# REMEMBERING WILL DALLIMORE



Will Dallimore, known to many in Badsey, died on 27th December 2024 at his home in Horsebridge Avenue where he had lived for most of his life. Described by many as a "one-off", he will be a hard act to follow.

For five years, from the end of 2017 until the end of 2022, Will was Editor of The Badsey and Aldington Community News, breathing new life into the magazine which arrives through your letterbox each month thanks to a dedicated team of deliverers. At a time when it was thought that the magazine might fold due to the lack of an Editor, Will stepped into the breach. He brought a more modern look to the magazine, gently persuaded contributors to write regular articles on subjects such as nature, astronomy, and local history, introduced colour and compiled a monthly quiz.

Will's talents were many and he was involved in many village activities. He was a founder member of The Badsey Society, serving on the Committee since 2002 as well as being Chairman for five years and Treasurer for two years. He was also one of the original Badsey website group when it was set up in 2000.

Every Wednesday morning Will was at the church helping to tidy the churchyard, and he was always to be found at coffee mornings. Will was also a keen member of the Movie Makers' Club and helped to produce a number of the Society's DVDs and films for the Bollands' Christmas Charity Week. He also created a character called Doug Deep, who roamed the Vale of Evesham on a two-tine fork in his quest to educate the villagers in the art of Asum Grammar. This was made into an entertaining short film, first shown at The Badsey Society's AGM in 2013. AGMs are not normally renowned for their hilarity, but the 62 members present were in stitches as they watched and listened to Doug taking a flying tour of the Vale.

During lockdown, Will, together with his brother John, kept the village entertained with their "Back Garden Films", posted weekly on The Badsey Society website for three months.





# WHAT DOES THE VICAR DO WITH HER TIME?

Recently I had some business cards printed. The logo in the middle of the card shows an arch of green and white leaves, with something like a stylised person standing underneath. I chose it because it reminded me of our Benefice logo which shows a tree on the banks of a river, which could represent the Vale's heritage of orchards by the banks of the River Avon, but also of the verse in the Bible describing "...a river whose streams make glad the city of God".

The logo on my cards reminds me of all of this, and there is something about the way that the human figure is standing with their arms outstretched up towards the leaves that reminds me of a juggler - which is pretty appropriate since I seem to spend a lot of my time juggling very different concerns and roles. These vary hugely from week to week, and from season to season, though there are – thankfully – some things that form a bedrock, running steadily, forming the rhythm of my days.

With January behind us, Christmas decorations packed away, our Epiphany celebrations have finished (look out for "2025 + C M B +" chalked on or near your church doorway, reminding us of the Wise Men's journey to see the Holy Family). Instead, I am preparing to meet all our wedding couples on the Saturday of Valentine's weekend, with a team of helpers to give them some information about the legal processes, together with wedding bells, flowers, music systems etc – all the different things that can go into a wedding in one of our churches to make it a memorable day for them.

Right on that day's heels will come Ash Wednesday and the start of Lent, which gives us the chance to do a sort of mental clear-out, ask ourselves some hard questions about our lives, and try to give some honest answers to ourselves, and God, about what really matters. It can be life-changing! In amongst all the drama and extra services and events in Lent, Holy Week and Easter, I will also be talking with our five sets of churchwardens and treasurers preparing for our annual parish meetings which take place just after Easter.

Mixed in with all of this, there are meetings with each wedding couple to help them prepare for their big day, and with baptism families for their baptism services on Sundays (most take place in the afternoon, though some christenings happen as part of our regular Sunday services at our different churches). Then there are regular Sunday services and other events to prepare for as well, plus meetings with our Benefice worship team members.

I also meet regularly with each of our three school principals and we plan dates when I can come in to take assemblies or be in school to support students and staff for key events. I am often asked to come and talk to a class, which could be about anything from "What is a font?" to "Tell us about why you wear those funny clothes on Sundays."

Given that I look after five congregations and six church buildings, serve as a school governor and am on three trust boards, a lot of work has to be done by phone, or messaging and emails, across our whole Benefice and with staff at the Diocesan office in Worcester. I work with our worship team, our dedicated churchwardens, and treasurers to make sure that our churches can stay open and services can take place as planned.

But mixed in with all the admin, all the joys and worries, all the emails and phone calls, whether I am out dog-walking or calling in to see someone, all the 101 plates that I juggle as your minister, all this is underpinned by a steady rhythm of prayer, of listening and responding as best as I can to the heartbeat of God's love for all of us here in this place.

God bless you in all that you are juggling in your life.








## BADSEY BELLES WI



# ASK THE HISTORY MAN

Following his previous excerpt about John Rawlins, Terry Sparrow continues his *Absentee Vicars of Badsey with Aldington* series... **GEORGE DRUMMOND** 

The second of our absentee vicars was the Reverand George William Drummond, who was appointed to Badsey on 8th April 1785 at the age of 24. He was a man with influential family connections. His father, the Honourable Robert Hay Drummond (a younger brother of the Earl of Kinnoull) was briefly Bishop of Salisbury and then, from 1761 until he died in 1776, Archbishop of York.

Just four days after becoming vicar of Badsey with Aldington (and also of Wickhamford) George Drummond married Elizabeth, the daughter of Sir Samuel Marshall, a captain in the Royal Navy, but there is no evidence that the couple ever lived in Badsey. In fact, in June of the same year, he became vicar of Doncaster, about 100 miles away, where he remained in office for about five years.

Afterwards, he became either rector or vicar of four other Yorkshire parishes at various dates from 1790 to 1807. For most of the period, he held all four together, while still remaining as vicar of Badsey, Aldington and Wickhamford - clearly an impossible task, and it is therefore hardly surprising that there is no record of him ever conducting a service in Badsey Church.

Drummond's main, (perhaps only), contribution to Badsey appears to have been the rebuilding of the vicarage, which had been described by his predecessor Rawlins as a 'low tenement'. Writing in 1801, Drummond said, "I found the parsonage house little better than a cottage, and in such wretched repair, that after a great part had fallen in I was induced to pull it down and build a new stone house."

The Drummonds appear to have been a much-travelled family. In February 1799 they were in Guernsey where Elizabeth died just three weeks after giving birth to the couple's eighth child, who also died on the same day. Three other children had died previously. In 1802, by which time George Drummond had married again, his eldest daughter died in Edinburgh, aged 15, and was buried in the Royal Chapel of Holyrood.

Travelling once again, the vicar was in Devon on 6th December 1807, embarking from Bideford on a ship bound for Greenock in Scotland. That night, the ship was wrecked in a storm; sadly, he did not survive. At least the Badsey people had continuity of ministry during most of his absentee incumbency. The Reverend Daniel Jones, who took up the assistant curate's post in 1788, stayed for about 20 years. Jones and his wife Elizabeth brought up a large family here; the register shows the baptism of two sons and four daughters during the period 1788-97.

# THE ORION NEBULA

Winter brings the most spectacular constellations to the night sky along with dark evenings that, weather permitting, can be perfect for astronomical observation. In my opinion, the greatest of the constellations is Orion, as there are so many objects of interest and it is quite unmistakable in the night sky.

From Betelgeuse, the bright red giant in the top left shoulder of Orion that is some 650 light years away and is heading into the final stages of its life cycle, blowing up as a supernova in the next few thousand years, to Rigel, the hot blue supergiant that is some 850 light years away there is so much to discover with a telescope or a pair of binoculars. Although a seemingly incredible distance away, these stars are really in our backyard and in the same spiral arm of the Milky Way as our Sun.

Just below the three stars that form the belt of Orion is a fuzzy patch that is one of the few nebulae that is easily visible to the naked eye. The Orion Nebula, also known as M42, is one of the most magnificent and well-studied regions of our galaxy. It serves as a celestial nursery where new stars are born. Located approximately 1,344 light-years away from Earth, which is about twice the distance of Betelgeuse, this vibrant nebula plays a pivotal role in our understanding of stellar evolution, molecular clouds, and the dynamics of interstellar matter.

Its composition primarily includes hydrogen, which accounts for the pinkish glow that can just

be seen through a good telescope, along with traces of helium, carbon, nitrogen, oxygen, and other heavier elements. The nebula is about 24 light-years across, displaying a rich tapestry of colours primarily resulting from the emission of light by ionised gases. Careful observation can reveal a core of bright stars, mainly composed of young, hot, and massive stars, which emit intense ultraviolet light that ionises the surrounding gas.

In the centre of the nebula, there is a group of at least four massive stars that are known as the Trapezium. These stars were first seen by Galileo in 1617 and are a wonderful challenge for amateur astronomers to identify. These stars drive powerful stellar winds and radiation, shaping the surrounding nebula. The interplay between stellar evolution and the surrounding nebula results in intricate features such as dark filaments of dust, bright regions of ionised gas, and a shimmering haze that envelops the area.



The Orion Nebula is not just a site for stellar birth; it also serves as a natural laboratory for studying astrophysical processes. Its brightness and proximity make it easily observable with small telescopes, allowing amateur astronomers and enthusiasts to marvel at its beauty. Professional astrophysicists have utilised the nebula to sharpen their models of star formation, the evolution of molecular clouds, and the lifecycle of interstellar matter.

The Orion Nebula is a stunning example of nature's artistry and mechanics, encapsulating the fundamental processes of star formation and evolution in a captivating display of colour and light. Its study not only enhances our understanding of the universe but also deepens our appreciation for the intricate relationships between stars, gas, dust, and the formation of planetary systems. As we continue to explore and learn from such cosmic phenomena, the Orion Nebula remains a focal point for both scientific inquiry and human curiosity about our place in the universe.


So if you are out and about on a clear evening over the next few months, why not take a few moments to gaze up at one of nature's wonders?













# Jane Neill's NATURE NOTES

February is the month of dearth for nature before the warmth of spring awakens emerging insects attracted by the first flowers, such as the snowdrops, crocuses, and lesser celandine. Lesser celandine looks like a buttercup, but has eight to twelve petals and grows mainly along the brook.



Birds begin to define their territories for nest building, changing their soft winter songs by turning up the volume that rises to a crescendo in March. It is a time to appreciate the subtle light as it lengthens each day. The morning and evening can bring glorious sunrises and sunsets, casting pinks, oranges, and reds on their surroundings - brief but beautiful.





With the lack of cover and the bare trees there is so much to notice on a walk, such as fungi growing on the fallen rotting trunks and branches or the flash of brilliant blue as you disturb the kingfisher along the brook. When you look up you see not what you are watching, but what is watching you!
