



### Friday 22<sup>nd</sup> June – Get to Know Your Footpaths, Whit Walk



## Worcestershire Photographic Survey – "The Badsey Expedition"

To photograph all the houses which then existed in the village. These photos now form part of a unique collection held at the Record Office at County Hall.

## Martha's Cottage

Some 250 years ago, Francis Grove owned Harrington House and the three cottages known as Orchard Way. After his death in 1755, his nephew, John Jones, inherited most of the estate, but the following provision of a cottage was made for his sister, Mrs Martha Barber:

*"I will that my nephew, John Jones, shall, within 12 months after my decease at his own costs and charges erect one cottage or tenement of one bay of building upon and in the orchard so devised to the said Benjamin Harold and do and shall also make and set out a point of ground for and to be used as a garden ... and I will order and direct that my nephew shall erect the said cottage in such convenient place of the said orchard as he shall think fit and I do hereby give the said cottage when so erected and also the said garden so to be added and adjoined thereto according to the intention of my will unto my sister Martha for the term of her natural life..."*

For whatever reason, Martha's cottage was never built. The site for the cottage has been identified as the plot of land in front of No 5 Orchard Way where the new house is being built. We all know that Wychavon Planning Regulations can be a long-drawn-out process. But come on! 250 years?!

## Sladden's Barn

As many of you will know, the Sladden family lived at Seward House for over 100 years. Whilst the house was sold in 1985 to become a Nursing Home and has now been converted back to residential accommodation, the barn remains in Sladden family ownership.



This 1968 photo shows the barn and pigsty. The wall on the left no longer exists. On the right can be seen part of the present-day 24D High Street. Two years after this photo was taken, Patrick Dilnot de la Cour Sladden, born in New Zealand and the great-grandson of Sir Julius Sladden's elder brother, Dilnot, bought the barn and land west of the walled rose garden. Patrick and his wife Nancy then converted half the barn into residential accommodation. Patrick died in 1988 and Nancy in 1996; their daughter, Patsy Miller, is now the owner.

This 2007 photo shows Patsy (née Sladden) and Anthony Miller (right) standing on the site of the former pigsty. Thirty years after their own wedding at St James Church, Patsy and Anthony were back in Badsey in May to celebrate the wedding of their daughter, Dr Lucy Miller, to Dr Tom Lee. This was only the second Sladden Badsey wedding to take place in the village.

With them are John and Lyn Sharp who live at Honeysuckle Cottage, 24C High Street. The Sharps' cottage was formerly the coach-house for Seward House.
