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
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BADSEY BELLES WI

Jane Neill's Nature Notes...

The most visible birds in the fields and woodlands on a cold, frosty January day are crows - Intelligent birds that were kept as pets for their mimicry skills. There are 133 different crows worldwide, but just eight in Britain. The chough with its distinctive red beak and legs lives on the coast; the hooded crow lives in the North; ravens, the largest crow, often flies overhead, "cronking" as it goes.

Famously kept in the Tower of London to keep the Kingdom safe, the rooks gather in rookeries. They have elongated beaks and a purple sheen to their black feathers. Farmers consider them friends as they feed on leatherjackets and wireworms in the soil. A gathering is called a "parliament", however a carrion crow gathering is called a "murder". In ages past they were seen as harbingers of ill luck.

The old farming saying was "one for the rook, one for the crow, one to rot and one to grow". Jackdaws have grey heads and make a "chack" call. Magpies are black and white, and renowned for hoarding bright objects. The jay is a colourful woodland specialist burying acorns in winter like squirrels. At dusk, I watch the black squadrons fly over to settle in their tree roosts. What a thrilling sight!

THE HISTORY MAN IS BACK!

Have you missed him? Because we certainly have!

Beloved Badsey resident Terry Sparrow is back with a new 'Ask the History Man' excerpt, which always sheds welcoming light on some interesting village history. His first series of 2025 concerns Absentee Vicars of Badsey with Aldington - here's what he has to say...

JOHN RAWLINS

Following the death of Reverend Robert Hill in January 1731, there followed a period of 121 years during which Badsey's incombents did not reside in the parish. This was not an unusual situation at the time. The first of the nonresident group was the Reverend John Rawlins, appointed in 1731 at the age of 24, although he did live nearly in Evesham, so it can be assumed that it was not too difficult for him to minister to his parishioners in Badsey and Aldington, as well as in Wickhamford, where he was appointed at the same time.

Nevertheless, particularly during the later years of his ministry, he employed a succession of assistant curates, most of whom stayed for a very short time, to perform many of the parochial duties.

As was quite common in these days, Rawlins acquired a number of other ecclesiastical appointments which were so far from his home that it was clearly impossible for him to give them proper, if any, care. He was rector of the Cotswold parishes of Hayleton and Yanworth, near Northleach, from 1750 until his death in 1784, and he served two terms (1752-55 and 1769-84) as rector of Leigh, a few miles west of Worcester. Presumably, he paid assistant curates to carry out the duties at these places - no doubt their stipends were very low, with the rector retaining part of the parish income for his own benefit.

As if this was not enough, Rawlins became Headmaster of Prince Henry's Grammar School in Evesham in 1742, but ten years later was found guilty of neglect and forced to resign. He also served as a Justice of the Peace.

John Rawlins died on 3rd November 1784 and was buried at Badsey. Aged 77, he had held office here for 53 years. A monument to his memory may be seen on the North wall of the transept in Badsey Church.

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BADSEY SOCIETY News & Upcoming Events

Our talks in October and November focused on researching family history, beginning with Alan Tutton's accounts of some of the skeletons in his family closet including ancestors who were transported to Tasmania in Victorian times, and the sad story of his great uncle who was tried for murder, sentenced to death, reprieved and then sent to Rampton Hospital as one of its first patients in 1921.

Following on from that, we asked if anyone wanted help solving "brick walls", the genealogical term for dead ends in family trees. On Friday 15th November, four people discovered the answers to their queries. Ivor Martin wanted to find out about his paternal grandparents, but this was difficult because his father was adopted. Maureen Spinks set about trying to find the answers and gave a very informative talk about her research and how she found them. Ivor was delighted with her findings.

Penny Christison's questions related to her Harding ancestors from Sopley in Hampshire. She wanted to know what we could find out about two illegitimate brothers. Shirley Tutton researched them and was able to find out that one became a very successful builder, and the other a successful market gardener.

John and Will Dallimore wanted to find out more about their mother's mother, and how she came to be orphaned. Tom Locke was able to unravel the story of her early life in the Forest of Dean and give them some answers. Finally, Terry Sparrow wanted to fill in some gaps in the records in his family tree. He hadn't been able to find the burial and two marriages of his great grandfather's siblings. Due to the digitisation of many parish records since Terry did his own research, Shirley Tutton was able to find these and go on to find the marriages of two of his grandfather's siblings, and find one missing person from the second marriage, which turned into quite a detective story!

If anyone is interested in getting started on researching their own family tree and has never done it the old fashioned way by visiting a county archive, then our trip to the Hive in January might be of interest. Details about this can be found below.

Tour of The Hive

We start the New Year with two events in January. On Thursday 16th January, we are visiting the Hive in Worcester for an 'Explore the Past' tour. This is a chance to see behind the scenes and meet some of the staff, as well as seeing some documents and items not usually on display to the public, as well as the Historic Environment Record. Participants will meet at 10:30am on the ground floor of the Hive, prior to the tour at 11am, which lasts approximately 1 hour 45 minutes. Afterwards, lunch is available in the Hive café, and there is the opportunity to return to the archive for personal research.

Talk with Dr Stephen Roberts

On Friday 17th January at 7:30pm, Dr Stephen Roberts will be giving a talk at Badsey Community & Sports Club entitled "Evesham Quakers and the Seventeenth Century English Revolution". Dr Roberts is a well-respected authority on 17th century history, both locally and nationally, and this promises to be a really interesting evening.

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
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THE MAGIC OF MARS

So far, the autumn and winter seasons have been an excellent time for observing planets. Saturn has been in our skies for many months and can still be seen in the early part of the evening; Jupiter is very bright throughout the night being located just above Orion; Venus is also very bright and is visible during the hours after sunset in the southwest. The



sunlight reflected from the dense clouds surrounding the planet make it appear to be the brightest object in the sky and the first object to appear in the twilight around sunset.

On the 15th of January it will move very close to Saturn and will be there for a couple of days. Even Uranus and Neptune are in a good position for viewing during the early part of the evening - although you will need a telescope to see them and the visible results can be quite disappointing as they are so far away, and they only reflect the light from the sun and do not produce light themselves.

The planets travel across our skies on the same plane as the sun and the moon. This plane can be imagined as a curved line across the sky known as the ecliptic, and apart from Mercury and Venus the planets first appear in the east and set in the west. Also, each night they drift in the same plane across the night sky, appearing in a slightly different position each night. The name 'planet' comes from the Greek, meaning 'wanderer'.

The final planet to join the chain of planets across the sky this winter is Mars. During January it rises in the east in the early evening and moves towards the south around midnight. Mars is quite easy to spot because, as its nickname 'the Red Planet' suggests, it is just that red.

January on Mars corresponds with the latter part of the Martian winter, particularly for the northern hemisphere. This seasonal change brings with it a variety of atmospheric phenomena, including dust storms and temperature fluctuations. Average temperatures during this season can plummet to minus 62 degrees Centigrade at the poles, while equatorial regions might see milder conditions.

One of the most fascinating aspects of Mars's climate is its carbon dioxide ice caps. As winter deepens, carbon dioxide freezes out of the atmosphere, forming seasonal polar ice caps that expand significantly. As winter turns to spring, these caps will sublime, releasing carbon dioxide back into the atmosphere, leading to seasonal weather changes that scientists are keen to study.

With a small telescope it is possible to make out these seasonal bright areas at the poles. With the hope of a few clear evenings in January, why not take a few minutes in the early evening to try to spot the planets stretched in a line across our skies.

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
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
