#### Pandemics - now and a century ago

How has lockdown been for you? It's certainly been a strange past few months. Not only have some of us learned how "to zoom", but phrases such as "social distancing", "lockdown" and "the R-number" have become common parlance. Some members have written about their experiences during this period (go to the Home page of <u>www.badseysociety.uk</u> and follow the link). It's not too late for you to send in your Coronavirus Chronicle by emailing <u>history@badsey.net</u>. Just as the letters written by young soldiers over a century ago gave a first-hand account of their experiences, so these chronicles will provide a fascinating snapshot in a time of national crisis.

The importance of oral and written testimony is so important, and it was because of our researches that the Society had a brief minute or so of fame on Radio 4! With the country in the grip of the current Covid-19 crisis, Radio 4 harked back to the influenza pandemic of 1918 and put together, at short notice, a three-episode programme in May.

So how did The Badsey Society get involved? A programme researcher found a reference to Spanish flu on our website. An extract from a letter by Mela Brown Constable to her fiancée, Cyril Sladden, was dramatized in Episode 2 and extracts from two of the letters written by Dr Arthur Sladden, in which he was critical of the government's response to the pandemic, were heard in Episode 3. #### An Unfortunate Name?

In the 20<sup>th</sup> century, according to *Ancestry*, some hundred or more girls were registered with the first or second name of Corona. Here in Badsey, on 18<sup>th</sup> June 1911, Isabel Corona Crisp was baptised. Perhaps Corona is not the best of names these days!

Sadly, over the last few months, we have said goodbye to several old friends; we offer condolences to all their families. They all led very full lives, too much to record here, but fuller biographies may be found on our website.

**Michael Barnard (1928-2020)** was one of the earliest people to join the Society in 2002, being membership No 11. Michael, who came from a well-known market gardening family, was well known throughout the Vale for his sketches which appeared frequently in *The Journal* and *Vale Magazine*. A trademark aeroplane always featured somewhere in a picture, as can be seen in the one opposite of the Stone House.

**Anna Tucker (1923-2020)**, who has died, aged 96, joined the Society in its foundation year, 2002, and remained a member until moving to Evesham. Anna, a German by birth, moved to Badsey in early married life and immersed herself in English village life.

**Roger Savory** (1930-2020), who was Badsey born and bred, but lived in America for the past 40 years, was a good friend of the website. It's thanks to Roger that our knowledge of Badsey bell-ringing has been brought to a worldwide audience.

## Badsey Recreation Ground, 15<sup>th</sup> May (100<sup>th</sup> anniversary)



After the opening the children of the Village School will be provided with Tea. Sports and Amusements will follow. A Band is engaged for DANCING, from 7 to 10 p.m. TORCH-LIGHT PROCESSION at dusk. The Committee invite Subscribers and all others interested to be present. Carriage entrance from Sands Lane Footpath from Badesy Fields Lane. After several years of planning, Badsey Recreation Ground was opened on 15<sup>th</sup> May 1920 by Captain Cecil Hunt (son of a previous Vicar of Badsey). The band played, people danced and the finale was a torchlight procession round the ground. We had planned to be able to unveil a commemorative board at this year's Flower Show, but sadly this cannot happen; we hope to be able to do something later in the year. In the meantime, please enjoy reading John Sharp's diligent research.

## Dunkirk, June (80<sup>th</sup> anniversary)

One morning in June 1940, Badsey residents awoke to find the churchyard full of sleeping soldiers; the men were soldiers who had been evacuated from Dunkirk.
