HAPPY EASTER!

Dear Friends,

Over the last few months, we have welcomed a Ukrainian family to come and share our home. The war in Ukraine has forced Alla and two of her children from their home in Irpin - first to Poland, and then two years later to us here in Badsey, where they have had to make huge adjustments: getting used to rural English life, learning yet another language, tasting different foods ("What is this cauliflower cheese?"), making new friends in school - and all whilst mourning the loss of their lovely home and garden and the continued relentless advance of the Russians into Ukraine.

One of the ways in which Alla, the mum, has coped with creating this new (hopefully temporary) life in England, is through something she knows and loves deeply – gardening and growing things – and she takes special satisfaction in rescuing vegetable seeds or roots left over from preparing our meals, putting them into water or soil where I would have thrown them onto the compost heap. It is as if she is so aware of the fragility of life, the way that life – any life – is precarious and uncertain, and can be snuffed out and destroyed before it has barely begun, and wants to do whatever she can to save it and give it new life and hope. Pumpkin seeds, tomato seeds, the ends of celery, squash seeds, the top cut from a pineapple – all have been carefully set aside, given pots of earth or water and a chance to thrive.

One thing she especially loves to grow is avocado stones. Our kitchen windowsill is now filled with little yoghurt pots from the children, each with an avocado stone set in some water. At first, I regarded this as a complete waste of time (and precious windowsill space). For weeks the stones just SAT there, apparently unresponsive at best, or turning black. I thought about throwing some of them out when Alla wasn't looking – but she loves them all and kept them so carefully, so I didn't. Then, long after I had given up on them and was about to suggest they went on the compost heap, first one and then another sent up a slender shoot – first yellow and then sprouting little leaves. It's alive!

I thought about the way I had felt – as so many of us did – in those weeks of gloom in February, with thick clouds with absolutely no sun visible day after day. Cold winds, relentless grey overhead and, in my head and heart, with no obvious feeling of spring. Would it ever end? But it did; the clouds finally parted and, as the sun shone, I noticed all the primroses flowering in the grass and the faint mist of green in the hawthorn hedges and on our neighbour's beautiful weeping willow tree.

Just when we feel like giving up, we are given a sign, something that makes us realise that there is hope, that change IS possible, and life can begin again. Just when Jesus' friends had thought that he was gone forever, that they would never see their beloved teacher and friend ever again, he appeared among them, to bless them and encourage them, filling them with wild joy, excitement and hope for the future. So now, every Easter the church celebrates this message and proclaims it for all who need to hear it and see it: the grave is empty because love is stronger than death.

May the life and peace of the risen Lord be always with you. God bless you this Easter.



ASK THE HISTORY MAN...

In this issue, Terry Sparrow writes the last excerpt of his Absentee Vicars of Badsey with Aldington series...

The third and last of our non-resident vicars was the Reverend Charles Phillott, who was born in 1774 at Bath, where his father was a magistrate in the city. Like his predecessor, Drummond, Phillott married into a naval family; his wife, Charlotte, was a daughter of Vice Admiral Francis Pender. His early ministry appears to have been as assistant curate at St Michael's Church in Bath, before his presentment to Badsey, and to Wickhamford, in 1808.

Within a few weeks, Phillott also became rector of the Wiltshire village of Kingston Deverill, remaining there until 1813 when he became nonresident vicar of Frome Selwood in Somerset. By that time, he was living with his family at Dawlish in Devon, where records show the baptisms of five of his children during the period 1811-22, as well as the burial of his eldest daughter in 1829 and the marriage of another daughter in 1843.

In 1816, Phillott was instituted as minister of East Teignmouth, just a couple of miles from his home, remaining in office there until 1845. But still, he continued as vicar of Badsey and Aldington, of Wickhamford, and of Frome, until his death in 1851. He was buried at Frome.

In spite of the distance involved and the difficult travelling conditions at the time, Charles Phillott did come to Badsey on several occasions, as evidenced in his signature on the registers of baptisms, burials, and marriages. He was also present at a meeting held on 25th June 1839 to re-establish a Sunday School.




BUNTING, BELLS & BISCUITS

More information on the competition, as well as a full list of other classes to be entered, will be in the 2025 Flower Show Schedule which will be released soon.




Jane Neill's Nature Notes...



April is the month of nature's awakening, with trees bursting into leaf. According to gardening by the 'moon phases', April 13th to April 21st is a good time to sow root crops, bulbs, and perennials.









In the meadows, small rodents, such as voles, traverse through a series of tunnels feeding on the succulent new grass stems and seeds. The kestrel sits patiently on the wires, watching and waiting to pounce.

Cowslips flower here, too. According to legend, St Peter dropped the keys to heaven and the cowslip sprang from where it fell. The perfumed cowslip makes a good win! Sweet-scented bluebells bloom in the woodland, and swallows and martins have arrived, but my greatest wish is to hear, 'Cuckoo'!







SPOTTING SPICA

Now that we are into April, the clocks have changed to summertime and the evenings are getting longer, so each day, it feels as though summer can't be too far away. This month is also your last chance to observe the great winter constellations before they disappear from view until next autumn. Orion, Taurus, and the Pleiades can be seen in the west just after sunset, but they set earlier each evening and the sun sets a little later, so by the end of the month they will not be visible.

This month's object is easily found in the southeastern skies during the evening in the constellation of Virgo and, being one of the 20 brightest stars in the night sky, it is bright enough to stand out from the surrounding stars. Spica is a blue giant star and being only 250 light years away is one of our closer neighbours. It is an interesting star because it has a close partner.

Most stars are binary pairs; our sun as a single star is unusual in not having a partner. What is interesting about Spica is that its partner cannot be resolved with any telescope because

it is so bright, and the partner is so close. The partner star has been detected by a technique known as spectroscopy. In 1814, Joseph von Fraunhofer discovered that when light passes through gases, certain wavelengths would be absorbed and not others. It appeared as though there were lines drawn through the spectra of light that had passed through the gas. He studied these lines, mapping out many hundreds of lines in the spectra of the sun alone, and so spectroscopy was born.

In 1868, George Raynet used this technique to look at the spectra of the sun and noticed a strange yellow line. He then realised that he had discovered a new element which was called Helium, after Helios, the Greek name for the sun. We now use spectroscopy to analyse the chemistry of different stars, and while examining the spectra of Spica it was noticed that some lines appeared to move slightly back and forth relative to the main strong spectral lines. It was therefore possible to deduce that these lines are produced by another smaller star orbiting the main star.

The apparent movement in the lines is caused by the Doppler shift as the smaller star moves away from and towards us during its orbit. The main star is about seven times larger than the sun and is about ten times more massive. It is also approaching the end of its relatively short stellar life, as it is beginning to swell up into a super-giant. Without actually seeing this smaller partner star we are able to deduce that it is still quite large, having about four times the mass of our sun and having a radius about four times larger. We also know that the two stars orbit each other every four days which is incredibly fast, and they must be very close to each other.

Finding Spica is relatively easy as it sits very close to the ecliptic (the path the planets and moon follow through the southern night sky). Alternatively, you can follow an arc from the handle of the Plough to Arcturus and then continue on the same distance to Spica.

With the warmer, longer evenings, why not take a few minutes to spy out one of the stranger objects in our night sky?




