Richard Phillips Memorial Lecture

Friday 28th April 2017, Badsey Community Sports & Social Club, 7.30 pm Tom Locke and Will Dallimore will talk about Richard's work with Worcestershire Archive & Archaeology Service on old buildings, completed just a few months before his untimely death. The aim of The Hive project was to record details of all the Worcestershire buildings shown on the first large scale OS maps from around 1880. For each building, a photograph of what survives today and a brief written description was required. Richard was provided with a map of Badsey showing 109 buildings and one for Aldington with 48 buildings. The Society already had photos of these buildings, but Richard collated the information into the format required. Tom also worked on photographing houses in Wickhamford. The work has been added to the Historic Environment Record.

The Battle for Pear Tree Corner

Hands up who knows where Brewers Hill Lane is?



It may surprise you to know that the track leading from Pear Tree Corner to Bretforton has been renamed! Local residents, Shirley Agg and Sarah Bent, were up in arms when two men from the Council were seen placing a sign on the corner. A Facebook campaign was launched to lobby the Council. Mysteriously, the sign disappeared overnight – and no one's owning up to being the culprit! Shirley is convinced that it was the ghosts of Pear Tree Corner (aka Jim Agg and Mike Hewlett) at work!

Further investigation revealed that a planning application had been submitted for a place called The Bothy, Brewers Hill Lane. Wychavon Council, on being consulted, said that they were simply using the Worcestershire County Council street gazetteer. At some stage in the dim and distant past, someone at WCC decided that the track must have a name. The assumption is that someone probably scribbled down "Bowers Hill Lane" (which would make sense for someone who did not know the history of the area) and this was misread as "Brewers Hill Lane". As we already have a road called Brewers Lane, the decision to name a new road with a very similar name would be a recipe for disaster.

A copy of the Enclosure Map was sent showing that, as far back as 200 years ago, the track was known as Pear Tree Lane. Reference was made to Chapter 2 of "Aldington and Badsey, Villages in the Vale", in which Terry Sparrow describes the Bowers Hill area of Badsey, giving a detailed description of the lane. But, however many reasons we gave as to why the track should never have been called Brewers Hill Lane in the first place, we are where we are. The only way that the name can be changed is via the Parish Council taking steps under the Public Health Act 1925. This has now been set in motion with a period of consultation. Watch this space in the continuing battle for Pear Tree Corner!

Treasures from the Album of Pat Goldstraw – Every picture tells a story

Over the years, Pat Goldstraw (née Barnard) has been very generous in sharing a number of photos from her extensive collection. Pat's family tree connects her to many Badsey families who have lived in the village for well over 150 years: not only the Barnard family, but also the Crisp, Sears, Addis and Dore families. At the Nostalgia Evening, Pat produced more goodies from her family archive.



This 1880s' photo shows members of the Sears family who emigrated to America in the previous decade. On the left are John and Mary Ann Sears and on the right are John's younger brother, David, his wife, Felicia, and their two sons, Ozel and Ozro.

John and David were two of five children born at Wickhamford, in 1838 and 1850 respectively, later moving to Badsey in the mid 1850s. John Sears was working as a servant at Wickhamford Manor in 1861; later that year he married Mary Ann Heeks at Badsey. Pat's great-grandmother, Eliza Sears (who married Emmanuel Dore in 1864), was one of the witnesses; she was unable to write, so signed with a cross.

In 1871, John and Mary Ann were living in Wickhamford, with John working as a labourer. Times would have been hard. It must have been a momentous decision when, in 1872, John and Mary Ann set sail for a new life in America. They settled in Auburn Township, Geauga, Ohio, where John was a farmer; his brother, David, soon followed. John's parents-in-law, John and Anne Heeks, also followed and were living with them at the time of the 1880 Census. Mary Ann's parents may have been inspired to emigrate in their sixties, not only because of their only daughter, but also because John's nephew, William Edgington (born Badsey in 1827), had recently departed for America with his wife and eight children. William's eldest daughter, Felicia Edgington, married David Sears in Geauga in November 1874. One assumes the young couple knew each other whilst living in the Vale. From Ohio, the Sears' brothers sent home photos of their new lifestyle. This included a photo of their homestead, which unfortunately is too faded to reproduce here, but was of a fairly substantial size.



Left behind in Badsey was John and David's youngest brother, Benjamin. This photo shows his three sons: Arthur (1880-1946), Frederick (1881-1951) and Thomas John (1886-1941). They lived at a cottage near the school (since demolished). Arthur later formed Arthur Sears & Son, and became one of the foremost fruit and vegetable growers and merchants in the Vale.

Fortunately the Sears brothers' niece, Mary Ann Barnard (née Dore), wrote on the back of the photos, otherwise their identities may have been lost forever. The moral of the story is that it's never too late to start organizing your photos. It may be obvious to you who the people in a photo are but, a few generations down the line, your great-grandchildren may not have a clue!
