The preacher will be the Rev. Robt. Wilson, LL.D., Head Master of Solihull Grammar School. It is requested that offerings of flowers, fruit and vegetables, be brought to the Church on Saturday, October 14th, between 9 and 10 a.m.

The Badsey Festival will possess an added interest as being held on the twentieth anniversary of the re-opening of Badsey Church after the restoration of chancel, nave and transept, and the building of the vestry and south aisle. The festival alms at both Wickhamford and Badsey will be given to the Evesham Cottage Hospital. is the only occasion in the whole year when the cause of this local medical charity is pleaded in our Churches, we appeal to everyone to give "as he is able." No Christian is dispensed from the duty of almsgiving by absence from public worship, and we venture to suggest that those who are unadvoidably prevented from attending the Festival Services, should send their offerings by the hands of friends. The Vicar will be glad to put into the almsdish any money sent to him.
