Saintbury Church but there is a strong, metal left-hand rail all the way up. Sheep and cattle could be in some of the pastures so dogs must be on a lead at all times. Lovely views (weather permitting) across the Vale to Ragley Hall, Harvington, the Malverns and Bredon Hill.


We can then retire to the pub in Willersey for a well-deserved drink!

Round-Up of Events January to March 2014

Friday 14th February, Annual General Meeting - Despite the stormy weather, 50 members attended. Following coffee and biscuits, four Committee members gave illustrated talks: Will Dallimore spoke about the history of the parish magazine, Gill Woods described what Badsey would have been like in 1914, Ian Gibson talked about the origins of asparagus and Valerie Magan reported on the coming of the wireless to Badsey.

This year's winner of the Tony Jerram Award was Terry Sparrow whose contribution to village life has been enormous. For most of you, no further explanation is required but, for new members, it should be noted that Terry is a founder member of The Badsey Society, serving as Treasurer for ten years and Chairman for two years; for 52 years he was responsible for winding the church clock; he has written four books, including *A Brief History of Badsey and Aldington* and *Digging for a Living*. He has also been on countless other committees too numerous to list and has been an active player in village activities.



Barbara Jerram presented the award to Terry who responded by saying that he was extremely honoured to accept the award as Tony Jerram had been a personal friend for whom he had much respect.

Friday 14th March, An Evening with Henry Sandon

Many thanks to Will and John Dallimore who arranged for Henry Sandon of *Antiques Roadshow* fame to come and speak to us. Will writes: "Digging up the past has never been so entertaining, especially if you caught Henry Sandon and Peter Stewart at Badsey recently. Their Badsey Society gig attracted a large audience to the village church to see these two veterans of the 'archaeologist's trowel' dig deeper into the lighter side of their passion for old crocks. Peter started the evening with an illustrated talk on the 'finds' he had found whilst metal-detecting in Badsey. Everything from Roman coins to US Army uniform buttons. But it was his pottery that led to a friendly oneupmanship banter with Henry, as to who had dug up the better pieces. Henry came out on top thanks to once having an incredibly 'full of old pots' garden."

Badsey Veterans - A Season of Birthdays

On 25th June 1927, Sir Julius Sladden celebrated his 80th birthday and this was extensively reported in The Evesham Journal. The photo shows Sir Julius Sladden in the company of fellow parishioners aged over 70. A goodly number of our Society members are over 70 – what a gathering that would be!



"Age shall not wither them, Nor custom stale their infinite variety." The pleasant village of Badsey might well be described as one which is the peaceful abode of multitudes of veterans, to whom Shakespeare's (adapted) words most suitably apply. Of the total inhabitants of something over 1100, there are no less than 40 who are over 70 years of age and, of these, at least 20 are in, or have passed their 80th year. We hasten to add that it is not solely the remarkable longevity of these people which warrants their story appearing in a journal that invariably contains some account of an old inhabitant or a couple longwedded, but the notable fact that so many of them enjoy splendid health and are able to pursue their daily round with marked interest, vitality and pleasure.

Of this happy band of people who have passed the Psalmist's allotted span, two - jocularly referred to as Badsey's two "Knights" - celebrated their birthdays on Saturday. Sir Julius Sladden was 80, and Mr Edwin Knight was 83. In honour of the happy anniversary an excellent peal was rung on the bells of St James' Church on Saturday afternoon by a band containing a good number of the local ringers, and not two people in the parish are better deserving of a peal on the Badsey bells. Why? The reasons are that Sir Julius during his long office as churchwarden has always taken a deep interest in the fabric of the parish church, especially the bells, and Mr Edwin Knight, on the other hand, is one of the oldest members of the local band of ringers; he rang in a peal on his 80th birthday, and is a regular churchgoer. Following Saturday's peal, the ringers were entertained to tea, together with Sir Julius and Mr E Knight, by Mr & Mrs J E Knight at Fair View.

To celebrate his 80th birthday, Sir Julius Sladden issued a welcome to all the people over 70 in the parish to take tea with him on Tuesday. It proved to be a very happy gathering, 30 of the 46 responding and enjoying a delightful evening. The oldest person present was Mrs Griffen, who will be 87 in November. Mr William Mustoe and Mr Joe Marshall came, both being 85, while Mr William Brewer of Chalcroft is 84. The average age of those present is 76, which figure would have been increased a little had all over 70 been present. Sir Julius' eight children and nine grandchildren were all present at the birthday celebrations; on Sunday morning, there were 16 Sladdens at church. At 80, the personality of Sir Julius, who was knighted just one and a half years ago, is as bright as ever and his wit as keen. No one could wish for better health than that which he enjoys, health that enables him to take a particularly deep interest in his business and in his public work, and that enables him to cycle to and from Evesham. Outside his business, politics and floriculture occupy much of his time.
