts a smile on your face when you open that little door.

An Advent calendar is designed to give you a moment of happiness and feel that positive sense of anticipation - completely opposite to that stress which can gather when grown-up you looks at the "to do" list! And yet, whatever age we are, Advent is about getting ready for Christmas. It's about clearing space (physical or spiritual) so you can look forward with joy and excitement to the birth of a baby who was - and still is - the sign that God is with us, that He loves us, cares about us, and wants to be with us where we are.

This is such good news that the Church goes right on telling that story in any way we can - because it is a story that we believe is still worth telling, and one which the world still needs to hear. This year we are telling it with candle-lit carol services and Nativities in the traditional way - but you can also open our doors at various places and times in the Advent season to cheer the arrival of Mary and Joseph. Join a posse of "Celebrating Santas" (Sunday 8th December), dress up at a "DIY Nativity" (Sunday 22nd December), or help tell the story of the Nosy Mouse on Christmas Day itself.





Venus sparkles bright in the winter night

This autumn and winter is a season for planets. In the last two months, Stargazer has looked at Saturn and Jupiter. This month, we look at the brightest and most easy to spot of the planets: Venus.

If you look towards the southwest just before sunset, and for a couple of hours after, you will see a very bright object that can easily be mistaken for an aircraft. The planet Venus will be with us for the next couple of months, and there should be plenty of opportunity to spot it despite the winter weather.

Venus was called "Earth's twin" as it is nearly the same size, but much closer to the sun. This was until Russia sent their Venera probes there



between the late 1960s and the 1980s; they discovered that the temperature at the surface is 475 degrees Centigrade, which is hot enough to melt lead. Also, the atmospheric pressure at the surface is 92 times higher than that on Earth, and air resistance would make movement quite difficult. The atmosphere is mostly carbon dioxide, but it is also raining sulphuric acid, and it has always been assumed that the climate on Venus is so extreme that there is no chance of life existing on the planet whatsoever.

In 1982, the Venera 13 probe sent back some wonderful panoramic images from the surface of the planet for a few brief minutes, before it was destroyed by the atmosphere. When these images were examined in detail, a Russian scientist noted that some small objects appeared to move between successive images. From this, he claimed that there could be "insect-like" life on the surface of the planet. These claims were largely ignored by the scientific community, and it was suggested that they could be fragments of the lens cap, or even the camera shifting at the probe heated up and expanded.

Despite the seemingly inhospitable surface of the planet, scientists are still intrigued by the possibility of life on Venus. Some scientists have speculated that microbial life could exist in the more temperate upper atmosphere, where temperatures and pressures are less severe. This suggestion has been periodically revised and was given a boost when, in September 2020, researchers reported the detection of phosphine gas in Venus's atmosphere, a potential biomarker.

Phosphine is typically associated with the biological decay processes here on Earth, leading to new excitement about the possibility of microbial life. However, this interpretation has been met with scepticism, and further studies are needed to determine its source. Critics argue that non-biological processes could also produce phosphine, underscoring the complexities of understanding Venus's atmosphere.

The search for life on Venus serves as a compelling reminder of the diverse conditions under which life might exist. While current missions and technology focus mainly on Mars as a primary target for astrobiology, Venus remains an important subject of research. Future missions, potentially including the proposed "Draper" and "Venus Life Finder" missions, could provide more insights into the planet's atmosphere and further evaluate the viability of life. Ultimately, understanding Venus may not only reshape our knowledge of where life can thrive but also illuminate the conditions that gave rise to life on Earth.

So, during early evenings in December and January, take a look to the southwest on a clear evening and wonder not just at the magnificent sight of another planet in our solar system, but also the tantalising slim possibility of life, no matter how primitive, on another world. Also keep an eye on the apparent motions of both Venus and Saturn, as they appear to move very close to each other in the middle of January.

The swan that has graced our pond for several years is no more. There are three kinds of swans in Britain: the mute, hooper, and bewick. The male is called a cob, the female a pen and the young, cygnets. Swans are reputed to be able to break our arms but it is a myth, as they have a light skeleton. They have the most vertebrae in their necks, having 24-25, with a wing span of 2.5

Swans can live up to 30 years, breeding after three years and mating for life. Swans are the symbol of wisdom for they are intelligent birds with a memory of an elephant. The beauty of swans has long inspired music, ballet, and stories, such as the "Ugly Duckling" by Hans Christian Anderson.

Cygnus (swan) is one of only three birds identified as a classical star constellation by the Greek astronomer Ptolemy. It is believed from ancient times that the mute swan sang sweetly as it was about to die. This is my "swan song", in memory of that special swan.
