Turn out Your Cupboards - School Photos Wanted

Do you have a box of photos lurking in your cupboards that you've been meaning to sort out — or a collection of mugs and medals gathering dust? Well, now's the time to check what's there. A large collection of photographs/memorabilia is being assembled for possible inclusion in *A History of Badsey School* but more are always needed. In particular, the following are wanted: very old photographs (pre 1920); anything connected with the 1940s and 1950s; photo of Mrs Morris (née Mustoe), the Infant School Head until 1938; photo of Mrs Emma Wilson, widow of Edward Wilson of The Manor, cleaner at the school for nearly 40 years (retiring in 1929); a medal for good attendance (early 20th century); a mug to commemorate the signing of peace after World War I. Archaeological Field Walk

Badsey School Fete gave the first opportunity to have a closer look at the finds from the April field walk in Under Badsey. Visitors to the fete were able to talk to Deborah Overton, who works for the Worcestershire Archaeological Service and try their hand at cleaning pottery - even those who have shied away from dishwashing all their lives got into the swing of things. The majority of pottery was the local Romano British Severn Valley ware with a few pieces of Greyware and just one or two of Samian (the Royal Doulton of its day). So early indications are that Under Badsey once was probably home to a farmstead of some sort. Peter Stewart kindly brought in his extensive collection of Roman coins to add to the exhibition. Peter's collection and his knowledge of coins impressed everyone.

An evening of pottery washing is planned for the new year with an expert from the Archaeological Service to help identify and talk about the finds. South Worcestershire Archaeology Group (SWAG) are also keen to take part in another field walk with *The Badsey Society*, probably in the Autumn. It is hard for field walks to be planned well in advance because most land is still worked but we will try to give as much notice as we can for the next walk. If you have a particular interest in archaeology, please notify Carolyn Worth so that you can be contacted in case something is arranged at short notice.

The Power of the Internet!

In the last Newsletter we reported on the American property developer who bought the former Blacksmith's shop in Badsey. Since then, the e-mail lines between Badsey and America have been hot, with overseas Badsey Society member, Peggy Dolan of Florida, exchanging frequent e-mails with Maureen Spinks. Peggy is the great-great-great-great-granddaughter of Mary Oldaker (1772-1844) whose father, Richard, first acquired the Blacksmith's shop (since demolished) by the church; Mary went on to marry Charles Simpson. Research

on both sides of the Atlantic has proved a timely reminder that family history research is never as straightforward as it seems. It now seems most likely that Alfred Berrington, the American property developer, was the elder brother of Louisa Oldaker (née Berrington), the widow of Richard Oldaker (1806-1860), the third generation of Blacksmiths. Alfred and Louisa had been baptised at Fladbury in 1811 and 1818 respectively. Alfred is to be found in the 1880 Chicago census, described as a 70-year-old Cigar Maker, born in England. Curiouser and curiouser, however, is the fact that we then discover from the IGI that widowed Louisa marries John Cornelius Simpson in 1861 (John was the first-cousin-onceremoved of Louisa's dead husband, Richard). Richard dies in 1860, has no adult son to take over the business. Richard's relative, John Cornelius Simpson, a blacksmith by trade, who probably learnt his craft in Badsey from his great-uncle Samuel, was widowed by this time with a young family (his son, John Cornelius, had only been born in 1858). John Cornelius Simpson needs a wife, Louisa needs a husband and someone to look after the blacksmith's business until her son, John, comes of age to inherit. Simple!
