
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THE BISHOP'S MISSION.

date of the commencement of the Bishop's Mission to this Rural Deanery has been altered from November 10th to November 16th. We have indeed been fortunate in securing as our missioner the Rev. W. Ismay, M.A., Vicar of Eckington, near Pershore. Mr. Ismay is a priest of more than ordinary experience, a deep and devout thinker, and one who thoroughly understands the needs and possibilities of a country His addresses are sure to be thoughtful, earnest and practical, and we trust that very many will avail themselves of the help thus offered. As will be seen from the scheme given below, the addresses will be of the nature of a "course," and therefore an effort should be made to attend them all.

During the Mission, which will commence on November 16th and conclude on November 23rd, there will be Holy Communion daily at Badsey at 8, except on Thursday, November 23rd, when the Celebration will be at Wickhamford. The other week-day services at Badsey will be Morning Prayer at 10 and Evening Prayer with Address at 7.30. The subjects upon which Mr. Ismay proposes to speak at Badsey will be as follows:

Friday, November 16th, "A New Start."

Saturday, November 17th, "God's Righteousness."

Sunday, November 18th (3 p m.), "God's Love," 6-30, "God's will to Redeem and Renew."

Monday, November 19th, "Why was I baptized?"

Tuesday, November 20th, "Why did I make Promises?"

Wednesday, November 21st, "Why should we meet—and offer to God?"

Thursday, November 22nd, "Why should we meet—and receive from God?"

Friday, November 23rd "Closing Thoughts."

The subjects of the Addresses at Wickhamford will be:—

Sunday, November 18th (11 a.m.) "A New Opportunity."

Monday, November 19th, (hours to be arranged)
"Our Covenant with God."

Thursday, November 22nd, (ditto) "Our Worship of God."

The Bishop intends to "visit" Badsey and Wickhamford on the evening of Tuesday, November 20th.

The chief interest in this, the first division in the Upper House, lies in the fact that the amendment was resisted by the Government, but carried by an overwhelming majority: Evidently the Peers are in no mood to be intimidated by the threats of that Bombastes Furioso of Political Dissent, Mr. Lloyd-George.
