BISHOPRIC SUNDAY.

We would remind our readers that on Sunday, February 14th, there will be collections throughout the diocese on behalf of the Birmingham Bishopric Fund. That the needs of this diocese have outgrown its means of supplying them, and that the time has now come when, for the sake of efficiency, the diocese must be divided, cannot be disputed. It must also be obvious to all, that the portion of the diocese which will remain to Worcester and the part that is to be detached will each benefit to a similar extent, inasmuch as each will in future possess a whole bishop instead of half of one. The cost of endowing the new bishopric will be about £115,000, towards which the sum £100,000 already been subscribed. hoped that the remaining £15,000 may be raised by the special effort which is to be made on February 14th. There are nearly 500 parishes in the diocese, so that, if this appeal is to be final. rather more than £30 per parish will be required. Although many parishes will doubtless contribute more than the average sum required, it is evident that the majority will, of necessity, fall far below the average, so that it will be imperative to strain every nerve. In parishes like our own, where the religious needs of the place have been provided for by the munificent piety of past generations, the moral claims of this appeal are undeniable; and, what we do towards endowing the new bishopric will in some degree measure our gratitude to those who in ages long gone by provided so liberally for our own spiritual needs. Unless Badsey and Wickhamford increase very rapidly in population, it is hardly likely that the present generation will be called upon to provide anything in the shape of endowment for this locality. The opportunity is therefore unique, and the question for each should be, not "How little need I give?" but, "How much by self-denial can I afford?" We hope that those who cannot be present at any of the services on the 14th will send an offering by a friend. The Vicar will be glad to put into the alms dish any contributions that may be sent to him.
