We propose to have a small Sale of Work later on, when these things and all that was left over from the Bazaar will be disposed of. We hope that there will be plenty of buyers and that a substantial sum will be added to the funds. A child's cot was presented and still remains on hand. It has been valued at £1 6s. by the kind donor. Would anyone care to buy it? The total sum paid into the Bank from all sources up to date amounts to £128 10s. We cannot say exactly when the work at Wickhamford Church will be commenced. The sum of £230 has been mentioned by Sir Arthur Blomfield as the lowest estimate for the most necessary work. When we see our way to obtaining this sum we shall commence the restoration at once.

The Vicar has been making researches in the Bodleian Library at Oxford on the subject of the relationship between George Washington, the first President of the United States, and the Penelope Washington buried at Wickhamford. He is glad to discover that the latest authorities in America have found recent evidence to prove undoubtedly that George Washington was descended from the Northamptonshire family of Washingtons. The great grandfather of George Washington and Penelope's father, Colonel Henry Washington, were first cousins. This fact has sometimes been disputed, but it seems now to be clearly proved and admitted in America that such is the case.
