Aldington Conservation Area Appraisal

Another of our members has also been busy. Rosemary Blyth of Aldington has been working on the conservation area appraisal for Aldington and writes as follows:

"Completion of the new Conservation Area Appraisal for Aldington has now taken place. The publication can be viewed on the internet within the list of other villages with their own conservation areas on the Wychavon District Council website. The expansion of the boundary will ensure that the history of the village, its landscaping, trees, important landmarks, notable buildings (both listed, listed by curtilage and unlisted) together with other important features, remain protected to ensure the character of the village is maintained for the future. The new boundary incorporates the Slaughterhouse, The Old Cider Mill, Ty Cerdd, four old cottages originally within the curtilage of Ivy House (now demolished), The Old Chapel, Graces Barn, The Forge, Brock House, Abbots Barn, Chapman Barn, Violets Barn together with three new build properties within the former curtilage of The Manor/Manor Court, namely Marriot House, Marshall House and The Laurels. Of particular historical importance the new boundary now incorporates Mill House, The Mill Pond, and part of Badsey Brook as far south as the leat."

Worcester Cathedral Library

Following on from a successful trip to Worcester Cathedral Library last year, we decided to participate in their "Adopt a Book" programme. The Library has been an integral part of the life of Worcester Cathedral from the earliest years of its history. In order to secure its future, there is a need to increase its endowment, with the object of making it financially self-supporting.

We are fortunate that The Badsey Society is a fairly rich Society and so, having looked at the various books in the library, we have adopted Tredway Russell Nash's *History of Worcestershire* in 2 volumes, as Badsey and Wickhamford are mentioned. This was published by John Nichols of London in 1781-1782. To commemorate our special connection to the Library, The Badsey Society's name is recorded in the Library's Benefactors' Book. In addition, Shirley Tutton and Jane Neill represented the Society at a special service for benefactors at Worcester Cathedral in June.

From Badsey to Auburn, USA

We are always delighted when someone takes the trouble to write a message in our Visitors' Book on the website. A recent message was from Barbara Kienzle whose great-great-grandfather, Adolphus Careless Wright, left Badsey in 1883 to emigrate to Auburn, USA, with his young family. Why Auburn is unknown. In Willersey Road, Badsey, there is a house named Auburn; this is one of several houses built by the Hall brothers around 1890. Theodore James Hall and his wife, Jane, spent a few years in America in the 1870s, as did his brother, Owen, who was the first owner of Auburn House. WWI and WWII Anniversaries

19th July 2019 marks the centenary of Peace Day. Much was made of the centenary of the end of hostilities on 11th November last year, but many people do not realise that the war had not officially ended.

Twenty years later, the country was again at war and this September marks the 80th anniversary of WWII.



Although the guns fell silent on 11th November 1918, peace was not officially proclaimed until 28th June 1919 when the Treaty of Versailles was signed. To mark the final end of the war, Saturday 19th July 1919 was designated a public holiday and Peace celebrations took place throughout the land. No photos are known to exist of the event in Badsey or Evesham, but the above photo taken in London shows that masses celebrated.

In Badsey on Peace Day, the bells rang out both morning and afternoon with a thanksgiving service in St James' Church. In the afternoon, decorated bicycles and prams arrived and were judged. The intention had been to have a procession through the village but, due to incessant rain, this was aborted. At the school, a tea party was organised for the pupils and for people over 70. This year, exactly a hundred years later, the school tea will be re-created at Badsey First School with a number of older residents from the village being invited.

With money left over from the Peace Day festivities, Peace Mugs were bought to give to the children. Instead of a Peace Mug, each of the 2019 pupils will receive a copy of Peace, War & Remembrance: The Great War in Badsey, Aldington & Wickhamford.

Twenty years after the end of WWI, momentous events, both locally and nationally, meant that 1939 marked a watershed in the history of Badsey School. Two events were of huge significance. On 1st September, the school became an Infant and Junior School for children up to 11 with the older children due to start at the new Blackminster School. On 3rd September, the Second World War broke out and evacuees began arriving.

Stanley Hayes of Birmingham, aged 11, was one such evacuee and wrote: "I was allocated to Mr & Mrs Wasley, who lived at Aldington. We arrived two days before war was declared. On the Sunday morning, we assembled at what is now the British Legion and were taken to church. We were in church when war was declared and the Vicar made an announcement. Sometimes I would walk by the brook to get to Badsey School."
