Doreen Moore (1922-2005)

It is with regret that we report the death of Society member Doreen Moore (née Ballard) in October 2005. Doreen's old recipes for curing minor illnesses (some more successful than others!) were published on the Badsey website a few years ago. A few months after Doreen's death, we received a communication from Granada ITV. They were in the process of making a series about the history of Old Wives Tales and Folklore remedies for their "This Morning" programme and had found Doreen's article on the Badsey website. They felt that Doreen's remedies would be perfect for their programme and were very keen to interview her. Sadly, we had to notify them that their request had come too late.

Although Doreen is no longer here to tell her tales, you can read her article at <u>www.badsey.net</u>. As a taster, here is her beginning paragraph: "My earliest memory is of my mother relating the story of Gran Ballard's cure for Dad's earache when he was a small child. Apparently, she boiled a potato, cut off a small portion and, while still hot, dropped some into the offending ear. Years later, when up for an army medical, he was told he had perforated eardrums. I always imagined him walking around with two colanders attached to his head!"

Cider with John – and Mike, Fred, Michael and Doreen

Those of you who are of a certain age will doubtless remember the Cider Mill in Badsey High Street. Sadly, no photographs seem to exist of the Mill, but we are grateful to John Bird for allowing his painting of the Mill to be published on the Badsey website. Fred Mason, in his 90s, recalls a pony being used to crush the apples, but Mike Hewlett of Green Leys, some 15 years younger, says that it had been mechanised by his time: there was an old Lister engine which smashed the apples into a hopper and then to a pulp

Michael Flanagan, who lived at 11 Synehurst during the war, also remembers the Cider Mill: "Some mornings we'd sneak off to school early so that we could hang around the Cider Mill looking thirsty until one of the men gave us a drink of scrumpy. Then off we went to school with faces like Pershore plums and much too much to say for ourselves."



The redoubtable Doreen Moore had a use for cider in curing the common cold: "Cider was also useful as a medicine to cure a cold and it was invaluable to give 'central heating' to a frozen body! Take a small saucepan to the shed, place under tap in cider barrel, take as much as required. Place same on gas stove, heat up, add sugar and a teaspoon of ginger. Drink up, then sit back and wait. Either the cold was cured or, in a bemused way, it became quite acceptable." Whisky also had its uses: "Toothache was treated by rubbing the aching gums with neat whisky and swishing some around in the mouth. I did think Dad suffered more than some with this affliction, and he always forgot to spit it out after the swishing!"
